SWANBOURNE


The success of the course not only required the willingness of the recruits, but also a great deal of hard work from the instructors.

FROLICS


The instructors in their infinite wisdom and we in our instinctive obdience, decided that the last night of Recruit Course would be devoted to teaching behaviour habits.
