RSM. I quickly located the Instruction and Program and duly emailed them to the RSM. He was a happy man.

Now for the footage.

In the archive box was a likely looking CD in a cover labelled "WAUR Backup". This, I thought to myself, had to be the disc that contained the 1958 footage.

I eagerly inserted the disc into my work computer and waited impatiently as the disc spun up and loaded. I have two screens and as the disc loaded, the left hand one flickered into life and showed a blue screen with some odd looking numbers, then an FBI Warning. Curious, I glanced across to the right hand screen which showed the disc's file directory to see what the disc was playing. To my horror, I read the title of the file my work computer was loading. The file name was shocking and sadly, modesty prevents me from typing out in full here. Let's just say that it was a movie of a kind that was: (a) Not Suitable For Work; and (b) not the sort of thing you could watch with the family. From the RSM's Desk

To the Association committee, members and families I would like to firstly say thank you, on behalf of the Commanding Officer and members of the Western Australian University Regiment, for allowing us to keep the Association informed of the Regiment's activities. We are truly elated that we are establishing this vital link between the association and its current generation of men and women who are either commencing their career or instructing the new generation of soldiers and officers.



Current Operations:

WAUR has had a significant start to 2018. It began with the Regional Induction Company being moved from Irwin Barracks and re-consolidated with the Unit at Leeuwin Barracks. The other significant change is the 2nd Division conducted a large restructure in 2017 and has allocated all University Regiments under command of the 8th Brigade in Sydney. For the Unit it means no tangible change and we continue to support 13th Brigade by training its soldiers and officers.

We enjoyed the success of six officers completing their training and graduating at the commencement of 2018. All these men and women are currently putting all their taught skills into practice as brand new platoon commanders within 13th Brigade.

WAUR continues to run Driving, Combat Arms Module (CAM) and Infantry specific courses. We are committed to two Accelerated Training Option (ATO) Platoons; we have hosted three training weekends to mitigate the degradation of skills and completed a Driver Instructor Course.

The ATO is a rapid throughput concept that is structured to turn out fully qualified reserve soldier to 13 BDE within six months. Recent successes in the ATO have seen these soldiers deployed on operations with medals pinned on their chests within their first year of service; proof alone to continue this style of throughput. We are currently training 34 ATO soldiers which will be a big boost to the declining numbers in 13th Brigade.

Awards

Recently the Unit gathered at the Unit club where the CO, LTCOL Natalie Wigg presented the following awards:

- CPL Howell and CPL Dastlik were awarded the Military Instructor Badge
- CPL Tate was awarded the Defence Long Service Medal for 15 years' service to the Army
- CPL Caruso was awarded his second clasp to the Defence Long Service Medal in special recognition of 25 years' service to the Army.

Mystery Sergeant Identified

FACT FILE:

Name: Russell James Smith

Date of Birth: April 9, 1948.

Regimental number: 534340

Date of enlistment: early 1967

RSM at the time of enlistment: WO1 Duncan Straun

Service: Served with WAUR 1967 - 1971. Transferred to 28 Battalion in 1971/72, as I

was being transferred north with my work in 1972 discharged 1973. Reinlisted with 16 Battalion RWAR in 1982 for a further 4 years.

Russell included a note with some of his memories from his time in the Unit:

"As you are aware WAUR occupied a two story building in Mounts Bay Road the ground floor was the Drill Hall & training area. The building was flanked with an alley way along the side and back of the building where most of our marching took place.

Our annual camps were conducted at Northam and weekends mainly at Bindoon. A memory at the time was the legal drinking age was 21 yrs and only being 18 yrs, we were able to drink at the Canteen and Annual Camp at Northam!

I enlisted at the same time as Phil Sumner both Phil and myself were promoted to Sgt at the same time, Phil remained in the reserves for quiet some years and went on to become a Captain and I caught up with him years later when I signed up with 16 Battalion. Another person of note in the WAUR at the time was John Dawkins."

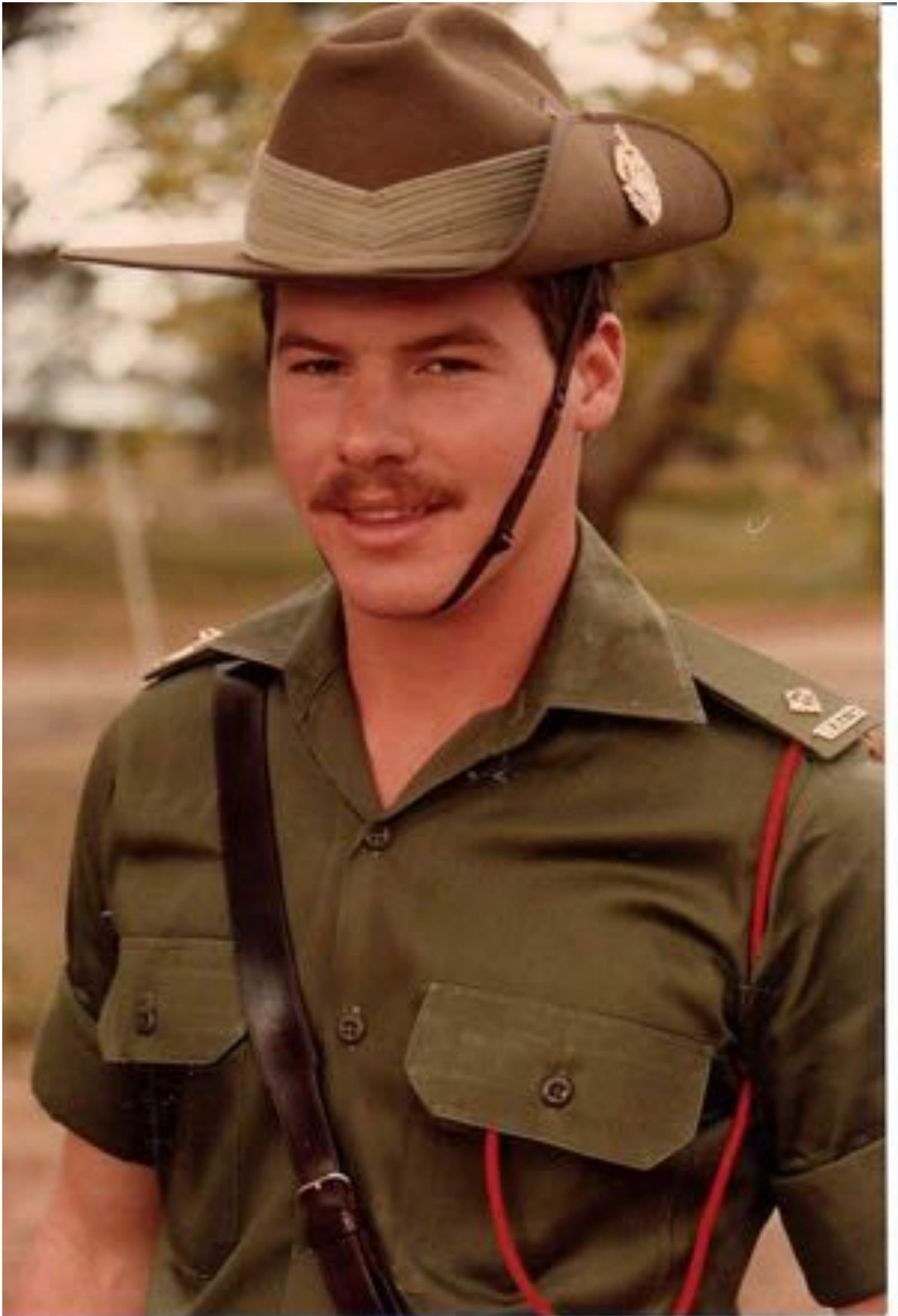

WAUR in the News - 1962

The photo which appears in the Newsletter Banner was first published in the *West Australian* on 02 Feb 1962 and relates to dawn assault at Rotto:

DAWN ATTACK

Firing blank-loaded automatic rifles from the hip, 70 men of the W.A. University Regiment streamed ashore at dawn yesterday from a landing craft in Sulphur Bay to mop up enemy infiltrators who had taken control of Garden Island.

Armed with automatic weapons and a bazooka, a platoon is pictured dashing through the shallows.

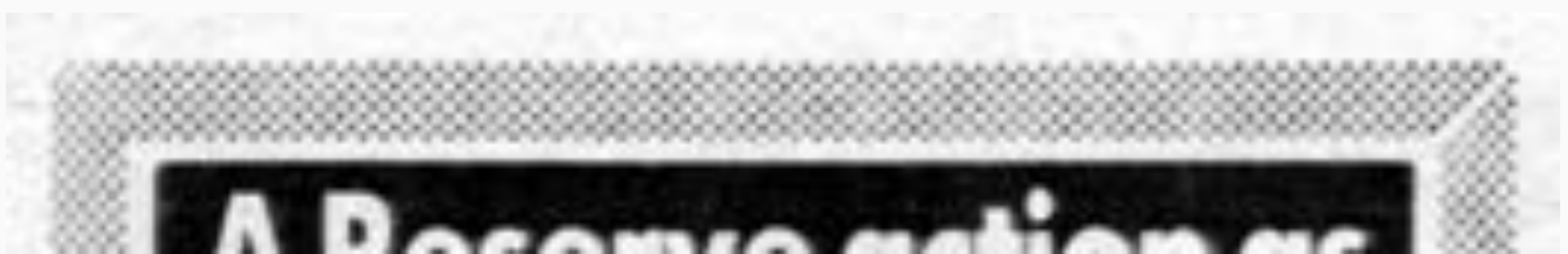
Despite sniping from the beach-side bush, the attackers established a bridgehead and within half an hour had captured their first prisoner. Six hours later, the bridgehead had been extended more than a mile inland and dropping zones had been laid out for air supplies from a chartered Cessna.

The attack, mounted after a three-hour sea trip from Rottnest, is to provide instruction in the type of anti-guerrilla warfare fought by Commonwealth troops in South-East Asia.

It was the first of its kind for the University Regiment, which trains recruits to become C.M.F. officers. The enemy are other troops from the regiment and from the 11th Field Security Section C.M.F. based at Karrakatta.

sergeant as well as communications and driving courses.

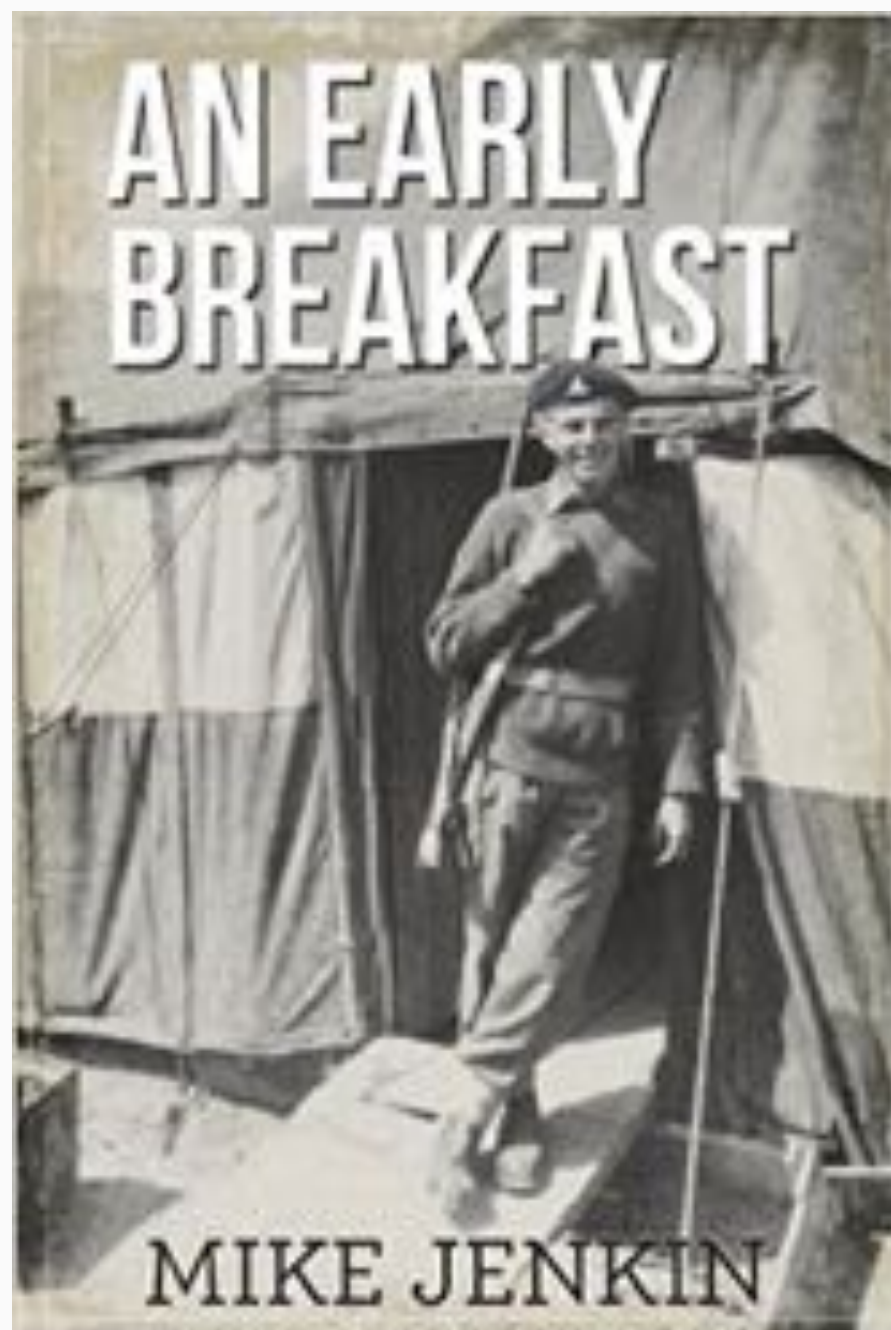
Bookshelf

Shortly before his death in November 2017, my father, **Mike Jenkin** published a book about his time in Korea as a national serviceman in the British Army. The book is called: "An Early Breakfast".

Review:

This is an incredibly detailed and accurate account of one man's experiences as a National Service soldier in the British army during the 1950's.

From the early days as a new and inexperienced recruit who was somewhat reluctant to leave home, it follows his journey through basic training and then half way around the world to the battlefronts of the Korean War. On arrival in Korea he was assigned to the Counter Bombardment Troop, a division of the Royal Artillery and mobilised to the conflict zone. The seasons and battle conditions in Korea varied considerably during his time, including the ceasefire and ensuing tense standoff which is still present today. The author has written this book six decades after the events which makes the accuracy even more impressive. He has also been able to include some original photographs which add immense value to the historical record this book creates.

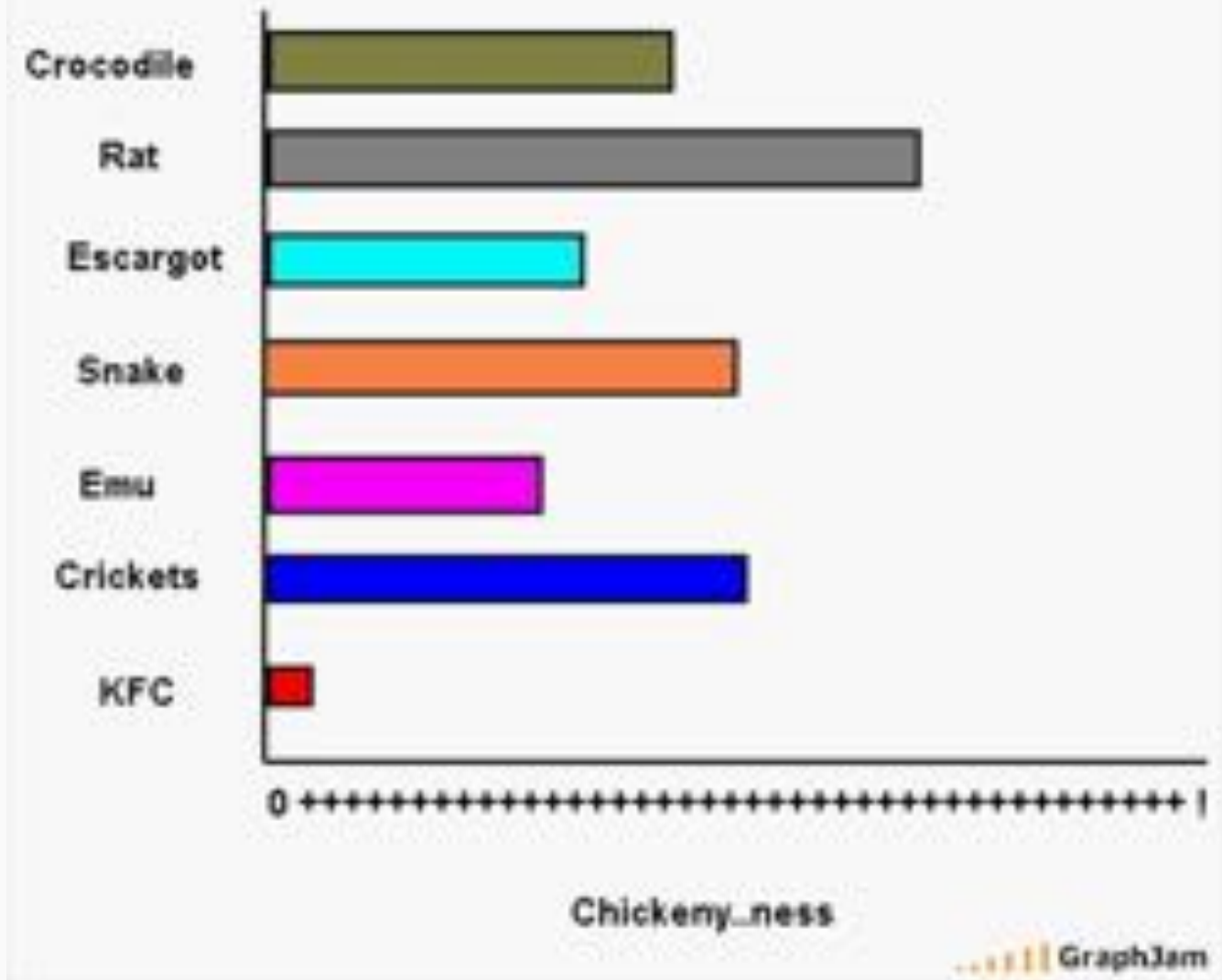
This book is sure to bring back memories to anyone who was in Korea at the time, and will be of interest to the descendants of Korean War Veterans, as it tells the story of the day to day army life and not just the battles.

This is an important part of the history of the Commonwealth and the United Nations and their efforts to maintain peace and order in the world, which does not always turn out the way it was intended. The efforts, suffering and sacrifices of the people involved in these events must not be forgotten.
