


Plenty more opportunities for involvement continue to present themselves thanks to

From the Team at WAUR

Thank you again for the kind offer to contribute to the Association's WAURior newsletter. WAUR as with all Army units is currently in a busy period conducting training across all of its areas.

CURRENT OPS

Soldier Training Team (STT) has recently finished a RAInf Module 2 in mid-June with 32 freshly minted RAInf soldiers completing the course. With minimal respite, STT got back into the training cycle and are now currently managing two Combat Arms Modules simultaneously and are looking to put through 52 soldiers into the Arms Corps' by the first week of August.

Driver Training Cell

As 2018 began, WAUR Driver Training Team (DTT) saw the recruitment of three more instructors. CPL Ed Coates, CPL Richard Murdoch and LCPL Andy Frantom. This has significantly increased the instructional capacity in this area from five instructors to eight. The experience and knowledge, in terms of years, in the DTT sits in addition to 150 years overall. Although seven of the instructional staff are Reservists, they continue to support each course whenever their civilian work permits.

From the beginning of this year DTT has conducted four Drivers' Courses. These range from two Assistant Driving Instructor Courses (5 days), to a G-Wagon Drivers Course and a Unimog Drivers Course, both sixteen days in duration. On average, each course has had between eight to twelve trainees, of which a high percentage are Reservists.

Driver Training is conducted out of the WAUR Transport compound at Karrakatta (Irwin Barracks) and Northam training. Although Perth has had significant rainfall this year, unfortunately Northam hasn't and the trainees haven't had the pleasure of 'exciting' cross country driving through mud and puddles. However, in saying that, the 'Bear Pit' was full of water and on one occasion whilst fording in a Unimog, water rose to the bottom of the windows on the doors of the Unimog. This impressed the trainees who found fording and wading a rewarding experience!

WAUR DTT continually strives to train professionally and produce successful courses with a high competency outcome. When not conducting courses, the team is improving on instructional training aids, keeping up to date with the latest and greatest, governance, and conducting familiarisation on vehicles.

Recruit Induction Company

In the three months since May 2018, WAUR's Regional Induction Company (RIC) has welcomed 55 new enlistees, including 51 PTE recruits and four OCDTs. The majority (35) of new enlistees are destined for RAINF, with the remainder spread across both combat and Combat Service Support roles. We have seen 33 soldiers complete their Part Time Recruit Course (PRTC) at Kapooka, and another 31 who have commenced and are soon due to finish PRTC.

15 PTE soldiers completed at least one of their required Initial Employment Training (IET) courses, with another 15 just days from completing their Combat Arms Module course.

Our 2018 Accelerated Training Option (ATO) program completed, with 31 soldiers

marched out to their gaining units, in addition to a further seven non-ATO soldiers who have marched out to 13 Bde in this time.

We have had recent successes with one member complete his Army Reserve Officer First Appointment Course continuum, graduating as a LT within RASIGs in July 2018, a soldier receiving the Champion Shot award and another soldier picking up Most Outstanding Soldier for her platoon at Kapooka.

The next three months are forecast to be an equally busy time for the WAUR RIC, and we look forward to progressing many more of our soldiers through their training.

RHQ

WAUR is currently concentrating on our Instructor Development to ensure that we are ready to Instruct on the new requirements that Army are implementing. The Army Combative Program (ACP) has drifted significantly from the Military Self Defence (MSD) program as it does not conform to the need of an Army. The current Combat Mindset that the ACP brings is an individual solder can survive an altercation with an enemy and retain their weapon.

Through further development and levels of training an individual soldier will be able to negate the enemy. The second part in the Combat Mindset is the new Range Practices (RP). Soldiers now have to make the assessment of what enemy is providing the most threat, prioritise those threats and engage them in chronological order. For example enemy will appear at 100, 200 and 300 metres at the same time, one will be moving. The individual is to assess which is the biggest threat to him/her and engage to neutralise the threat and rapidly engage the next threat. Terminology is also being amended – words like target are gone, and it is now referred to as the Enemy, headshots count (funny that) and the new enemy templates now replicates a human figure and weapon rather than the figure 11 target (enemy).

CPL Sewell from STT has recently returned from five days at 1 Recruit Training Battalion at Wagga Wagga, where he conducted the ACP and the ACP Instructors course. He also witnessed Platoon's in training and shadowed a Platoon for the Friday. A great experience for him and the professional rub that we are inculcating on our instructors at WAUR. As you read this newsletter we currently have CPL Sewell in Tully (QLD) conducting the Combat Shooting course with the Combat Training Centre-Live.

Additionally the Regiment is shaking up its structure and has developed a Training Cell into its orbat, with the intent to send this team around the county to visit Army centres of excellence and bring back tools and methodologies that we are aiming for. As a part of this process we are concentrating on the Reception, Staging, Onward Movement and Integration (RSO&I) of our new trainees. We are well advanced in this process and now a Unit member attends every enlistment ceremony at Defence Force Recruiting in ceremonial dress, setting the "What right looks like" culture immediately.

The CO and myself are away in early August to assist in the development of the new Part Time Recruit Course (PRTC) and will then be attending the RAInf Corps conference before returning back to the Unit.

FUTURE OPS

On the 16 August we are linking hands with the association to give some Legatees a helping hand. There are two houses planned currently, the activity will provide us with a great opportunity to be better people and soldiers, by giving back to the community, also seeing WAUR and Legacy work together and continue to strengthen our bond.

WAUR is also hosting a Military Skills Competition at Leeuwin, Irwin and the Northam Training area over the period 26 – 28 Oct 18. The weekend is designed to test the soldiers who have completed Kapooka and to test the OCDTs in an arduous activity. Every activity will be scored including their Basic Fitness Assessment and Shooting scores. The Association is invited to visit the Military Skills Competition on Saturday afternoon at Northam Training Area to observe the training and reminisce on some of the activities, no doubt you still talk about. Our OPS cell are looking at ordering rain for the Saturday. Sunday will see a family BBQ occur at Leeuwin Barracks, and you are all invited to come along. I would love to see the Association in good numbers and if possible give us a hand with the cooking of lunch. We will have a jumping castle for the kids, face painting and more. The annual awards of the Champion Instructor, Champion OCDT and the Champion Soldier will be announced with some honours and awards presented to close out the afternoon.





From Scott (Bart) Simpson:

As some of you may know, my wife, Sonja, has been through a lot over the last decade with cancer treatment. I am passing this on to all of you, and hope that you

can assist in any way.

[Editor: Sonja has overcome so much and in 2019 she will compete in the 5km run at the **World Transplant Games in the UK**. MudBlood Running has been formed to support this gigantic effort. This really is a story of triumph over adversity - in my eyes, Sonja is already a winner. Let's all get behind this member of the WAUR family!]

Sonja Simpson's Story in her own words...

"I was diagnosed in early 2008 with Hodgkins Lymphoma (Stage 4) - the cancer was present in nearly all my lymph nodes, as well as my liver, spleen and lower spine. After completing first line chemotherapy, the cancer remained, and I underwent 4 years of gruelling chemotherapy regimens, radiation and then an autologous stem cell transplant (my own cells). This culminated in more chemotherapy and then a donor stem cell transplant. I was given new bone marrow by an unknown international donor, and given a new chance at life. I can't even call it a second chance, as I had gone past the second, third and fourth chances already. If I was a cat lover, I would liken myself to one with their nine lives.

Following my bone marrow transplant, I was given the magical words any cancer survivor yearns to here, 'complete metabolic remission'. And this remission has held ever since. I have I have had complications along the way with graft v host disease and I am far from my original strength. But I am gaining ground every day.

Now in 2018, I am finding my feet again. An arrhythmia that caused several issues over the years seems to be holding itself in check and I am able to exercise again. I have now set myself a goal – to compete in the 5km running event at the World Transplant Games in the UK in 2019. And as such MUD Blood Running has been born.

My goal may seem little to some, but to me it is huge. To be able to run 5km in itself is more than I thought would be possible up until recently. But to compete and represent my country would be amazing.

We have chosen Australian Sports Foundation as my fundraising partner, and as such, all donations are tax deductible and go directly towards the cost of my training.

Eva is a delightful lady who was interred by the Japanese during World War II. She bears no bitterness to her former captors and in that respect, is an example to us all.

Eva's Late husband was a member of the RAAF and saw service in World War II, particularly in Japan as part of the Allied Occupation Force. He was a very interesting fellow and at the age of 16 years, he had gained his pilot's licence and, gained notoriety by "sailing" between Fremantle and Perth on roller skates, using an old Holland blind as a sail. He was a talented lapidary (polisher of gemstones).

Jake Hay is currently posted to WAUR. He was awarded the prestigious "Non-Indigenous Person of the Year for Contributions to Indigenous Affairs" Award at the East Kimberley Aboriginal Achievement Awards.

Jake has been living and working in Halls Creek Shire since 2012 as the Regional Program Coordinator for Youth, and has demonstrated considerable passion and commitment to delivering best-practice youth development in the region.

Jake's dedication is expressed through a youth development practice that consciously and deliberately empowers young people to build on their strengths, and be the best they can be. Since Jake commenced with the Shire, he has worked tirelessly to improve the conditions for young people in the Shire's communities.

With a client-centred, strength-based approach to Case Management for high-risk target groups with complex needs, and a commitment to youth participation principles Jake had facilitated the design, delivery and evaluation of a considerable array of programs and projects.

More recently, and while implementing the federal Attorney General's Youth Justice program, Jake has driven the establishment of a new youth centre and boxing gym in Halls Creek, an array of camps-on-country and other initiatives with local elders, theatre, film, leadership training and social entrepreneurship programs – all of which have made a large impact and improved conditions for local youth and the community that supports them.

Jake has worked hard to build the capacity of local youth and has brokered many fruitful and sustainable partnerships to that end. Engaging the local TAFE, Jake has co-developed and delivered community services and fitness training – ensuring that local young people were fitter, healthier and have the skills necessary to lead the design and delivery of youth engagement activities across the region.

Engaging Kimberley Community Alcohol and Drug Services (KCADS), Jake facilitated a theatre project that engaged at-risk youth in a community cultural development project that empowered participants to craft and share their own narratives to a broad spectrum of audiences. This theatre project culminated in the creation of a play written by the group entitled 'Night' about the struggles of growing up in a remote community. 'Night' was performed to an audience of over 200 at the Hilton Hotel in Perth, comprising entirely of young people from Halls Creek with zero acting experience - this was the first time in a city for some of the young actors.

The Western Australian Network for Alcohol and other Drug agencies recognised these efforts by bestowing Jake and the young men and women of Halls Creek with the award "Strong Spirit Strong Mind Awards 2016 - In-novative and Culturally Secure Aboriginal Alco-hol and other Drug Program" presented by the Mental Health Commissioner Tim Marney.

Most recently, Jake and his co-workers have been assisting young men and women in Halls Creek in reaching the physical and academic standards for entry into the Australian Defence Force. This project offers these young people a reliable and practical employment outcome, in a region where job opportunities are not plentiful.


Hi Jenks

This month, we spend 5 minutes with **David Harwood...**






Photo: David Harwood - coping well with the ravages of time... (note absence of razor)

When you were at school what did you want to be?


Out of school.



What is the last book you read? Steven Pinker's *Enlightenment Now*.



Snakebite Management update

Snake bite



Warning

DO NOT wash venom off the skin.

DO NOT cut the bitten area.

DO NOT try to suck venom out of wound:

DO NOT use a tourniquet.

DO NOT try to catch the enake.



In a medical emergency, call Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance.

- Signs are not always visible but may be a puncture marks, bleeding or scratches.
- Symptoms developing within an hour may include headache, impaired vision, nausea, vomiting, diannoea, breathing difficulties, drowsiness, faintness, problems speaking or swallowing.

What to do

- Follow DRSABCD.
- Reassure the patient and ask them not to move.
- Apply a broad crepe bandage over the bite site as soon as possible.
- Apply a pressure bandage (heavy crepe or elasticised roller bandage) starting just above the fingers or toes of the bitten limb, and move upwards on the limb as far as can be reached (include the snake bite). Apply firmly without stopping blood supply to the limb.
- Immobilise the bandaged limb with splints.
- Ensure the patient does not move.
- Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. Stay with the patient.
- Regularly check circulation in fingers or toes.
- Manage for shock.
- Ensure an ambulance has been called.







Review:

On 2 September 2008, in a valley in eastern Afghanistan, Trooper Mark Donaldson made a splitsecond decision that would change his life. His display of extraordinary courage that day saw him awarded the Victoria Cross for Australia, making him the first Australian to receive our highest award for bravery in wartime since Keith Payne in 1969.

Yet Mark's journey to those crucial moments in Afghanistan was almost as exceptional as the acts that led to his VC.

He was a rebellious child and teenager, even before the death of his father - a Vietnam veteran - when Mark and his brother were in their mid-teens. A few years later, their mother disappeared, presumed murdered. Her body has never been found.

Mark's decisions could have easily led him down another path, to a life of self-destructiveness and petty crime. But he chose a different road: the army. It proved to be his salvation and he found himself a natural soldier, progressing unerringly to the SAS, the peak of the Australian military.

From his turbulent early years to the stark realities of combat in the mountains and valleys of Afghanistan, Mark's book is the frank and compelling story of a man who turned his life around by sheer determination and strength of mind.
