Colonel Gene Pfeffer USAF (retired) is the Historian at the National Museum of WWII Aviation in Colorado Springs. He hails from St. Louis, MO., and earned degrees from St. Louis University, the University of Utah and Western New England College. He retired from the Air Force after 30 years of service in the areas of weather, space operations, and research and development. He's a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College and the Air War College. His assignments include Cape Canaveral, Florida; Scott AFB, IL; RAF Orfordness, UK; RAF Bentwaters-Woodbridge, UK; Hanscom AFB, MA; the Pentagon, Washington, DC; and Peterson AFB, CO. After his military service,

Gene spent 12 years in the aerospace industry. He's also taught courses at several colleges. Being a child of the WWII era, Gene has always found the war a fascinating subject. He has read and studied extensively about the war and has traveled to many of the key battle sites of the conflict. He has authored articles on important aspects of the war including the Normandy invasion, the air war over Europe, and the breaking of the German Enigma codes. He's a winner of the Air Force Historical Society award for air power research. As the museum's historian he's researched the 3,000 artifacts the museum holds. He's a frequent contributor to the museum's newsletter about the various displays in the museum.
