Early Learning & Family Resource Center (ELF)

ELF is a lending library that provides child development resources in English, Spanish, and Braille that parents and providers can use to enhance the early care and education of young children. A variety of children's books, videos, topic resource books, theme kits, toys and other resources are available for checkout to ELF members. ELF also offers in-person Story Time sessions every Wednesday. Stories are also posted to our YouTube channel, @ColumbusCountySmartStart.

of teachers and parents surveyed indicated a way the toys and materials helped them with their children.

IMPACT

- **157** adult utilizations of ELF resources
- **285** children attendance at Story Times
- **485** visits made to the ELF
- **5,710** YouTube views of ELF Story Times

We love and appreciate the ELF! Thank you for this unique and quality learning environment!"

"I am a grandmother of a 1 year old. Since attending ELF, he is excited when I tell him the morning we leave. He recognizes the teachers' names, shows excitement and has learned to sit in a chair during Story Time. He is learning social skills he wouldn't be exposed to otherwise. We need this program in Columbus County. Thank you!"

This Smart Start funded project helps licensed childcare programs increase the level of star-rated licensure and the level of provider education by providing free trainings and workshops as well as professional development services for facilities that complete an Educational Facility Plan.

Teachers said:

"Facilitating content that is effective and engaging can sometimes be a hard task to achieve when communicating to both virtual and in-person groups at the same time but Ms. Williams achieved this outstandingly."

IMPACT

- **58** teachers attended quality-related workshops
- **13** quality-related workshops were conducted
- **71** in-person visits were made to take information or materials to child care facilities

WAGE\$

The Child Care WAGE\$ Project is an education-based salary supplement program for teachers, directors and family child care home providers. Because these supplements reward teacher education and continuity of care, children ages birth to five benefit from more stable relationships with better educated teachers. WAGE\$ provides teachers with compensation that helps build quality. Through graduated supplements, the program helps decrease turnover and encourages the continued educational pursuits of the child care workforce.

WAGE\$ targets three factors associated with teacher quality:

- **Education**
- **Retention**
- **Compensation**

"WAGE\$ is a wonderful program. It helps staff gain the knowledge they need in the classroom to do their jobs the right way and address the developmental needs of the children."



IMPACT

- **100%** of participants said the WAGE\$ supplement encourages them to stay with their current program
- **93%** Of participants said WAGE\$ is an incentive for them to seek additional education and/or it helps make pursuing coursework more financially feasible.
- **97%** of participants said the WAGE\$ supplement helps them to provide more resources for their program or classroom.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library



Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is funded by Smart Start and provides books to children living in Columbus County. Each month, children ages birth to 5 who are registered for the program receive a brand new book mailed directly to their homes, at no charge to the family.

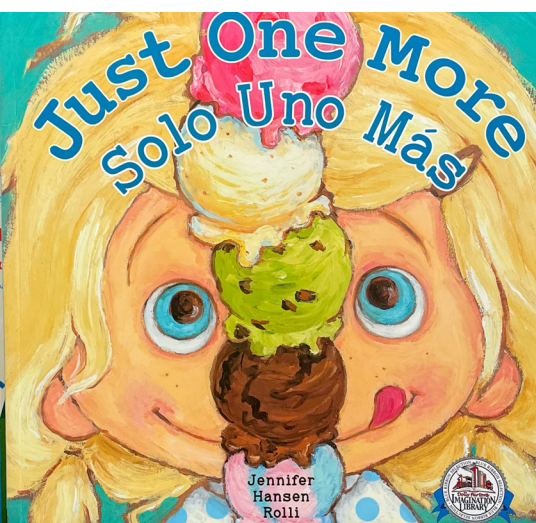


Bilingual Books Available

"I am so grateful for the Dolly Parton Imagination books for my children."

This mother shared photos of her 3-year-old daughter reading Imagination Library books to her 6-month-old brother. She said that her daughter has developed a love of reading at a very early age, and she attributes that to the Imagination Library books she always reads to her.

The books are bilingual, which helps Latino parents like her who are not fluent in English to read to their children.



Raising A Reader

Raising A Reader helps early childhood educators work with families to build and maintain the home-based language & literacy experiences young children need for academic success by distributing high-quality children's literature into homes each week. Families also build connections to libraries that result in lasting family literacy habits and improved outcomes for children.

"I know what it feels like to be unsure, to feel out of place, and to not always see yourself reflected in your school or community. That's why I work to be that bridge for others. I want to create spaces where families feel welcomed, respected, and supported—because when families are engaged, students succeed. Smart Start Subsidy

This scholarship program provides assistance with the cost of child care to qualified parents with children ages birth to five.

Early Parenthood Program



IMPACT

- **16** families served by Parents As Teachers
- **243** personal/home visits conducted
- **20** home visits received per participant, on average
- **12** Group Connections sessions held

EPP provides support and resources to young women ages 12-19 who are pregnant or parenting, helping them to stay enrolled in school and graduate; receive access to prenatal resources, and develop parenting skills. Smart Start funds the Parents As Teachers curriculum for this project.



Moms said:

"I'm so thankful for my participation in EPP. I was so nervous about becoming a mom. Through participating in home visits, I have learned about the baby's development and what to expect during pregnancy. Thanks for your support."

"The program has helped me in so many ways, a few being the mental, emotional, and physical support. Just receiving phone calls asking how I was doing had meant a lot. Then giving me stuff to look forward to as in Christmas that meant a lot to me because no one else got me anything even though it was for my baby. I was very appreciative. And last but not least, you all helping with diapers and a car seat and [other items] has helped me out so much. Y'all helped with things no one else has."

Expectant mothers and children ages birth to 5 who are not eligible for Medicaid-reimbursable transportation can be transported to and from medical appointments free of charge.

IMPACT

- **33** local trips made
- **12** out-of-county trips made
- **100%** of non-Medicaid children & pregnant mothers requesting transportation to medical appointments received transportation.

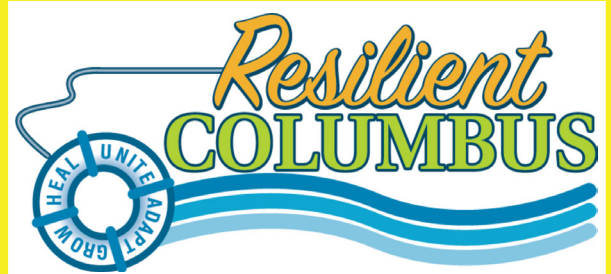

What participants learned:

- "Understanding how my child thinks"
- "Intervene less in independent play"
- "About how my child processes anger"
- "Kids learn through trial & error"
- "Understanding & applying a better response to my child's behaviors"
- "The calm box idea"

**CHAMPIONS
FOR LITERACY**

This eight-year-old was one of two students who logged the most books in their literacy passport during summer reading camp at Edgewood Elementary School. He also demonstrated the most improvement on his reading assessment and thus was awarded a new bicycle.



Sports Around the World Summer Reading Adventure was made possible through the Champions for Literacy Grant, which was funded by International Paper. This project was implemented as part of Edgewood Elementary's summer reading camp for students. During the camp, students read books about and played games of other cultures. The program challenged students to read and log into a "literacy passport" as many books as they could read.

86%

of students had increased their reading scores by the end of the program

100%

of students were promoted to the next grade

77%

of parents surveyed said they had noticed a difference in their child's ability or interest in reading after the program.

"What he enjoyed the most was being encouraged to read books. He had told me that he had to read books because it was going to help him learn, and he knew that the more he read, the more chance he had for [winning] a bicycle. He would come home and he would want to read to us like y'all read to them."
