WHAT DID THE CLIENT LOVE ABOUT THE HOUSE? WHAT DID THEY WANT TO CHANGE?

The detached home is on a big plot with south-facing garden but it was dated. Our clients, Emily and Jig Ramji weren't excited about their original architect's plans for a contemporary rear extension.

HOW DID YOU COME TO BE INVOLVED?

Emily searched for design inspiration with a more traditional feel and liked our work on Instagram. For me, the obvious solution was to build the extension to the side — there was plenty of space and they wouldn't lose too much of their garden.

WOULD YOU SAY YOU HAVE A SIGNATURE STYLE? Our style leans towards the traditional as we believe classic design is timeless and long-lasting. That said, although our projects sprout from the same seed, the results are quite different. We work with clients to find the best materials and schemes to suit their home and design all bespoke joinery for a personal touch.

WHAT WAS THE CLIENTS' BRIEF TO YOU?

Emily and Jig wanted a beautiful home with character that they could comfortably live in with their two young children and dog. A big priority was a large open-plan kitchen-dining-living room and a main bedroom with a large bathroom and walk-in dressing room.

HOW DID YOU ACHIEVE THIS? We're an

architecture, interior design and project management studio so we took the project from conception to completion. Our design focused on a traditional exterior and a better flow to the floor plan. The double-storey side extension is 6.5m wide with dormer windows. Set

back from the house, it looks like part of the original architecture. The new kitchen here flows into eating and relaxing areas while upstairs is now a beautiful main suite with vaulted ceilings.

HOW DID YOU INTRODUCE A CLASSIC STYLE TO THE 1970S HOUSE? We added decorative cornices, profiled architraves, skirtings and ceiling roses as well as bespoke panelling and joinery. Emily had a clear vision and chose a colour palette based on a family of neutrals for a subtle yet clegant and

smart finish. She also added pops of colour pink and green shades. WHAT WAS THE MOST SATISFYING PART OF THE PROJECT? I love the different ideas our clients brought to the table and working with them to find the right fit for their home. Here, we worked with Emily and Jig to create a timeless look
