

'We renovated a listed farmhouse in a nearby village,' says Tamsin.

amsin and Paul Clarke love a project and can't help but feel the urge to move every six or seven years - they've owned Victorian houses in London, a Georgian house in Ramsgate and sold a listed farmhouse in East Sussex to buy this barn. 'We can't imagine moving to a modern property because so much of our belongings are antique, vintage or repurposed - they're our passion,' says Tamsin. 'We loved the village we were in,

but wanted more outdoor space for our sons, Zach, now 14, and Jake, 10.'

A local barn proved the ideal match with five bedrooms, a swimming pool, outbuildings and a two-acre paddock. Tamsin could continue commuting to London, where at the time she co-owned an events agency. However, the couple had reservations. 'Although the old beams were incredible, thick timber posts segregated rooms and the beauty of the oak was lost in the busy decoration,' Tamsin recalls. 'Three of the bedrooms were located downstairs and the huge sitting room was on the first floor.'

After pondering the purchase, the couple decided the glorious oak barn and all the space were just too good to pass by. For a few years, they lived with everything as it was while they concentrated on family and worked out what they wanted to change.

'One of the villagers told us he used to milk the cows here,' says Tamsin. 'We

wanted to embrace the barn's heritage, put the focus back on the oak beams and make it more like a home for us.'

Tamsin and Paul made plans to get rid of the faux French fireplaces, pink carpets and modernise the dated decoration. They took down a wall to make the dining room part of the kitchen, and the upstairs bathroom became another bedroom. They decided to keep the large first-floor sitting room where it was. 'Beneath the vaulted ceiling, it's the dramatic space you expect to see in a barn and it felt wrong to chop

up the room with internal walls to make bedrooms, and it would have been impractical as the kitchen,' Tamsin explains.

The couple pared back decoration to bring light into their home. And they were conscious about repurposing as much as they could, reusing pieces they had, as well as recent second-hand buys.

'The barn has amazing bones and the space absorbs us and guests with ease,' says Tamsin. 'Despite this, the itch to move again is back and we're keeping our eye out for the next project.'
