






love everything about the Sixties,' declares Melanie Sramek Bennett. It's a passion that goes back to her teenage years when she'd scour charity shops for vintage clothes, inspired by her parents' glamorous lifestyle during this era. 'My mum and dad were figure skaters in the touring Holiday on Ice show, and I grew up surrounded by their colourful costumes, big hair and make-up,' she recalls. 'So when my husband Darren and I decided to move to get more space, we looked for a Sixties house where I'd be able to max out the interiors in a fusion of my favourite colours and a crisp Scandi style.'

However, houses of this age are few and far between in Hove. A chalet caught their eye but they didn't know the area and nearly disregarded it. But on first viewing, they loved the proportions, the large garden - and the potential to extend. It had been done up inexpensively to sell, so the family were able to move in while they made plans for its transformation.


'The goal was to create a contemporary extension, incorporating a large living space for hosting parties and hiring out for location shoots to help fund the project,' says Mel. 'And we wanted bigger bedrooms because the existing ones had low, pitched ceilings.' The couple worked on the layout themselves and then found an architect to draw up the final plans. Getting planning permission, though, became a three year battle. 'The local authority were against the double storey, saying it \rightarrow

clashed with the low chalet roof line and wasn't in keeping with houses in the area. We went back to them three times and in the end agreed to a single storey extension and extending the existing rear dormer to make the bedrooms more habitable,' Mel recalls. 'Now, it doesn't feel like a compromise because we're very happy here.'

Elsewhere, the garage had already been converted, with an office space and a bedroom above that the couple decided to turn into a larger family bathroom. A downstairs shower absorbed space from the old dining room, while the original kitchen became the utility room off the new extension.

While the renovations got underway, the family rented elsewhere and Mel got to planning the interiors. 'I gravitate towards mid-century and Sixties designs mixed with minimal contemporary Scandi and solid, strong colours,' she says. 'I like colourful art and accessories that aren't afraid to stand out and say something.' One of Mel's prized pieces is the Italian Sixties sofa with a modular frame that she found on a German \Rightarrow



vintage site and had shipped over. On the other side of the extension, the pale grey kitchen and white composite worktop – along with the white plywood dining table – have a much simpler look. 'At first, I wanted a yellow kitchen,' admits Mel, 'but Darren talked me round and he was right. I needed the neutral base so I could layer in the mash up of colour in pieces of art and furniture.'

Subtle grey walls and cork flooring play an important supporting role too, drawing the eye up to the plywood-clad ceiling and keeping the focus on the artworks. Upstairs, colour blocking defines the rooms. 'I'm always looking for ways to use leftover paint, as it completely changes how a room feels,' explains Mel. 'I like asymmetrical design, things that are slightly off, which is why I went for angles on the bedroom walls and sometimes hang art off centre.'

Mel spotted a trio of yellow vintage lecture chairs in a local shop and, in Slovakia, sourced two mid century armchairs by Czech Republic designer Jaroslav Smidek. 'My dad's from the Czech Republic and has

a base there,' Mel explains. 'It was cheaper to buy the chairs and ship them to him and have his friend with a van bring them over.'

Keeping costs down was a priority for Mel. A´Tom Raffield light is an imperfect model bought from Ebay and her mum upholstered some of the chairs. The pendants above the dining table $-\pounds_2$ 0 each in a sale – have been sprayed grey and finished with painted rims to match the colourful flexes above. And she was delighted to find a selection of graphic prints for \pounds_5 each at Brighton & Hove's Phoenix Gallery.

This project has taught me that you don't need to spend a lot of money to make your home look good, and creative solutions make the outcome even more satisfying, concludes Mel. 'We're all really happy here and what's great about this house is that it has no limitations, and I can move pieces of furniture and artworks around really easily. It's worked brilliantly for location shoots but, best of all, being able to refresh the look satisfies my itch to move and start again.'


