HOW DID THE CLIENTS FIND

YOU? The holiday cottage in the Lake District had been a dream of theirs for a long time. They live in the Middle East and return several times a year to visit family and friends. My client found me online and liked my interiors approach to period properties — preserving the traditional and bringing in a calm, contemporary style.

WHAT WAS THEIR BRIEF? The couple

what was their brief? The couple wanted the property to reflect its Lake District location and were open to ideas. It's a long journey for them to get here so it was important they instantly felt at home. They're active, outdoorsy people so the home needed to be practical, too.

HOW DID YOU COMBINE TRADITIONAL AND MODERN

LOOKS? I used materials that reflect the heritage of the cottage. We replaced the plastic windows with timber sash, restored fireplaces, fitted a Shaker kitchen, wall panelling and oak herringbone flooring. The contemporary elements are recognisable in things like the KitKat splashback, gold veined marble work surfaces, curved sitting room furniture and textured fabrics.

WHERE DID YOU FIND INSPIRATION FOR THE COLOUR

SCHEME? I wanted the inside to echo the colours seen outside – the fells, mountains, big

WHICH ROOM WAS MOST IMPORTANT TO YOUR CLIENTS?

The couple and their daughter looked forward to spending evenings in the sitting room in front of the fire after a long hike or being out on the water. There needed to be enough seating for the family


