





## AT HOME WITH

t the heart of Nicola Casperson's 1800s cottage are the original thick stone walls, exposed beams and slate floor. But she's given these authentic features an update with soothing grey decoration and smart, tactile fabrics that evoke the laid-back luxury of a boutique hotel.

'While renovating, I had an old French farmhouse in mind, inspired by Soho Farmhouse and the Artist Residence hotels,' explains Nicola, an interior designer. 'I love a rustic-luxury look that blends comfortable living with a sense of pampering.'

After 17 years living in London, Nicola found the city had lost its shine and decided to look for a place in Cornwall to retreat to at weekends. Her parents had owned a holiday house in North Cornwall, and she had happy memories of the area.

'My house search was niche. I looked at properties in five villages - places we used to visit and I knew well,' she says. 'I didn't want to be too remote as the coast can be quite bleak in winter, so it was about finding a cottage in a village with a community and a pub.' It took Nicola two years to find what she was looking for, and when she did it was a property that needed her creative vision to turn it into a comfortable home.

'The two-bedroom cottage was built pre-1840s. It was unattractive - a pebble-dash extension with a flat roof, uPVC windows, magnolia decoration and no >


traditional features,' she says. 'But the village location was perfect, plus there were good connections to Exeter and Newquay for me to travel back to London.'

Despite the lack of character, the condition of the cottage was bearable, so Nicola spent the first two years visiting while saving up to renovate. In 2018, she put in a planning application to extend over the kitchen to add a third bedroom and a bathroom. The design wasn't well received,' she says. 'After some discussion, it was agreed I could partially extend to fit in a bathroom, but not another bedroom. In hindsight, it's a better design as upstairs now balances with the space downstairs. I was also able to put a pitched roof over the kitchen, which adds volume and light.'

During the renovations, Nicola reintroduced the character you'd expect to see in a Cornish cottage - wood-panelled internal doors with mortise-and-tenon joints, wooden casement windows and a new external door. 'I also exposed original roof rafters in the upstairs rooms, added tongue-and-groove panels in bedrooms and bathrooms, and used reclaimed scaffolding boards for the staircase panelling,' she says.

Keen to bring a sense of space and unity, Nicola decorated in Farrow & Ball's Cornforth White and Strong White throughout, and chose neutral linens and cottons by Annie Sloan, Clarke & Clarke and Ian Mankin for blinds and cushions. 'I wanted the >

Visit... 'The National Trust's Lanhydrock House (nationaltrust.org. uk), a late-Victorian country property and estate where we enjoy walking the dogs. We also like going to north coast beaches at Daymer Bay, Harlyn Bay and Porthcothan.

Shop at... 'St Kew Farmshop & Cafe (@stkewfarmshop) near Wadebridge, serves the perfect breakfast and the best coffee. It's also a great place to pick up homewares, like local artwork and St Eval candles. They also sell local produce and Rock Gin made in our village.'

Go for a meal at ... 'St Tudy Inn (emilyscottfood.com), in St Tudy, our local pub and restaurant, right on our doorstep, that's owned and managed by local chef, Emily Scott, who makes the most amazing meals using seasonal ingredients.'

cottage to look traditional and feel relaxed and cosy with a refined elegance, much like a boutique hotel,' says Nicola. 'Overall, the rooms have a calming base and I've given them a rustic or industrial edge so that they don't look too twee.'

Black metal wall lights dot the living room and factory pendants hang in the bedrooms. The kitchen has a concrete worktop, distressed wood cupboards and a zinc-topped dining table. 'I'll always go vintage first, but if it's out of my budget, or I can't find something specific, then I'll buy new,' says Nicola. 'For example, the original factory pendants were easy to find as Mayfly Vintage had plenty. But I couldn't source matching vintage wall lights for the sitting room, so I ended up buying them new.'

Transforming the garden was last on the list. In 2019, Nicola installed slate paving to create a generous dining and social space, with flowerbeds around the perimeter. As the project came to an end, she realised she didn't want to live in London any more. Now she's moved here full-time with her partner, Oliver, and dogs, Milly and Florence.

'The cottage is so lovely, especially in summer when the doors are open to the garden. It's like having another room,' she says. 'I love being able to hop in the car after work and go to the beach for a swim. It's been a refreshing move. I'm so happy here.'
