ith a flair for the eclectic and a love of classic design, interior designer Jo Sullivan finds that her work and home life can often overlap. 'I might have a mirror in my own house that I know is perfect for a client's project, or come across a new lamp while out sourcing and decide it's actually ideal for me,' explains Jo. 'Textiles are my true passion though. My house is filled with colour and pattern – I have no rules and I'm not much of a planner, so my taste is always instinctive.'

Jo and husband Stephen fell in love with the original house that was to become the site of their new home for its large plot, location and established garden, rather than the actual property. Reaching out to Tom Kirby from Drøme Architects, it soon became clear that extending the house wasn't going to give the couple the home they really wanted. 'It's an awkward sloping site, and we wanted to make the most of the garden views as we have some beautiful trees and plants,' recalls Jo.

So Jo and Stephen found themselves embarking on a self-build project. 'We ended up digging down to make a basement and putting the main kitchen-living space on the first floor. I'm a real foodie, so a sociable, openplan layout was important to mc,' says Jo.

As a nod to the original 1960s property, the exterior of the new house was designed with a modern-retro look.

Tlike a minimal palette with a blank-canvas backdrop, so the walls are mostly white, with wood flooring and





neutral furniture,' explains Jo. Tbring personality through with textiles, art and ceramics. Hove clashing patterns and prints, but I'm also drawn to the calmness of blues and teals, with a shot of hot pink or orange.'

It was also important to Jo to have a home that wouldn't date, so over the years she's invested in classic pieces of furniture that can be passed on, which she advises her clients to do, too. 'My view is that if you're going to spend a lot of money on something, then you should avoid the trends and choose designs that will last,' she says.

One of Jo's first finds was an antique chair that she rescued from a skip over 20 years ago when she was a fashion and textiles student. 'My home has always meant a lot to me – even as a student 1 cared about living in a nice place,' she explains. 'Tve reupholstered this chair a few times over the years, and it's currently in my living room.' And in a similar vein, an early wage packet from Jo's first job went on an original Kartell Louis Ghost chair, which is now in daughter Bella's bedroom.

It was while working as an embroiderer for a New York studio that Jos appreciation of delicate fabrics began, while her travels across the world working as a fashion and homewares buyer sparked a love of Eastern styles. 'My eye is still drawn this way,' she says. 'I'd often pack ceramics or art into my suitcase and bring them back, and it's the →





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same when we're on holiday. I'll go for an early morning run to do a recce for an interesting homeware shop or hidden furniture store that I can visit later. All our treasured pieces have moved with us over the years.

Although Jo now lives in a modern house, she loves period properties too, so it's no surprise to see a mix of old and new in her home. Teaming antiques with new pieces breathes life into a room and adds warmth and individuality, she says. For example, in our en suite, I've used antique mirrors against walls of tiles from Topps Tiles. While in the living room, a Victorian display cabinet houses new ceramics I got in Sri Lanka and India.

Jo rebuffs interior 'themes', instead choosing to layer thematic ideas in one space. Daughter Bella's bedroom hints towards a traditional feminine scheme, but a bold pink geometric fabric headboard against a blue paisley wallpaper is both modern and Eastern-inspired. Above, a statement chandelier strikes a contemporary note.

Tsee an idea in my head and it just clicks, says Jo. T suppose I have an eclectic confidence in colour choices and prints, and particularly love the contrast of lines and curves. For example, I already had the pink curl print cushions now in our bedroom, and thought they worked well with the ikat cushions I had made for the bed.'

With an unrelenting eye for detail, Jo is always picking up new pieces for her home and switching out others – but will never part ways with her most treasured possessions, which now make up the family's history.

Tjust love rearranging and reorganising our things, as I find it really therapeutic and relaxing – even as a child I'd change my bedroom around! she says. 'My interiors have organically evolved, and are still evolving – because that reflects who we are, how we live and the journey we've been on. I'm a firm believer that a successful project is when you walk into a home and understand who lives here – I never take our home for granted.
