


uying a house backing on to a lagoon by Shoreham Beach in West Sussex was the ideal opportunity for builder and property developer Andy Lock, 36, to maximise the plot's potential and sell on. He couldn't have foreseen he would soon get together with his partner Laura Turner, 34, and that they would make it their home. I met Laura in February 2017, shortly after buying the property. She paid little attention to the house because it was just one of my jobs,' says Andy. 'But later, as the project began to take shape, we realised we'd become emotionally invested in it.'

The late-1990s house that Andy bought made poor use of the stepped site, which runs right up to the old sea wall that surrounds the lagoon. The ground floor was taken up with a garage and office, while all the living spaces were on the first floor, which was level with the waterside garden at the back.

Andy toyed with a few different ideas to make better use of the plot, including adding another storey to the building, knocking it down and constructing a pair of semi-detached homes, or designing a new house using the original foundations. 'I couldn't reclaim the VAT if I renovated the house. So I drew up one design for a contemporary home, and another for the semi-detached >>>

houses as a back-up plan,' says Andy. 'At a pre-planning meeting I was pleased the authority preferred the house.'

Andy took inspiration from homes that had sold well in the area, particularly the materials that had been used on some stylish new-builds along the beach. 'I settled on a stacked box design with a flat roof,' he says. 'Arranged over three floors, it captures the views, while a mix of double-storey glazing, wood cladding and render give it a contemporary look.'

He based the layout around the original floor levels so the elevated living room is in line with the back garden. A new second storey contains the bedrooms and bathrooms, with the ground level set aside for a garage, study and shower room. A solar array on the roof generates electricity.


In summer 2017 he asked an architect to prepare the drawings for his planning application and, by October, he had gained consent. Andy runs a construction company with his father, but decided to take on the project himself, demolishing the old house in January 2018. By March he'd moved to nearby Hove with Laura, who is a sales director for a ski company, and started building the ground floor. Mostly he worked alone, only bringing in experts when they were required. 'I'm glad I had the steelwork erected by a contractor as there was a mistake and it was their responsibility to come back and sort it out,' he says.

Andy took the build in his stride until autumn when he felt the pressure to finish the roof before winter set in. With narrow access on both sides, and without wanting the expense of hiring a crane to lift materials over the house, he made a winch platform to lift the heavy rolls of rubber roofing and a 120kg rooflight into place.

Over the Christmas period the exterior walls were rendered by specialists, but an unexpected burst of bad weather washed off the silicone topcoat. 'It was no one's fault, so I paid for the materials and they redid the work free of charge,' Andy explains.


March 2019 brought good news and bad news: the couple got engaged, but Laura slipped a disc and Andy took a month off to care for her. It was at this point that she began to see the house in a different light. I came to the site one day and it suddenly occurred to me. We wanted to start a family and I began to picture what life would be like living on the lagoon,' she says.


LEFT Floor-to-ceiling glazing in the dining area draws plenty of natural light through the room

RIGHT A supporting pillar separates the kitchen from the seating area and forms part of the floating staircase


From then on, Laura took an interest in the interiors, opening up the staircase between the first and second floors, making the utility room big enough for a washing machine, and adding more space to the main bedroom's walk-in wardrobe. 'We moved in during March 2020 without a kitchen or hot water and ordered the kitchen just before the shops had to close due to the pandemic,' Laura explains. 'When I became pregnant, Andy had a new deadline – to finish the house in time for baby Rolan's arrival in December 2020.'


