## Amazing makeovers

# 'We turned a bedroom into a decadent bathroom'

Blue panelling and a dusky pink tub set the tone for this transformation

The old bathroom was separate from the loo, and freezing cold because of a hole in the wall. There was a small bath with a shower over the top that dribbled water and

was horrible to use.



There did you begin?
The house was a wreck but we lived here for a year while we worked out how best to use the space.
The bathroom project was in phase one when we re-jigged the layout of the first floor and converted the loft. We also replaced the pipes to improve the water flow and pressure.

#### A bedroom very nearly had to be sacrificed...

We didn't have to in the end though – we began with four bedrooms and finished with four! Our youngest daughter had been using the smallest one but it was dark with a high window – perfect for a decent-sized bathroom with privacy. We converted the loft to create bedrooms for the girls and decided we could also afford to turn one of the other bedrooms into our dressing room. The old bathroom and toilet became our ensuite.

#### What were you hoping to achieve the most?

To be able to come in here in the evenings, light some candles and relax. I was aiming for it to be luxurious rather than practical, and enjoyable for guests too, as it's next to the guest bedroom.



#### How did you decide on the look?

I love dark blue and pink together and was obsessed with a Pinterest image of a bathroom with bold floor tiles, a pink bath and wood panelling. The patterned floor tiles came first and I had my heart set on a cast-iron rolltop bath. Our builders made the wall panelling, which is painted in Farrow & Ball's Inchyra Blue to tie in with our bedroom.

#### Any other elements to fit in?

We visited CP Hart's huge showroom in London's Waterloo and they helped us with the layout. Below the high window was the ideal place to put the bath with enough space on the opposite wall for a separate shower. I spent ages looking for a vanity unit and found one at Lusso Stone – it's the first thing you see when you come into the room, which is much better than staring at a loo!

### Did the scheme turn out as you expected?

My comfort zone is decorating in light neutrals, so I was nervous to use dark blue but it was the best decision. The depth of colour creates a cocooning effect – perfect for a candlelit bath – and it completely lives up to the Pinterest photo.
