Rosie loves her colourful bedroom – and so do I!'

Heather Craig's daughter **Rosie** asked for a rainbow bedroom, so Heather mixed pinks, yellows and greens to create a scheme that shows off her love of bold shades



eather Craig grew up in Dunfermline and had always hoped she might move back there with her husband, Brian, and their children, Rosie and Olive. Although not especially unhappy in their previous home, this traditional house in Heather's hometown appealed to her, and Brian was pleased it had already been extended. The interior wasn't adventurous enough for Heather's love of colour, though, so the couple made plans to decorate.

The task turned into a bigger job than expected, however, particularly in Rosie's room. It turned out that the existing décor was hiding a problem. 'After we moved in, we realised there was more work needed than we'd anticipated. The walls were rough and there was Artex on the ceilings,' says Heather. 'Although Rosie's bedroom was freshly painted, when the walls began to discolour, we realised it had been done to cover up a damp problem.'

My style tips

PLAY WITH PAINT Carry a painted wall design onto furniture as well – the wardrobe wasn't in great condition, so Brian suggested we paint scallops on it, like the walls. It's protected with Polyvine Decorators Varnish in matt.

THINK AHEAD For long-lasting style, find rugs you can stick in the wash, and choose wall shades with longevity. If Rosie decides to move away from bright accessories when she's older, the pink walls will still work.

BALANCE OUT BRIGHTS I like combining three colours that I can repeat in the room, but they need to be balanced. Pink is the base, yellow is the accent, and I also added splashes of green.

DIY details can be found in every corner: Heather crocheted the blanket following a YouTube tutorial and customised IKEA's Kallax shelf. 'At £35, it's such a bargain,' she says. 'I made mine look different with yellow hairpin legs and a yellow box to fit in with my scheme'

Heather knew Rosie wanted a colourful bedroom, so used the time spent sorting out the damp issue to think about how she was going to decorate and furnish the room in Rosie's favoured bright palette.

THE PROJECT

Heather's first ideas combined blush pink and pale grey, but she soon realised these weren't right for Rosie's room. 'Tve always loved pink – I wear a lot of it and my childhood bedroom was pink,' she says. 'But when I painted samples on the walls, the colours looked too soft, sophisticated and washed out in the west-facing room, which doesn't get a lot of light until the afternoon.'

So, Heather asked Rosie for ideas. 'She likes unicorns, pink and bright colours, but when I asked her which she preferred she said she wanted all of them! So, I followed a rainbow theme and got as many colours

into her room as possible without making it look too busy.'

WHAT WE DID

Heather turned to Instagram for inspiration, and set-up an account of her own (@heatherrosicolivehome) to share her progress, too. She followed #girlsroominspo for colour ideas, and settled on three that work together: Farrow & Ball's Nancy's Blushes, a rosy pink; Citron, a warm yellow; and Arsenic, a lively green shade. 'Rosic wanted a cheerful, colourful room, and I really wanted the scallops around the walls,' says Heather. 'I was inspired after seeing them on @the.hectic.eelectic and @jayne.s.davies and decided to have a go myself.'

Before Heather and Brian could begin decorating, though, they had to deal with the
