





ara and Neil Austin have always lived in period properties and renovated their way up the property ladder in London from a flat to a terrace.

However, when they decided to upsize again for their boys, Felix, now nine, and Ralph, six, they felt the pull back to their roots in Northern Ireland. 'I didn't want to be a slave to a bigger mortgage and wanted to spend more time with my children,' says Sara, an interiors stylist and podcast host. 'We were keen to find a period house on the coast we could renovate within easy reach of Belfast.'

Sara and Neil found a double-fronted Victorian house with original fireplaces, parquet flooring, stained-glass windows and a tiled porch. Though it was dated, it had been structurally well maintained and was within walking distance of a beach and coastal paths, yet a short drive from the city. 'As a stylist, small details really matter to me and so I instantly loved the heavy old doors and the weighty feel of the handles in my hand,' Sara recalls. 'We love being able to pop down to the sea where we

might spot scals or see people fishing. It's the lifestyle we want for our boys' childhood.'

The house had plenty of space but the ground floor layout needed reworking. A neglected room in the middle of the property had been the original kitchen and Sara turned this into a snug. A dated kitchen was in one of the front reception rooms. 'It felt wrong because of the lovely, curved bay window and fireplace and the flow of the house didn't feel right,' she says. 'I made this the dining room instead as the light's good in here and I often style and photograph tablescapes in here for clients, too.'

A 1990s extension sat alongside an overly large utility room so the couple knocked through to create a family kitchen-diner with a smaller laundry room. Sara added shutters to conceal the uPVC windows, replaced the bathroom and reinstated the fireplace in their bedroom. The adjoining room became a walk-in wardrobe and en suite.

With a background of 20 years in fashion for high street brands, Sara has created interiors that don't necessarily follow trends but are

inspired by the environment around them and the house itself. 'The light here is different to London,' she says. 'We get many days when skies are heavy and I embraced that with moody, dark tones. They're not crisp, which goes well with the worn edges of the old house and the high ceilings, which can handle the depth of colour.'

The ground floor decor sits mostly within a palette of greens and browns, which Sara considers unconventionally neutral. Wallpaper prints and fabrics energise rooms. 'It's fun to bring in pattern and I love the clean aesthetic of stripes on stripes with a touch of floral,' she says.

At Christmas, the house looks especially festive and Sara uses her quilted stockings, pretty home-made bows from offcuts, as well as garlands of dried orange slices and wreaths made with local foliage. 'I like the traditional earthiness of making things, it's very satisfying,' she says. 'Christmas here is very different to London — we'll spend it with family and go down to the beach where the boys can run riot and climb the rocks. This is a good life.' *
