A priority for Noel Pittman when she bought this home in LA was the garden, but she brought the beauty of the great outdoors inside too

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'My vision was to create timeless spaces grounded in tradition to honour the Spanish Revival architecture yet still feel current'

oel Pittman has always loved the look of Mediterranean houses, especially those built in the 1920s. So when she came across this beautiful Spanish Revival property in California, she was smitten from the start.

'I love a home with history, and this house fit the bill perfectly with its preserved traditional architectural elements like Saltillo tile floors, white stucco walls and a terracotta tile roof, 'explains Noel.' As I stepped through the front door of the property into the entry hall, a stained-glass window cast a beautiful, coloured light and

I could hear the peaceful sound of water from a fountain from the courtyard – I fell in love.'

Noel, an interior designer, decided to move to Los Angeles to be closer to her mum, sister and nephews and was on the hunt for somewhere she could decorate and make her own. As well as the wonderful architecture, the house had a good layout so she began by focusing on landscaping outside to create a lush Mediterranean oasis.

The primary renovation works were building the outdoor fireplace and patio to enjoy the Californian climate and adding a terrace off the kitchen for outdoor

dining,' says Noel. 'I also designed an Andalusian-style stucco fireplace in the sitting room with dark green, antique Moroccan mosaic tiles to speak to the Moorish elements in the property's architecture.'

Honouring the characteristics of the property lies at the heart of Noel's interior design concept since she's a firm believer that interiors and architecture should relate and she wanted the room schemes to complement the building's Spanish Revival heritage. 'The house needed to inform design decisions to create harmonious, cohesive spaces,' she explains. 'I put aside my love of French antiques and toile because pieces from Morocco, Portugal and Spain were more appropriate here.'

The home office features an antique Spanish refectory table as a desk while an antique Moroccan dhurrie rug sits in the dining room. Decorative Spanish lebrillos – ceramic bowls – adorn the walls in the sitting room, a nod to the aesthetic in designer Veere Grenney's home in Morocco.

Nocl loves a warm, layered aesthetic and was also inspired by American designers, Mario Buatta for his notable use of chintz and Sister Parish for her







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sophisticated, relaxed style. 'Both crafted traditional, timeless rooms, which are comfortable and inviting, and also elegant with personal touches,' says Noel. 'These ideas became integrated into my design vision.'

Noel has some signature elements she often incorporates into client designs that she's used here as well. Natural fibre rugs for warmth, mixed patterns for visual interest and antique finds to enrich the space. 'It's a semi-structured approach, leaving room for each project I work on to have a unique and personal outcome,' she explains. With several rooms in her home

having doors opening onto the garden oasis, Noel chose a complementing interiors palette of greens and blues to seamlessly integrate with nature. The resulting house is a tranquil slice of the

Mediterranean in the heart of busy Los Angeles.
