I already had a collection of garlands, wall hangings, cushions and art so I laid everything out and liked how the pinks, oranges, yellows and burgundy came together, which led me to fall in love with the idea of a sunset colour scheme. When we found a paint range in Homebase with similar colours. everything fell into place.

WHAT I WANTED TO CHANGE

We had the space we needed and liked the layout, but the silvery-grey decor felt cold, uninviting and dull.

HOW I MADE IT MY OWN

Warm paint colours, vibrant art and a mix of tactile furnishings were a must to make the rooms feel welcoming and homely.

MY FAVOURITE PART

Hove the open-plan living and dining area as they tie together so well, yet we've also successfully made them into two separate spaces.





Porch

'We went to IKEA but the only dedicated shoe storage they had was in white and I wanted something with colour. We chose this blue Skruvby cupboard instead. I found the curved mirror in Matalan and this inspired me to paint the arch in the same terracotta as the living and dining room.'

← 'We painted the walls a pale peachy pink to tie in with the pink and terracotta arch/says Freya. The Skruvby cupboard is from IKEA and the cane mirror is from Matalan. For a similar colour, try Dulux. Peach Country







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Kitchen

The unobtrusive white kitchen was a plus point for the

couple who didn't have the budget for a new one. They

removed a run of worktops and an undercounter fridge to fit

in their large fridge-freezer and relocated a redundant set of

drawers to a gap in the base units. 'The previous owners had

stored their bin here, which we felt looked messy and wasn't

a good use of the space, says Freya. The drawers fitted

perfectly. These small changes have made a big difference.'



Dining room

'We didn't want the open-plan space to feel like one giant room with furniture all around the edges. So, we had the idea to put in a divider to separate the relaxing area from the dining table with shelves my sister didn't want anymore. We had a smaller hand-me-down table when we first moved in but decided to buy the extendable Flair Edelweiss table from B&Q so we could entertain properly. The table is a simple mid-century design, and the tone of the wood matches the chairs my nan gave us. I love to decorate the table and have friends and family over for dinner.

EXPERT ADVICE

Make your own star garlands

- Make five-point stars from pretty origami paper and thread them onto string. An origami kit will include sheets of patterned paper the right weight for making the firm creases needed to form star shapes that won't slip apart.
- the back. Use a printable template that shows the cut and fold lines on paper you print yourself at home. You'll just need your own A4 coloured paper, a ruler, scissors and glue. Use a needle to make tiny holes at the top to thread onto clear nylon thread. We like the template from PaperismShop on Etsy which has instructions to make 5, 7 and 8-point stars.
- · Alternatively, you can decorate flat or 3D wooden stars. These come in packs and the 3D designs are slotted together. Leftover paint, wallpaper and decoupage paper work well for this. Tie or hot glue the finished stars onto twine or ribbon to make the garland.
- Drape your garland in swags across a mantelpiece, above a window or a door opening – Freya used her star garland to frame her gallery wall. Use command hooks which can easily be removed if you fancy a change. You could also hang your garland vertically to liven up an awkward corner.

Main bedroom

'I love the warm tone of mustard yellow. It's my favourite colour and I knew it would make our bedroom feel cosy and restful. We also wanted to try out some interesting ideas with paint and had seen the colour-blocking in a show home so we had a go ourselves. A statement headboard was a must but as I have lots of patterned bedding sets, I didn't want another busy fabric. I'm a fan of the boho look and like how natural materials contrast with bright colours."

Bathroom

'The bathroom fittings are still in good condition, and we don't have the budget to replace anything, so we're happy the tiles are an inoffensive neutral base for adding colour with accessories. The cute turtle plant pot is from Urban Outfitters, which I was really pleased to nab in the sale! I'm now planning to have one of my own designs printed as a blind to bring more colour and pattern into the room. Eventually, I'll swap the plain bath panel out for patterned tiles."

What I learned

- It's ok to change your plans! We bought tiles from Tiles Direct to go around the fireplace but didn't get round to putting them up. The pattern looks just as lovely laid out on the floor and provides a pretty surface for displaying our plants so we decided to keep them like this.
- Get fabric swatches and check what they look like in your home. We saw our two sofas together in the DFS showroom and thought the grey one was cream, which was what we wanted. Luckily, cushions and a yellow and pink throw draw the eye so it's not that noticeable.
- It can pay to wait before choosing accessories. I bought the scallop side table in blue from George Home early on because I liked the shape. Now I wish I'd waited and bought the pink one as it would be perfect for my scheme!

I liked how the pinks, oranges and yellows came together, which led me to fall in love with the idea of a sunset colour scheme shop p52 I love how the curved shape of the Tio headboard from La Redoute has the look of the sun against a yellow horizon, echoing the similar motifs we've used elsewhere in our home, says Freya.
