

where she started her own silversmithing business. Since then, Kristina has been supporting herself as a full-time, self-employed artist as a metalsmith, instructor, writer, lecturer, and actively participates in the arts all over Ohio.

Biography: Kristina started her adventures in art at The University of Akron where she double-majored in Sculpture and Metalsmithing in the early 90's. Continuing her education on the west coast for ten years, the she studied Installation Art, Metalsmithing, Classical Sculpture, Performance Art, and Feminist Art History. Then in 2003, she returned to Summit County, Ohio where she started her own silversmithing business. Since then, Kristina has been supporting herself as a full-time, self-employed artist as a metalsmith, instructor, writer, lecturer, and actively participates in the arts all over Ohio. In 2014, she was selected out of fourteen entries to create an outdoor sculpture for Boettler Park in Green, Ohio and then in 2015, she returned to The University of Akron as part-time faculty. Continuing at that University in 2016, the artist was also awarded "Best in Show" at the Akron Arts Expo and Art-A-Palooza (nationally recognized fine art festivals). One year later, Kent State University awarded her with a full tuition remission and stipend where she completed her MFA in late 2018. The following year was spent expanding her business and further developing materials such as glow-in-thedark enamel; for which she was recognized in The Art of Fine Enameling, published in November 2019 and also was a recognized artist again for Akron Arts Expo. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Kristina had 24 pieces in an online show representing the Best of 2020 Ohio's Designer Craftsman, work in the Baltimore Jewelry Centers, the Magnet Show and the Fava Gallery's Pause: Art in Waiting. Later that year, she received honorable mention for a cuttlebone cast cuff bracelet in the Summit Artspace show commemorating the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment. So far this year, she has exhibited work in Fresh 2021, a juried art show also at Summit Artspace and the invitational: Excellence/Defining Space at Peninsula Art Academy, and has been awarded her fifth copyright by the US Library of Congress.

The Big Dig was successful. I am told that there was flint with super nice color found that day. Mrs. Nethers has requested that people park on her side of the road so materials had to be carted in and out of the forest. I am told that our members were literally rolling in the mud thanks to the downpours that came down several times. Thanks to David Rich for setting this up for our members. It was a super good time. Would love to see your photos. The Board has discussed several times that we could rent a large cut-off saw to cut larger boulders into smaller chunks that could be cut in our saws downstairs, but we are curious as to how many of our members would need that service? We have devised an experimental vice clamp that could potentially hold those large boulders in place. We could do that while the weather is still nice if members are interested.

<u>Gems provided by members</u>: Brad's Bench Tips

FIND THE BALANCE POINT

With odd-shaped pendants or earrings it's often difficult to find the right place to attach a bail or loop so that the piece is balanced and hangs straight.

A quick way to make a tool for this is to modify a set of tweezers. Any set of tweezers will work. Spread the tips, sharpen them with a file, and bend the tips at a right angle to point towards each other.

To use the tool, suspend the pendant or earring between two sharp points to see how it will hang.

DRILL BREAKAGE

Using a small drill is difficult for a beginner, especially if it is hand held in a flexshaft or Dremel. They are easily broken if you push too hard or if you tilt the drill while it's in the hole.

Most problems, however, are the result of buying cheap drills that suffer from poor quality steel and/or inaccurately ground cutting edges. A good drill from jewelry supply companies is well worth the price.

Remember that drilling always goes easier with lubrication. A little wax or oil is all you need. Almost anything will work - Three and One, beeswax, mineral oil, injection wax, car oil, olive oil, or one of the commercial cutting waxes. The lubricant helps to move chips out of the hole and reduces friction of the drill against the side of the hole, keeping the drill cooler.
