

BRAD'S BENCH TIPS

I haven't heard from Brad Smith in the past two months. So I have chosen a few of his bench tips from his Facebook account. He has given me permission in the past to use his items. I have reached out to him several times to ask about his health and well-being but I haven't received a response yet.

Straightening Wire

Have you ever pulled out some silver wire only to find that it's all bent up? The easiest way I've found to straighten it out is to stretch it a bit.

Simply put one end in the vise and grab the other end with a pair of serrated tip pliers. Then pull just enough to feel the wire stretch like a rubber band. This works best on small wire diameters, up to about 16 gauge.


Be careful if you are trying to pull hard on a thick wire. Brace yourself in case the wire breaks or pulls out pf the pliers. (And a note from your editor – it would be wise to wear some protective glasses in case that were to happen, in order to protect your eyes.)




Avoiding Solder Lines

After finishing a soldered joint on a piece (say, a bezel), have you ever seen it reappear after you've soldered the bezel to a base plate? What's happening is that every time you heat a soldered piece to the temperature that the solder flows, the liquid solder seeps a little more into the surrounding metal. This leaves a small furrow where the solder had previously been sanded off flush at the joint. To get rid of the furrow, you have to re-sand the joint area down to the bottom of each new furrow.

To avoid this, when I have another soldering operation to follow the first, I try to leave a little extra solder on my joints. For instance, when trimming off the excess base plate from around a





Of course, this isn't always possible as when a soldering operation will prevent you from gaining access to an area for final sanding and polishing. Coating the finished solder joint with ochre seems to help a bit but is not a complete solution.


