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CONVENTION ACTIVITIES WILL BE VARIED

The Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club in Nebraska has put together great activities for the Midwest Federation's 2025 convention on April 5 and 6, 2025. The convention will be held in two venues at the Sandhills Global Event Center at 84th and Havelock in Lincoln; meetings and the awards banquet will be held in the Center's Lincoln Room, and the show will be in the Ag Society Hall.

But LGMC will be kicking things off on Thursday the 3rd with a field trip to the Rose Clay Pit, for fishtail selenite, and to a road cut to collect fossils. There is no charge, but be sure to be at the Event Center at noon when ride-sharing arrangements will be made. The trip will be on a "weather permitting" basis, and updates about the weather will be on the club's website or Facebook page.

Friday's fun will include a "field trip" to the Event Center's parking lot, a site that will be liberally salted with agates, jaspers, petrified wood, fossils, artifacts, and other specimens. Friday night there will be a "meet and greet" with complimentary snacks at the Hy-Vee Club Room at 1601 N. 84th Street; besides catching up with your fellow MWF rockhounds, you'll

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hear a program by mineral expert Eric Fritzsch. There's no charge for either of these events.

Of course the highlight of any convention is the rock and mineral show, and LGMC always has a good one. This year the theme is "Petrified Woods of America." The show will be held Saturday the 5th, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday the 6th, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. If you're interested in submitting a display case, either competitive or simply educational, the deadline for submitting your application is February 28th. (More information about this is below.)

But now, down to business! The MWF State Directors' and Executives' meetings will be held beginning at 9 a.m. on Saturday the 5th, with a lunch break following. The meeting of Delegates from MWF clubs will begin at 1 p.m. At these meetings, decisions are made about Federation actions and activities, so club delegates' votes are important.

Then, at 6 p.m. on Saturday, everyone will go right back to the Lincoln Room for the annual Awards Banquet, with food, fun, and presentations. A social hour will begin at 6 p.m., and the buffet dinner at 7 p.m. The cost per person is \$32.

Four forms are on pages 8 through 11 of this issue. Everyone who wants to attend the convention should fill out the Convention Registration Form on page 8; people who want to exhibit either competitive or educational display cases will find applications to do that on pages 9 and 10. All three of these forms need to be sent to Sharon Marburger, LGMC Secretary, by February 28th. People who will be voting delegates representing their clubs need to fill out the form on page 11 and be sure that it's signed by the club president; that form needs to be submitted to MWF Credentials Chair David Root by March 21st. Details are on all of these forms.

LGMC members are encouraging people to find time to visit the University of Nebraska State Museum at Morrill Hall in Lincoln. Among many natural history exhibits are fossils from the Mesozoic Era and fossils of rhinos and giant camels that roamed the Nebraska plains during the Tertiary Period. The museum also has a Minerals and Meteorites collection which, at this time, is closed; but with luck, maybe it'll be open by April!

Attendees of the MWF's annual convention in Lincoln, Nebraska will have a wide choice of places to stay.

The host hotel for the convention will be the Comfort Suites East Lincoln-Mall Area on North Cotner Boulevard. This hotel has set aside a block of rooms for the convention at a reduced price for those giving the group name (Midwest Federation) and group number (ZP55Z1). The phone number is 402-817-2456.

Other nearby hotels, all in Lincoln, include Candlewood Suites, 402-420-0330; New Victorian Suites, 402-464-4400; Country Inn and Suites, 402-476-5353; and Staybridge Suites Lincoln Northeast, 844-208-4307.

For those who prefer camping, there is an RVUniverse campground at the Sandhill Global Events Center, where the convention will be taking place; however, the water will be turned off through April 14th. MWF PEBBLE PUP FROM MICHIGAN WINS PRIZE IN NATIONAL FOSSIL DAY CONTEST

Release from the Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club (Michigan)

A member of the Grand Traverse Area Rock and Mineral Club (GTARMC) Pebble Pups program has won first place in the category of 8 Years and Under in the National Fossil Day Art Contest!

Iris, a 7-year-old second-grade student, submitted a beautifully detailed piece to the contest, which is sponsored by the National Park Service. Her artwork depicted a serene Michigan beach with Petoskey stones, bringing to life these ancient corals that existed millions of years ago.

Iris was very excited upon hearing the news. Fossils have always fascinated her and learning about how the Earth used to be. National Fossil Day, observed each year in October, is an initiative of the National Park Service to celebrate fossils as a national resource that offers a window into Earth's deep past. The contest, open to K-12 students, encourages young people to learn more about the ancient world and our planet's history.

This achievement has brought pride not only to Iris but also to GTARMC and the entire Traverse City community. Steven Veatch, the club's Pebble Pups Coordinator, shared her excitement, saying, "Iris has shown a special talent for bringing history to life in her art. We are all so proud to see her earn such a well-deserved honor." Taking part in the National Fossil Day Art Contest has become an annual highlight in the GTARMC's Pebble Pups program.

As a reward for her winning piece, Iris will receive a certificate of recognition from the National Park Service. The National Park Service will display Iris's artwork on the National Fossil Day website and social media. This will allow fossil enthusiasts, artists, and students across the country to see it.

CLUBS THAT RENEW ON TIME GET TWO GREAT BENEFITS

The 2025 Midwest Federation forms for renewing club memberships are on the following two pages of this issue of MWF News. Please alert club officers to collect information for the forms.

One important piece of information needed is the total number of individual adult and youth members during the year <u>completed</u> during 2024. These figures are used for dues and insurance calculations. The rationale is that your total membership, by the end of the year, is usually about the same, so you always pay the current year dues based on your past experience. The treasurer needs this information **before January** 15th so our insurance can be activated on time.

The Midwest Federation will only publish each club's public contact information. Please make sure that the mailing address is checked at least weekly and the phone number connects to a real person who can answer questions about your club. We still need direct contact information that will be distributed on a need-to-know basis to Federation leaders.

Clubs are encouraged to provide name, position and email address for additional officers, board members and members who would like to receive the *MWF News*. This information will only be distributed to our editor and secretary. This is a great way to make sure that all of your officers are "in the know."

Clubs who renew on time will receive an email subscription to the juniors publication Mini Miners Monthly, distributed only via email. If you wish to have the Mini Miners Monthly subscription sent to someone other than your (1) junior program coordinator or your editor, please provide a name, position and email address for that person and indicate that he or she is to receive the Mini Miners materials.

Use the EVENTS form to submit details of shows and events during the coming year and the first four months of 2026. If the Events form is submitted with the dues, we will make sure it gets to the website, newsletter and directory coordinators. If it is submitted later, or separately, it is more likely to get overlooked.

Insurance will stay the same for 2025. Our current rate is \$4.50 per club member, and all members must be covered. Clubs that submit their dues on time (postmarked no later than January 15, 2025), may take a discount of 25ϕ per member.

Remember: The Federation insurance policy will cover groups of clubs jointly sponsoring shows or events **only if** all of the sponsoring clubs are current federation members and all of the sponsoring clubs purchase federation insurance. Requests for insurance for these jointly sponsored events must include a list of all sponsoring clubs.

MWF CLUBS JOIN FUTURE ROCKHOUNDS

Two new youth programs in the Midweat Federation have joined the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies' Future Rockhounds of America (FRA) program. One is the CAGMAG Juniors of the Central Arkansas Gem, Mineral and Geology Society; the other is the White River Juniors Club of the White River Rock, Gem and Mineral Club in Michigan.

Future Rockhounds of America provides clubs' juniors coordinators with the outline of a learning program and activities in 20 different rock-related categories. Juniors who complete steps in any of these categories – which include Collecting, Field Trips, Earth Processes, and Rocking on the Computer – receive a badge from the program.

Besides these badges, there are other awards along the way – a badge for simply joining FRA, one for successfully completing six badges, a "Rock Star" pin for obtaining all 20 badges, and, for older juniors, stars for more advanced work in badge categories they completed when younger.

The Midwest Federation has 23 youth clubs enrolled with the FRA. Several additional clubs have youth activities at their shows or club meetings but are not a part of the national program.

THE MINERALS THAT ATTACK YOUR CONCRETE DRIVEWAY

Those hard concrete driveways! How nice they are when first laid. Then they crack, crumble, spall, and need replacing. This is not only true of your driveway but of our whole concrete infrastructure, ranging from stadiums to dams to interstates, which costs the U.S. an estimated \$150 billion a year. What eats the concrete?

It turns out that many of concrete's foes are minerals.


Concrete consists of cement paste (a complex mixture made mostly of calcium hydroxides and

calcium aluminum silicates) and aggregate (sand and gravel). The process of making the cement begins with limestone and clay. These are mixed, heated, ground and treated with gypsum. Adding water to this starts a number of chemical reactions, forming calcium hydroxides (one of which is called portlandite), calcium aluminum silicates, and calcium sulfates (such as ettringite). These reactions continue for days until the cement is finally set and hard. What minerals attack this formidable material?

Ice is an obvious villain. Ice is a perfectly good mineral — inorganic, naturally occurring, and possessing a crystalline structure. When water freezes to ice, it expands by about 9%, exerting tremendous

force on the sides of any cracks or pores into which it has seeped. As the cracks and pores enlarge, it is easier for more water to enter.

Salt is another enemy. As you spread salt on your driveway, or as salty residue drips off your car, the salt water soaks into the concrete. As the water evaporates, salt crystals grow, forcing apart cracks.

Salt can have a more insidious effect, depending on what aggregate is in the concrete. If the aggregate contains poorly crystalline silica, in the form of opal or even chert, it reacts with sodium, converting the hard silica to a hydrated alkali gel. This decreases the strength of the concrete. Since the gel occupies more volume that the original chert or opal, it further cracks the concrete and helps more water to enter.

By the way, Scott Wolter, in his book "The Lake Superior Agate," describes some deposits of the solidified gel material in voids in concrete that show agate-like banding. This may help us to better understand the formation of agates.

Sulfur, which occurs in soils, seawater, and acidic rain, is another enemy. Portlandite, formed during the hardening of the cement, reacts with the sulfur-bearing water to make gypsum and more ettringite.

Gypsum is soft and water soluble, degrading the concrete. Both gypsum and ettringite cause an increase in volume, cracking the concrete. The more cracks, the more water and sulfate and salt can enter. This cycle limits concrete's lifetime.

Millions of research dollars are going into making concrete more resistant to these attacks. The only way to avoid this completely is to build where water, salt, and ice don't occur. The nearest surface like that is on the moon.
