mailed to Executive Committee members, and printed copies were available at this meeting. J.C. Moore moved to approve the minutes and Sandy Fuller seconded the motion, which passed.

Treasurer Stephen Shimatzki had printed copies of the Treasurer's report. He mentioned that he had moved some extra funds into a money market. Joe Johnson said that his club put their extra money in short term CD's, because the rates were better. They were using the interest for field trips and renting a van for accessible needs. J.C. Moore moved to accept the Treasurer's report. Catherine Clevenz seconded the motion, which passed.

CONVENTION BANQUET CELEBRATES SCHOLARSHIP HONOREES AND RECIPIENTS

Clyde and Barbara Ogg of the Lincoln Gem & Mineral Club (Nebraska) were feted as the 2025 MWF Scholarship Honorees at the Awards Banquet of the MWF convention in April.

Both of the Oggs have been rockhounds since childhood, and are active with the club in recruiting speakers, planning field trips, and writing articles for the club's newsletter.

Barbara assists with juniors programs, and Clyde serves on the board. In addition, Clyde has built fluorescent mineral displays, converting transilluminators to super-UV fixtures; Barbara has become a self-taught expert in identifying antique jewelry.

Both have received degrees in entomology, Barbara a Ph.D. from Iowa State University and Clyde a master's degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL). They have spent their professional careers with the Extension faculty at UNL, teaching about pest management and pesticide safety, writing educational publications, and making presentations at conferences and workshops.

Of course, when they were selected as this year's Scholarship Honorees, they turned to UNL for assistance in choosing the grant recipients. Each year, the MWF Scholarship Honorees select two graduate

students in the earth sciences, and each of those students receives a \$4,000 grant from the MWF.

Each of the other federations in the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies also receives two \$4,000 grants to be given to students in their regions (except for the Southeast Federation, which has its own scholarship program).

The names of the two 2025 MWF grant recipients were announced at the convention Awards Banquet. They are **Megan Heins** and **Kali Neydon**. Both are studying micropaleontology of marine diatoms at the UNL Department of Earth & Atmospheric Sciences, Heins as a Ph.D. candidate and Neydon as a master's student.

"[Heins] is presently examining sediment cores recovered from West Antarctica, working within a team of international scientists to assess the past and future history of the West Antarctic Ice Sheet," according to Dr. David M. Harwood, who holds the Stout Chair of Stratigraphy at UNL.

For two years, Heins was the head teaching assistant and president of Students of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences, a departmental organization. "This scholarship will prove to be invaluable to my peace of mind as I finish up my Ph.D.," Heins wrote in a letter to the Oggs.

Neydon is "working to develop a new paleoenvironmental and paleoclimate proxy using benthic diatoms . . . a proxy for open, ice-free coastlines during Pliocene times of past warmth," Harwood explained. (According to the U.S. Geological Survey's website, proxies are "materials preserved within the geologic record that can be analyzed and correlated with climate or environmental parameters in the modern world . . . to expand our understanding of climate variability to times before humans began measuring these things.")

Harwood wrote about Neydon, ". . . I am impressed with her keen understanding and fine work ethic."

Bulletin Editors Contest – Mary Ann Ferguson-Rich was online. She reported that the Bulletin Editors Contest had almost three times the numver of entries as last year. The MWF entries did very well in the AFMS contest. The MWF placed second in the regional federation with the most trophy winners.

All American Awards – There was one entry this year. It had good results.

Club Rockhound of the Year – Jeanine Mielecki had a written report.

Conventions and Shows – J.C. Moore reported that the convention in 2024 in East Peoria was well attended. This year Sharon Marburger has been the club/MWF coordinator. She has done this for a convention twice before. She is a good resource for any club considering hosting a convention.

Next year (2026) the MWF convention will be in conjunction with the AFMS Convention. It will be hosted by the Chicagoland group of clubs in St. Charles, Illinois, May 22-24, 2026.

J.C. asked John Rettler from Kettle Moraine Geological Society in Wisconsin about the 2027 convention. John noted it had been 40 years since Wisconsin had hosted an MWF convention. It will be their club's 65th anniversary. They have a big kids' corner at the show on the second weekend in March. Their show is after Tucson and before Easter. They had good attendance this year with 2,700 (2,100 adults).

Because of the time of year, they can't have field trips, but within 45 minutes are the DNR Horicon

The show site is the Washington County Fairground near Route 45 near West Bend, Wisconsin. J.C. noted that he is willing to hear suggestions for dates after 2027.

Director of Supplies – Sharon Marburger reported that she had nothing to report. She had brought badges, pins, patches and bolos for sale.

Directory – Martha Miss announced there were old ones (2024) available to whoever wanted to pick them up. Cheryl asked for a round of applause for Martha's work on the directory.

Endowment Fund – Cindy Root asked why people were not sending donations for the Endowment Fund. She and Marge Collins bickered back and forth (in good terms) about where donations should go – Endowment Fund or Scholarship Fund.

Cindy announced that the Tricky Tray proceeds and the auction of E. Bear go to the Endowment Fund. The winning bidder gets to take E. Bear home for a year. Only the interest from the Endowment Fund can be used. It goes for such things as the Diamond Dan newsletter for clubs with juniors who pay their dues on time, part of the cost of dues for all members to the AFMS, and patches for the juniors activities. The Endowment Fund was originally established to keep down dues and other costs for members.

Environment and Legislation – Catherine Clevenz announced she would have a suggested letter to send to Congress concerning closing of BLM lands and national monuments. There are some places we can no longer walk on, let alone collect on. Remember to keep it clean when we visit these areas that are still open. In some places, it is a felony to even walk in the area. This is hurting students, geologists, rockhounds and others. She planned to submit an article in the next newsletter with contacts and content suggestions.

Cheryl noted this would be a good program for your local club to participate in this needed activity. Tom Barnhizer added that it is not just the closures, but the restrictions, and there are fewer people to help if you have problems in these areas. Joe Johnson noted that they are facing issues in Arkansas. Many of the areas are no longer available to collecting, and there has been privatization of dig sites. Maybe we need to create a group to help bring in landowners for dialogue. We need to enlarge the footprint.

Reinee Hildebrandt reminded members that landowners have the liability issues. There needs to be a balance of how we approach sites. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is a good example. They manage Forest Service land. We need to target specific lands.

John Rettler added that as a former farmer in Wisconsin, the DNR is not well liked because of their over-reach. When you choose to react, it is not necessarily a bad thing. It can give a forum for discussion.

Geology – No report.

Historian – Cindy Root reminded everyone that our history is on Google Drive. It includes all the directories, as well as convention meeting minutes and information. No one sends her anything. She accepts emails with photos, etc., from clubs.

Sharon Marburger reported that the Lincoln Gem & Mineral Club puts their history on their website. Cindy can load club history onto the website. Pdf works fine. Joyce Kish added that she started collecting photos going back to 1942 on their club's website. They have all the MWF newsletters. Cindy also noted that the Silent Auction, which would be on

Sunday, goes to the Endowment Fund. It would start at 10:00 a.m., and help was needed.

Juniors – Reinee Hildebrant had a report in the packet. She noted that she "does care." Right now there are 841 junior members reported in MWF clubs. Three new clubs have reported junior groups – Central Arkansas Gem, Mineral & Geology Society; White River Rock, Gem and Mineral Club from Wisconsin; and Lincoln Gem & Mineral Club from Nebraska. She added that the juniors newsletter "Crack the News" had a collaborative article to which six MWF juniors contributed.

There are some fantastic things going on. Her survey results brought up some new things such as a club that gives the juniors "Monopoly money" for helping at its show. They can use the "money" at the swap, the show, etc., however the club wants. This is a volunteer reward. Clubs can sign up their juniors groups on the AFMS website. There are some new badges added, including "Sand and Sediment," which was demonstrated at the AFMS cracker barrel.

Lapidary Arts – David Root had a written report.

Long Range Planning – No report.

Membership – Jim Marburger reported that two clubs have new workshops, which will attract new members. The MWF had one request for information

about forming a new club, but no other contacts had been received.

Merit Awards – Mary Ann Ferguson-Rich was online, and reported that results from AFMS and MWF contests would be announced at the awards banquet.

Mineralogy – This chairmanship was vacant. Joe Johnson asked to see the Operating Procedure for this committee to see if he was interested in this chairmanship.

Newsletter – Valerie Meyers had a written report.

Paleontology – No report.

Program Requests – Bob Powers had a written report.

Safety and Field Trips – David Rich was online and noted that we need to consider safety first.

Scholarship – Marge Collins had a written report. She noted that, as part of the AFMS Scholarship Fund program, each year the MWF Scholarship Honoree selects two students to receive grants. The AFMS has given over \$1 million to graduate students who were majoring in the earth sciences. She told people to consider a living memorial instead of always waiting until someone passed away.

Joe Johnson reminded people to check to see if their companies will match donations. Marge suggested holding a 50/50 drawing. Donna Moore noted that these grants really help the students and their families. Steve Shimatzki stepped up with a donation for the Scholarship Fund and challenged others to give right at that time. Marge received several donations.

Silent Auction – Susan Stanforth has had to step down as chairperson due to health problems. A new chairperson is needed.

Uniform Rules – J.C. Moore reported that this area covers competitive exhibits that are set up according to the AFMS Rules. There was one exhibit at the Lincoln show of self-collected minerals. It included 35 minerals. Putting it together was challenging, but it is a nice display. Be sure to check it out at the show.

The object is to make sure that it is not crowded. The idea is to put together an attractive display.

Old Business

Logo – The revised logo was shown (printed copies were available). Steve Shimatzki offered to do a revision in color (add the red). Cheryl urged people to look at their club materials and update the logo. Donna Moore can email it to anyone needing the revision.

Media – J.C. Moore reported that we have a new sound system, which we are still working with to get used to it. Catherine Clevenz added she will be getting a camera to use instead of her computer for the visual portion for the Zoom meetings.

New Business

AFMS Report – J.C. Moore, AFMS President, reported that the AFMS Convention and Annual Meeting was held the previous weekend in Hickory, North Carolina. The most significant item of business was voting to transition the AFMS Newsletter to digital with distribution by e-mail. This will be transitioned over the next year. Also, there was a committee appointed to update the Judges Training Operating Procedure so there are new guidelines in order that a new committee chairperson could be found to oversee this.

MWF Officers – MWF first and second vice president positions need to be filled. State-wide or Federation-wide Field Trips – Cheryl asked if there might be interest in planning state or federation field trips. This is done in the Southeast Federation. They have Dixie Mineral Clubs, in which


Cindy Root did the drawings for the Tricky Tray, which included nine bags. The proceeds were donated to the MWF Endowment Fund.

- The "Earth Moving Desert" activity from the LOESS Juniors Program was shared at the Midwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies annual meeting, and will shared at the 2025 American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS) meeting in Hickory, South Carolina.
- A packet of information was created to promote youth rockhound programs, and was distributed at the annual 2024 MWF meeting.
- I assisted Joan Stoker with the youth table at the Pasadena Academy of Science (Geology Section) 2024 Gem and Mineral Show. PAS Geology was sponsoring the MWF convention in East Peoria, Illinois.
- A MWF youth outreach survey was conducted at the 2024 MWF annual meeting. Its purpose was to determine the types of youth activities offered by MWF societies. The information is in a database and, along with an analysis of the results, is included in this report.

WEBSITE COMPETITION CALLS FOR ENTRIES

The MWF Website Competition is open and running over the summer, so please enter! Website contest entry forms are **due August 31, 2025**.

The contest rules and entry forms are on the AFMS website under Contests & Awards, then Website Contest (www.amfed.org/contests/website-contest). Be sure to select the MWF button to get the correct form.

Club webmasters use the new online submission form to enter their websites. There are no longer paper or .pdf forms, simply the online form. The two highest-scoring websites may be submitted to the national AFMS competition, although websites that score below 80 points in the regional contests cannot be sent to the AFMS.

At the annual AFMS meeting in 2026, the highest-scoring website will receive a plaque. Second—and third-place entries, and honorable mentions, will receive certificates.

There is now a non-compete category, so webmasters can submit their sites for scoring, but they will not receive awards or certificates and cannot advance to the AFMS contest. This is to provide feedback to help their clubs' websites improve.

- Junior Leaders from all MWF clubs signed up for the AFMS FRA program were contacted this year and asked to contribute to this annual report.
- Each month I participated in the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies Youth Program Committee. National initiatives from this committee are mentioned in this report.

According to the MWF Directory, there are 841 junior members in the MWF, ranging from 39 clubs with zero juniors to the Minnesota Mineral Club, with 180. Currently, there are 21 MWF clubs involved with

the AFMS Future Rockhounds of America (FRA) program. These clubs have an average of 21 juniors per club. Many FRA badges have been given out to MWF juniors, include several "Rockhound" (or "Honor Roll") and "Rock Star" designations, for juniors who have earned 6 and 20 badges respectively.

Both ends of the FRA experience spectrum at the Indian Mounds Rock & Mineral Club (Michigan): Right, Oliver and Kayson (backed by the juniors coordinators) show off their Rockhound Awards for earning six badges.





And above, seven Indian Mounds juniors received Beyond the Badge awards for in-depth projects in categories for which they earned a badge when younger. The picture of Selah, Aubrey, Myla, Lulu, Madison, Abby, and Rosie, as well as the photo above, ran in the club's March 2025 Arrowhead News.

In 2024, three clubs either joined or reactivated their involvement in FRA. They are the Central Arkansas Gem, Mineral and Geology Society; White River Rock, Gem and Mineral Club (Michigan); and Lincoln Gem and Mineral Club (Nebraska).

Several MWF juniors had articles and artwork published in Crack the News, the AFMS online newsletter by and for juniors. The MWF News ran five articles related to junior members and youth programs between June 2024 and January 2025.

Fourteen clubs at the 2024 MWF Convention responded to the youth outreach survey mentioned

above. Ten clubs had youth activities as a part of their club meeting; four did not. Following are some results related to junior activities at club meetings.

Some clubs had a separate youth program prior to the regular meeting while others struggle to get families with children to participate in the club activities. Nine clubs hand out rocks to youth. Seven clubs provided a short program about rocks, geology, and earth science. Six clubs have projects where the youth make a gem, lapidary, or craft project. Six clubs have free rock raffle/door prizes. Suggestions for meeting-related junior activities included:

- How and where to collect program
- Dinosaur discussions and dinosaur match game
- Rock identification discussions and match game
- Clear 24-compartment specimen box for kids given at meetings
- Open house at the library where kids can dress up in field trip clothes and equipment for photos
- Members talk at other kid venues and events in the
- Creating a small baggie of rocks from the club's state to help kids start their rock collections.
- Junior members of the club are given space to display their own collection.

All fourteen clubs that responded to the survey have youth activities at their annual Gem and Mineral Show. The most popular activities with ten of these clubs were Spin and Win, grab bags (both free and sold inexpensively), fossil or rock specimen dig, Touch and Feel tables, egg cartons for rock and fossil specimens, Fishing for a Prize, and geode or rock races. Suggestions for show-related junior activities included:

- Opening day as a free day for registered school
- Scavenger Hunt Contest. Kids go to various displays at the show and answer a series of questions to get a prize from the treasure chest
- Guess how many items in jar (bubblegum agate, tumbled stones, etc.)
- Kids-only silent auction items, designated with a sticker on the bid sheets
- Build a Crinoid Model with pipe cleaner stems and Styrofoam balls
- Rock identification
- Painting river rocks ("It is a big hit")
- Provide Junior Bucks for juniors who attend functions, work shows, and take part in other

sanctioned activities. Attendance helps them earn "Monopoly" money to cash in at show or swap

Half of the MWF survey respondents' clubs participate in the FRA, five taking part in the badge program. Three clubs were using the Future Rockhounds Junior Volunteers Award, for juniors who put in 20 hours of volunteer work for their clubs. A few clubs reported using the FRA web resources. The survey response from the Lincoln Gem & Mineral Club (Nebraska) stated, "When we used the FRA Program, we had four juniors graduate to Rockhound. Two of those graduates are still members 9 years later." (The Lincoln club was among those who reactivated their involvement in FRA in 2024.)

General remarks about, and ideas for, juniors programs included:

- Only two clubs were aware of Crack the News.
- Juniors submitting written articles for club newsletters.
- Designating a Junior Rockhound of the Year.
- A few respondents mentioned that the reason there is no youth program is because there are no adult club members who will volunteer or participate.
