As always, we are especially grateful for the tireless Book Sale Coordinators, Heidi Chisholm and Jan Maddern and their team of volunteers who efficiently and successfully run our book sales, which traditionally has been our main source of income. The money raised by the Friends funds library programs and services, please see this year's highlights in the handout.

And finally, The Institute of Museum and Library Services which is the largest source of federal funding for libraries and provides grants to state programs and administrative services has been dismantled by executive order. Libraries across the country have already been officially notified of grant terminations. Other funding sources are from the Department of Education and the National Endowment for the Arts, which have also been dismantled. This coming fiscal year we will be exploring ways to augment the book sales and hopefully create new ways to generate funds. Now, more than ever, we need volunteers to assist the Friends. Book Sale Annual Report

Greetings to all Members of the Friends of Hamilton-Wenham Library and guests to our annual meeting. We had a successful 2024 with our <u>USED BOOK SALES</u>. The Semi-Annual Book Sales in March 2024 and September 2024 brought us \$11,644.00. Our book sales on-line were \$1,700.00 (as a donation from Fran Cooper). Our sale of used books also brings in Memberships. We helped kick off the summer reading program for the children and young adult readers with a small sale of only youth books in June,

which brought in \$620.00. We are pleased to report that the book sales INSIDE the Library in our little alcove has grown to give us \$4,855.00 this past year! Our combined income from used book sales this past year was \$18,819!

We could not have held these sales without the help of our many volunteers. We have a core group of trained and enthusiastic helpers who come most Mondays to accept donations, screen these books and sort them into categories. Set up, sale days and breakdown of the semi-annual Sales takes many long hours. Members of our board as well as other community members take part in this huge task. One estimate of the number of books we sort, move, display, sell and clean up in each sale is 10,000 pounds of literature. I will not attempt to list our wonderful volunteers in fear of leaving even one out, but they know who they are. We are very thankful for your time, energy, skill, and comradery.

We are always happy to include and train any new volunteers. It is very rewarding to help our library be able to offer programing, museum passes and more to the community.

A book about understanding New Englanders through the lens of our stories. Journalist and author Ted Reinstein has reported all around New England for 25 years, telling the colorful stories of this historic yet ever-changing corner of America. Now, he condenses his countless travels into a single, unique labor of love: a journey through the heart and soul of New England, meeting the most memorable people—and their unlikely stories—all along the way. Indeed, the Old Mainer in the tired-old joke was wrong: you *can* get there from here. And along the way, see New England in a whole new light, through the stories of some everyday Americans you will never forget.
