

ABOUT...

THE PAJAMA GAME

The concept for The *Pajama Game* was adapted from the book 7 1/2 *Cents*, originally written by Richard Bissell. Bissell collaborated with stage director George Abbott to conceive a musical adaptation for the work, and in 1954, with the help of the composer/lyricist team of Richard Adler & Jerry Ross, *The Pajama Game* held its premiere at the Saint James Theatre in New York City.

Richard Adler & Jerry Ross had burst onto the Broadway music scene in 1953 by writing a famous number for Tony Bennett called "Rags to Riches". They were young protégés of Frank Loesser (*Guys and Dolls*), who mentored them and even helped them pen some of the music to *The Pajama Game* without taking credit. A lover of classic musicals may notice Loesser's influence through the songs "There Once Was a Woman" and "A New Town Is a Blue Town." After *The Pajama Game* and *Damn Yankees* (1955), Jerry Ross passed away from lung disease, and Adler never achieved quite the same level of fame after Ross's passing.

The choreography was originally designed for Jerome Robbins (Fiddler on the Roof, West Side Story). But Robbins declined the role, offering instead to be a supervisor for a new recommend: Bob Fosse. Fosse, a successful Broadway actor and dancer at the time, incorporated his now-signature style on the show: jazz hands, turned-in knees, shuffles, and rolled shoulders. Steam Heat is an iconic example of Fosse's work.

The show launched the career of actress Shirley MacLaine (Sweet Charity, Terms of Endearment). Two weeks into the production, Carol Haney broke her ankle and MacLain filled in for her with no chance to rehearse beforehand. Her performance would gather the interest of Hollywood producers and land her a starring role in Alfred Hitchcock's *The Trouble With Harry* (1955).

The Pajama Game concluded its show run with 1,063 performances over two different venues, which would cement the show's place in Broadway history. Its run received three TONY awards: Best Musical, Best Choreography, and Best Supporting Actress: Carol Haney. The show's success would later beget a motion picture (1957; John Raitt, Doris Day) and multiple revivals.

AZMTO's performance acknowledges the late Janis Paige, who originally played Babe Williams in the show and passed in early June at the age of 101.

The Arizona Musical Theatre Orchestra

The Arizona Musical Theatre Orchestra (AZMTO) welcomes you to its second season!

If you have never seen an AZMTO production before, you are in for a real treat. You'll notice within the first few minutes that AZMTO's casts are much larger than most traditional theatre ensembles, which is by design: this organization exists so that you can hear the music of Broadway's biggest shows soaring grander than you've ever heard.

Hearing a full complement of musicians playing a Broadway show is a luxury these days, but folks who don't attend theatrical performances may never realize why that is...and that's because, surprisingly, they might not notice a problem exists. Many shows mount productions where musicians are unseen; even in New York, musicians can be in 3-4 separate rooms, even across the street from their performance venues! And did you know that many cast recordings employ larger-than-standard orchestras in order to add dimension to a show's audio legacy?

How can people tell what they're really missing? And where can people go who want to hear a full symphonic musical theatre experience today? Sadly, with Broadway pit sizes and orchestrations transforming (read: shrinking) in the name of regional authenticity (i.e. Come From Away), technical advancement (Hamilton), or even karaoke-style storytelling (Here Lies Love), the only feasible remaining answers is at the symphony...but even they won't play full shows in concert style. That's where AZMTO comes in!

We believe that music's joys are found in the circumstance of its storytelling. When you come to an AZMTO performance, you actively empower musicians to refine their craft in a unique environment. In turn, we thank you by providing a truly unique sensory experience.

Music heightens our natural emotions while revealing new subtext about plot and character. Thus, attending a Showcase reminds us that music doesn't only tell us what to feel...it shows us how. AZMTO participants & audience members grow from these experiences because they feel a different depth of significance and validation here -- not just from combining their talents or learning about something new, but from sharing their humanity.

Performance is a symbiotic relationship. What is created together in this room is equally as spellbinding for our performers as it can be for audience members. So tonight, when you feel moved, take a good look around. You might catch a glimpse of our performers feeling something special...something they can't quite define or explain. This experience is known as "theatre magic": it's the way stories weave together inexplicably to remove us from our own situation. The performers feel it because of how they see a show unfold right before their eyes. And however you find that "magic" -- whether through the power of the dialogue, the beauty of the music, or just by allowing yourself to experience something new in a unique way -- we are grateful that you're here, sharing in these moments with us.

ARTISTIC LEADERSHIP



Dylan Suehiro

Born and raised in Hilo, Hawai'i, Dylan Suehiro (Conductor) studied trombone & music education at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and earned a Master of Music in Conducting from ASU. Highlights of Dylan's career include leading the AMEA Junior High All-State Orchestra, directing the inaugural ASU Gold Band, and conducting the Sofia Philharmonic Orchestra (Bulgaria). In 2021, he was selected as a finalist candidate to conduct the "Pershing's Own" US Army Band in Washington, DC.

Dylan is currently the director of the North Valley Youth Orchestra, and was previously part of the performing arts faculty at Shadow Mountain High School and North Canyon High School. An avid multi-instrumentalist, he has spent several seasons in the North Valley Symphony Orchestra bass section, and has played flute, violin, and horn in pit orchestras for various musical theatre productions. Outside of music, Dylan is an enthusiastic supporter of the local food community.



Joni Van Rossum

Joni Van Rossum (Collaborative Pianist), an accomplished musical director and composer, has been leaving a harmonious trail in the theatre world for over 15 years. Originally hailing from the Netherlands, Joni's passion for musical theatre led him on a journey to citizenship in the US.

In 2007, Joni's career took off in Amsterdam, where he found a mentor in the Dutch musical theatre pioneer, Frank Sanders. Recognizing Joni's talent, Frank welcomed him into the renowned Academy for Musical Theatre, where he flourished and secured a faculty position.

Joni has been associated with remarkable productions, including Blood Brothers, Hair, Beauty & The Beast, The Lion King, and many more. Since April 2016, Joni has been enriching the local musical landscape. He was the Music Director for the Scottsdale Musical Theatre Company, and now serves as the Director of Media & Production at a local Tempe church.
