Prospectus for Bee Yard Stock & Equipment

- 2 <u>Introduction</u>. Offered for sale is the stock and equipment for a sideliner bee yard. This would make an
- 3 excellent expansion resource for a hobbyist wishing to go sideliner. This is a working yard. There is
- 4 product being sold as we speak, thus some pricing is dynamic. I have been beekeeping for about 20
- 5 years. I am selling because of poor health.
 - 1. If you are **not** a beekeeper with several successful years of experience, you need to stop reading now. I am not Mr. Miyagi. I am not here to teach or argue about beekeeping. If you do not understand words or concepts used in this prospectus, you need to stop reading, ask a mentor, or watch some YouTubes.
 - 2. IMO, late December early January would be an excellent time to move the colonies. Quietly seal them up at night and move them during the cold early daylight. When the bees next exit the hive in their new location, they will make their orientation flight and return home without a lot of drama. And so will their new beekeeper.
 - 3. If you are a beekeeper who thinks these prices are too high and you could do things much better: please go and troll someone else. I have not the time nor temperament to listen to you.
 - 4. If you (and your partner[s]) do **not** have between \$5000 \$6000, you need to stop reading now. The final sale price will be between \$5000 \$6000, cash.
 - 5. You will be dealing with either an end stage cancer patient or a fresh widow. Do not waste our time or goodwill with bullshit. We will not respond to anything that smells of spam, scam, or indolent window shopping.
 - 6. For clarity, the offering is composed of five groups. **These groups will be sold together as one unit,** *i.e.*, **you are buying all of it and hauling it away.** I will not piece it out. The groupings are:
 - a. Live bees and housing, price is dynamic according to what is present on day of sale.
 There will be no "pig in a poke," we will look at them together.
 - b. Harvesting equipment
 - c. Honey and glassware, price is dynamic according to what is present on day of sale.
 - d. Woodenware and frames
 - e. Miscellaneous equipment and supplies

- 7. Group A Live bees and housing [dynamic pricing]. As of Thanksgiving Day, there are 13 colonies of live bees.
 - I stress my apiary in late summer to cull out weak colonies before the time and expense
 of treating and feeding for overwintering. There could be more winter losses, but I
 doubt there will be less than 10 colonies of live bees.
 - b. We have read *Romeo and Juliet* and raised teenagers; we are not precious about breeding; so consider the bees to be "well adapted North Alabama Mutts."
 - c. The colonies were treated with either Apiguard or MAQS in Fall 2024 and then feed fondant & pollen patties for winter stores.
