How to Grow

When to Plant: Direct sow in late spring or start indoors 6-8 weeks before last frost.

Location: Full sun with well-drained soil.

Spacing: Thin seedlings to 12-15 inches apart.

Watering: Low to moderate; avoid soggy soil.

Fertilizer: Minimal; too much fertilizer reduces blooms.

Tips for Success

Deadhead spent blooms to encourage more flowers.

Excellent for poor soils and low-water gardens.

Leave seed heads for winter interest or reseeding.

Divides easily after a few years.

Companion Planting

Pairs well with coneflowers, coreopsis, and ornamental grasses for a natural prairie look.

Harvesting and Use

Cut fresh blooms for arrangements or leave to self-seed. Attracts butterflies and beneficial insects.

Quick Planting Checklist

- Direct sow after frost or start indoors
- Thin seedlings to 12-15 inches apart
- Provide full sun and low water
- Deadhead to extend blooming
