### Pastor's Corner

#### Are You a Saint? Psalm 89:7

How would you define the word "saint"? The Catholic Church officially recognizes certain individuals who have lived exceptionally holy lives, and thus as being in heaven and capable of interceding for sinners. The official recognition process is called canonization. But how does the Bible define the word "saint"? The O.T. word translated "saint" in our English Bibles comes from two different Hebrew words. One word is from the verb, "to be clean" ("make, pronounce, or observe, as clean"). The emphasis is upon one's inward condition (or character). The other word is from the verb, "to bow, to be kind." It emphasizes the outward conduct of the individual. In the N.T., the word is *agios*, literally, "sanctified one" and is used some 40 times. This word speaks of separation, those who are separated from sin and consecrated to God.

Consider with me first of all the calling of saints (or the who? of sainthood). The call of saints is found in Romans 1:7 (and cf. 1:1); I

Corinthians 1:2; and Philipians 1:1. This calling involves to be set apart from the world, as seen in John 17:14-16, as well as to be set apart unto God, as seen in John 17:17 and Romans 1:1. The cause of the calling is God's grace (II Timothy 1:9) and man's faith (II Thessalonians 1:10). Note the contrast between what we were in Ephesians 2:12 and what we are in Ephesians 2:19.

Consider second, the conduct of saints (or the what? of sainthood). Saints are identified by their holiness in I Peter 1:14-16 and they are identified by their helpfulness in Romans 12:13 (see 12:9-16).

Third, compare the character of saints (or the why? of sainthood). They are characterized by their praise (and prayer) to the Lord (Psalm 30:4; Revelation 5:8). Saints are also characterized by their love for the Lord (Psalm 31:23). This should result in a love for the saints (Colossians 1:4). And saints are also characterized by their fear of the Lord (Psalm 34:9; Proverbs 9:10).

Lastly, consider the consequence of saints (the when? of sainthood). Their duty is revealed in Ephesians 4:12 where we see them equipped to do the ministry. In Jude verse 3 they are exhorted to earnestly contend for

the faith. And in Ephesians 4:29 saints are edified to build up one another. Another consequence is their death. Theirs is a preserved life (I Samuel 2:9; Psalm 37:28) as well as a precious death (Psalm 116:15). A third consequence revealed in Scripture is their destiny. The realm of saints is seen in Daniel 7:18; the reign of saints found in I Corinthians 6:2; and the reunion of saints is described in I Thessalonians 3:13 (and cf. I Thess. 4:11-16).

The question is: Are you a saint? True saints are simply those who have trusted the finished sacrifice of Christ as their only hope and means of salvation, thus receiving Him as their personal Lord and Savior. Are you living a saintly life? Those called saints should conduct themselves as such. Could you be identified as one of His saints by your praise to the Lord, your love for the Lord, and your fear of the Lord? A saint is one who is to be physically pure, morally blameless, and spiritually consecrated to God. Does that describe you?

**LESSON PLANS**

What an interesting school year we have had! Between Covid, Covid exposures, quarantine times, masks, remote teaching, in-person instruction, and short staffing, sometimes it seemed as if I was on a roller coaster ride. This year was definitely better than last year with in-person instruction five days a week. But that meant more lesson planning!

Lesson plans include my target or the goal of my instruction and then how I am going to instruct my student concerning that concept. Sometimes the goal and the plan were simple to write and accomplish; other times it was more challenging for me. Either way my stu-

dent must become engaged in understanding so that acquiring that skill may be accomplished. However, sometimes other things such as a home, peer, or physical issue, or medication, or even hunger might cause failure to comprehend the instruction that day. Later, I must revisit that skill as it is foundational to future skills. That process of instruction for innumerable skills is my focus as a teacher; I want to see my students grow academically.

Just as I formulate lesson plans, my Lord, the Master teacher, has a plan for my life. He is seeking to teach me the way that I should go (Psalm 37:23). He wants to guide each step I take. Just like my students, I may get distracted by other things going on around me or think I already know what to do. Other things might tantalize my senses and thus dis-

tract me from my teacher. I miss the direction from the Lord and don't learn my lesson. Do I really want the Lord to guide my steps? Do I really want to walk on His path? He has promised he will guide me with His eye (Psalm 32:18), but am I looking to Him for direction? What about you? What about me? Are we wise students looking to and following our Master teacher? Or are we distracted students to whom He must repeat the lesson again and again? "**But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him.**" His way is best! I need to keep my eye on Him, so that I know the way I ought to go!
