CEF FUNDS MENTAL HEALTH INITIATIVES THROUGHOUT THE DISTRICT

School Counselors, led by Supervisors Jessica Tremble and Jennifer Bergmann, organized initiatives throughout district schools to provide age-appropriate mental health wellness programing. The CEF secured a grant from the McCutchen Foundation to help fund this critical need.

In Their Shoes presented by Attitudes In Reverse for CHS sophomores, showcased 300 pairs of shoes representing NJ youth who have lost hope and ended their lives by suicide, as well as shoes and notes of encouragement from celebrities who have struggled with mental health issues or are allies to those who have. The display, meant to build understanding, empathy and kindness, and encourage early intervention to ultimately save lives was profound, clearly having an impact on students who respectfully viewed the display and interacted with the therapy dogs and presenters. A pledge board was available for students to sign, designed to encourage students to be kind to others who are struggling with mental health issues.

Coming Up for Air, presented by Attitudes In Reverse was presented to students in both CCMS and WWMS this past May. The program, led by Tricia



Baker, a mother impacted by suicide, focuses on having honest conversations with students on topics such as mental health disorders and their statistics, stigma, and signs of suicide. Students received crisis hotline information cards and vital information addressing this sensitive topic. Staff members received "safe talk stickers" allowing students to identify



adults who can provide a safe space to help guide them if they are struggling. The program ended with a chance for students to interact with a therapy dog and receive a

bracelet as a reminder to be kind.









Former school counselor, teacher and noted children's author Julia Cook, and her cute puppies



helped elementary school students, parents and educators learn about kindness, bullying and other age-appropriate mental health well-being in a fun and insightful manner. The award-winning author of numerous children's books focusing on behavior and health brought her innate ability to enter the worldview of children through storybooks to our district in February and May. Giving parents and educators the "what to say" and "how to say it to kids", Julia's goal is to make a positive difference in the lives of children, parents and educators by teaching life-long



problem-solving skills to kids.

School 9, STEM Night



Fifth Grade teacher Marissa Amelio received a CEF grant to enhance School 9's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) Night. Open to all grade 3-5 students and their families, this unique evening partnered School 9 students with Clifton High School's nationally ranked robotics



team, the Mechanical Mustangs, under the direction of Monique Dituri. The Superhero themed evening provided students with open-ended engineering opportunities using supplies funded by the CEF to build "Superhero Lairs" and "Protective Superhero Costumes". Students used their imagination and creativity to



build their own designs with minimal direction from parents or staff.

School 11, Alto Xylophone

School 11 Music teacher Dawn Bartolozzi has enriched her students' musical education by using her grant to purchase a xylophone, providing hands-on experience with an instrument that promotes creativity and coordination. Playing the xylophone encourages teamwork and enhances cognitive skills through rhythmic patterns and musical notation.



School 11, Sensory Boards



Teacher Courtney Sprechini used her grant to introduce Sensory Boards to the hallways of the school. Students love interacting with the board, a welcome addition to the school!



School 17, Wellness Room



Grant recipients Erin Totino and Nicole D'Aloisio created a wellness room in the school counselor's office at School 17. Throughout the year, students have utilized the items in the room to calm down, cheer up, shake off some extra energy, feel more comfortable sharing feelings, and more. The sequin sensory wall and mandala coloring wall have helped students to relax. Flexible seating aids students who need extra

movement. Stools and a sofa provide seating in the room for running counseling groups. A weighted blanket has helped students in times of distress, while the motivational pillows have been much needed reminders for students. The vines hanging from the ceiling have created such a calming, welcoming ambiance in the room.

WWMS, Zoo Zone: Life in the Classroom



Grant recipient Stefanie Morales created "Zoo Zone: Life in the Classroom" using her CEF grant to allow her WWMS 7th grade Science students to care for class pets (a lizard, frog, hissing cockroaches, and hermit crab), as well as hatch bug babies (butterflies, ladybugs, and mantids). Pictured are the first of the mantids hatching! Students were awestruck at the marvels of



nature right in front of them. Some recalled experiencing caterpillar metamorphosis in kindergarten, but appreciated a new perspective and asked great guestions. The CEF applauds innovative teachers like Ms. Morales, who make their classrooms come alive creating an interactive environment that encourages and stimulates curiosity and learning!





WWMS, NJSMA Adjudication Festival

This May, NJSMA Region 1 Orchestra piloted its first MS/HS one day, director nominated festival. Students were given music in advance then given 4 hours to prepare a concert. Students nominated represented all corners of North Jersey's seven northern counties. Thanks to a CEF grant applied for by Effie Yuen and implemented by Justin Louie, 12 of our students represented the 96 students at the festival.



WWMS, TREP\$ Club (Young Entrepreneurs in the Making)

The TREP\$ program encourages students to invent, improve, inspire or imitate a product to sell in the marketplace, giving young students the opportunity to understand



what's involved in running their own businesses and seeing what it takes to be successful. Club advisor Denise Bemke used her grant to offset the cost of workbooks that students needed to purchase to participate in the club. Over 35 students participated in selling a variety of items at a

Marketplace event which took place in April during the Open House for incoming WWMS students.

WWMS, Makerspace Club



Thanks to full funding from the CEF, Makerspace, a place that provides hands-on, creative ways for students to design,

experiment and invent with a variety of tools and technology is thriving in every elementary school. Continuing student enthusiasm in middle school, Makerspace Club advisor Laura Tacchi received a grant to engage over 40 students in the club this

year, continuing this important STEAM initiative!

Greenhouse Revitalization

Students, teachers, and volunteers have brought this unique space back to life and have begun growing radishes, green cross lettuce, and cilantro! Replicating Professional Ceramics

With the funds provided by a CEF grant, CHS Art teacher Shannon Anderson was able to purchase an assortment of Artist Choice glazes for students to experiment with. Students were given guides to follow which enabled them to easily and uniquely experiment with layering colors in unique ways, pushing the boundaries of low fire glazed ceramic. While doing so, students were able to experience the trials and tribulations that professional ceramists face when using hand-mixed glaze, such as colors turning metallic, dripping, or even changing color entirely. Students were thrilled with the outcome of their work, as it clearly stood out from the "school" branded glazes typically offered.





Let Our Drama Students Compete!

CHS Drama students participated in the 2024 STANJ Theatre Competition. Working hard to prepare for the competition, students enjoyed rehearsing their scenes and monologues for this statewide theater competition. Students had an opportunity to meet other student actors from around the state, be adjudicated and receive feedback from judges in the theatre profession, in addition to participating in various workshops led by theatre professionals. A CEF grant secured by drama teacher Lisa Poggi helped defray the cost of admission for the students, allowing more the opportunity to attend.

CELA-B, Sensory Room

A CEF grant enabled Preschool Instructional Coach Connie Fasouletos to begin setting up a designated room to provide a safe and supportive environment for students struggling to manage their emotions and regulate their behavior. The materials purchased made it possible to begin to provide sensory integration therapy for students. Liquid floor tiles capture the student's attention and provide a soothing focal point. By focusing on the calming visuals, the students redirect their thoughts away from stressors which allows them to focus on relaxation, making them ideal for sensory breaks. The touch lights also serve as a tool for relaxation and sensory breaks. Students use them to unwind, de-stress, or refocus during times of sensory overload or agitation.

CELA-B, Sensory Hallway

CELA-B preschoolers are enjoying their Sensory Hallway, thanks to a grant awarded to Assistant Principal Kim Rothschild. Sensory walls provide a range of tactile, visual, auditory and sometimes olfactory experiences that stimulate a child's senses, resulting in increased motor skills and cognitive development,







with emotional regulation, sensory integration and calming and focusing.
