The regular monthly meeting of Glassport Borough Council was called to order by Anthony Colecchi, President of Council.

#### Junior Council – Chazdine Harmon

## Police Committee, Safety Committee - Council President Anthony Colecchi

The next Safety Meeting will be held on Thursday, April 25<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 PM.

The Police Report will be read by Mayor DiMarco.

I would like to commend the Chief for again securing another grant for the Police Department. This grant is for \$51,375.00 and will provide Dash Cameras for five vehicles.

The Jasiah Jones Replenishment Blood Drive will be held on July 1 at the Municipal Complex From 1:00 PM to 7:00 PM. Jasiah is a 12-year-old boy who was diagnosed with a rare brain tumor known as Intracranial Sarcoma. We are looking for at least 30 donors.

I have been meeting with Giant Eagle Mobile Market which is a traveling grocery store with 700 items on it. This program will be coming to the borough, and we will be coordinating with Clairton to be on the same day.

## Borough Manager's Report - Elaina Skiba

The COG has been in contact with Senator Casey's office for a blight/demolition grant. I have been working with the Director of the COG to have Glassport included with this grant. The properties that will be included for demolition are:

- > The Social Hall at Seventh and Delaware
- ➤ The Borough Building
- 8 Residential Properties in the Borough.

A request was made to US Steel for a Community Engagement Donation to help with renovations to the new Borough Building. A check for \$400,000 was presented to the Borough. A press release was issued to US Steel thanking them for the extremely generous donation. A formal presentation will be held at a later date.

The borough has started moving into the new building. There are still renovations going on, but the office will be spending the next week getting moved in and unpacked.

#### **Public Comments:**

Rosemary Bradley – Why are we just hearing now about the new building. Why didn't we have a public meeting on this. How can you take money from the Sewage Fund to pay for the building, I am going to check, but that money is only to be used for improvements to the Sewage Plant and the lines. Where is the Secretary's salary being paid out of?

Colecchi – The salary comes out of the Sewer Fund.

Bradley – Is it already planned that our Sewage Plant is going to be sold? You had a study on that also. Is that something you figure you don't have to fix any sewers.

Colecchi – The Sewage Plant sale is on hold right now.

Bradley – How can you buy a building for \$834, 000 and then put another \$400,000 to renovate it? Why didn't the people get that \$400,000 and decide where it should go.

Skiba – The request to US Steel was made by me asking if they would like to donate from their Community Engagement Money given the condition of the current borough building. They were the one's that came up with the amount of \$400,000 to donate specifically for the renovations of the 12 Monongahela Avenue.

Bradley – That's fine, but wouldn't it have been nice to include the children of the borough? There are 770 kids in the borough that are eligible to ride the bus from Glassport alone, and there isn't one thing here for the kids to do. There was a four-million-dollar loan taken out and there was money slated for Recreation. Where did that money go?

Skiba – Gave a breakdown of the loan and how it was distributed. The initial \$400,000 that was earmarked for Recreation was redirected to the construction of the Police Station only leaving \$74,000 for Recreation.

Bradley – That loan was set for certain projects and the amount was taken from recreation. Now you are going to sell the other asset for recreation. And why was that \$100,000 taken from the Sewage Fund to fund the new building. I guess we will just have to see what the auditors say about that.

Skiba – The auditors were asked that question prior to us taken the money from the sewage fund and they said that with the amount of work that is conducted out of the office for the Sewage Plant it would be allowed.

Bradley - And Mr. Solicitor, did you say it was ok to do?

Muscante - I told them that they should consult with the auditors to see if this would be permitted.

Jamie Trunzo – At last week's workshop meeting, I was asked if the Senior Center had an EIN Number. I contacted the IRS today and they confirmed that the number attached to our bank account is the

number of the Glassport Senior Citizen's Center. It is not under Glassport Borough. So those funds are the Senior Center's funds, not the borough's funds.

It was confirmed that there is no room for us at the new borough building. So, there was \$4,000 budgeted for utilities at the Senior Center for this year. For the first three months, the total for utilities was \$1,897.

We still have \$2,100 remaining for this year, plus you need to remove the Comcast money out of there which is about another \$300 so we are looking at about \$2,400 remaining for the rest of the year. So if we don't have room at the new building, what has changed? We said that the end of May was our cutoff date, but if we decide to stay here, is the borough going to still continue to pay for our utilities and insurance? I have also contacted the director of Allegheny County Community and Economic Development to see if she could help with the roof and things like that. She needs a breakdown of exactly what we are looking for. She said there is a lot of money out there through the Department of Aging and several other agencies. Some of them out be grants and some would be grants with matching funds. Would the borough be willing to come up with the matching funds if I take on the responsibility of seeking and applying for the grants so as not to burden the borough employees. What are our options? Are you closing the doors of the Senior Center?

Colecchi – We don't want to see the center close. We will continue to communicate and work with each other to work out a solution.

Dale Popovich – I am here to talk about the Senior Center as well. Most of my items have been covered. I am not a senior yet, but I will be someday. I look around and see my mom, my neighbors, and why should the seniors have to go anywhere. They built this town. I spoke with Pisciottano's office today, and they told me there are no grants out there, but Jamie spoke to someone and they said there is. So somebody is lying here. I guess we don't know. We need to take care of the seniors.
