## Rosemont Manor Christmas Tea

Thirty-one members and friends of the Lake Frederick Travel Club traveled to Berryville's Historic Rosemont Manor on a very cold and blustery Thursday, December 5<sup>th</sup>. Although a couple of guests wore traditional hats for the tea, most eschewed them in deference to the wind which would have sent them flying.

We carpooled to Berryville and first gathered in the Carriage House for cider and a film depicting the history of the Manor house. Since its first iteration in 1811, Rosemont Manor has entertained both national and



international notables including Presidents Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Richard Nixon, Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy, and Lyndon Baines Johnson, Admiral Chester Nimitz, USN, Winston Churchill, Albert Einstein, Charles Lindberg, and John Wayne. Rosemont has been owned by a succession of notables including the Tyson and Harriman families and Senator Harry Byrd. It was bought by

William and Barbara Genda in 2009 who finished restoration started by a previous owner and opened as a Bed and Breakfast the following year. Since then, Rosemont Manor has become a premier wedding venue and hosts teas throughout the year.

Following the introduction to Historic Rosemont Manor, our group braved the wind to walk over to the Manor house for our tea.



The tea consisted of three courses: a savory course of cucumber and dill open-faced sandwiches, hot chicken salad phyllo cups, and bacon, apple, and brie puff pastry; a scone course of ham, rosemary,

and parmesan and maple cinnamon scones with Devonshire cream and jam; and a dessert course of Byrd Blend shortbread, chocolate mousse, and citrus tartlet. Each course was accompanied by a different tea: Signature Byrd Blend Black tea, Signature Rosemon Blen Green tea, and Christmas Memories.

Traci Fulk was the lucky winner of the door prize, tea for two at a future time. Tea participants were able to tour the gorgeously decorated mansion before heading back to Lake Frederick.

# Wreaths Across America: Winchester National Cemetery by George Darnell

Twelve travelers joined other groups from the Winchester area laying wreaths in the Winchester National Cemetery on December 14. We left the lodge in Shenandoah Shuttle at 10:00 a.m. with Julie driving and headed for the



cemetery. Julie dropped us off on a side street on the west side of the cemetery about 10:30 a.m. and we joined a long line of volunteers waiting to enter at 11:00 a.m. We chatted about where we were from and what trips we had taken until the Civil Air Patrol Cadets opened the gates. Once they did, the line moved fairly quick, and we soon had a wreath and our instructions on how to lay them. We were supposed to read the deceased name

before placing the wreath in front of the tombstone. But that was hard to

do because most of the graves were from the Civil War and the names of the soldiers were unknown.

After laying our wreath, we could pick up more under a clump of trees on one edge of the cemetery. The wreath

laying continued until the formal ceremony by the front gate. Chairs were available as well as hot chocolate, which was welcome on this bright chilly day. The cadets posted the colors, we said the Pledge of Allegiance, and Taps was played. A Park Ranger explained the history of the cemetery and a representative of each military service laid special wreaths on some of the graves. Several local and national dignitaries were present, including Congressman Ben Cline.


After the ceremony, we gathered our group, called Julie, and

# Old Town Alexandria Christmas Walking Tour Dec. 16, 2024 by George Darnell



Fourteen adventurous travelers left the lodge at 3:00 p.m. in a Shenandoah Shuttle headed for Old Town Alexandria. Our driver, Eddie, soon had us on I-66 headed for the Beltway. He skillfully guided our bus through heavy rush-hour traffic to the US-1 Exit into Alexandria. Our restaurant was on a pedestrian only street; so, he dropped us off at the corner on a cross street. We walked a short distance to our restaurant, The Warf. When we entered and announced we had arrived the manager said that we did not have reservations. I showed him my phone with the confirmation phone call confirming our reservation. He said that was not their number and that I may have called the nearby Warehouse Restaurant. He offered to let us stay since we had arrived at 5 p.m. and they had

offer, and they seated us at a long table near the entrance. I called the Warehouse to apologize and cancel our reservation. They were gracious about it.

The Warf is an upscale seafood restaurant (no fish and chips). We placed our orders and soon had our food. Everyone enjoyed their meal and got better acquainted. Dinner did not take the full two hours allotted; so, we had some time to wander around the streets decorated for Christmas. Some of us walked to the dock area to see the Christmas tree and boats decorated for the season. Others did some shopping in the Old Town. We gathered back in front of the restaurant just before our guide, Wayne, met us and it began to drizzle.





Wayne took us to Market Square, which he said was the oldest continually operating farmers market in the country, dating back to the Colonial Period. It had a large Christmas Tree in front. Our next stop was Caryle House, which the owner had moved by barge on the Potomac from Dumfries to Alexandria: quite a feat for colonial times. No tour of Old Town would be complete without a stop at Gadsby's Tavern. It is not open on Mondays. So, Wayne told us some of the history of this favorite tavern of George Washington and Thomas Jefferson. He added some ghost stories to the history of the tavern to add more chill to the evening. We entered the grounds of Christ Church (pictured at the beginning of this article) through the Secreter Garden Walkway/. Wayne explained that George Washington and others had their own pew in

the church to help support it and guaranteed they had a seat on Sunday. All but a few US Presidents have worshipped there after being inaugurated.

From there Wayne took us to George Washington's Town Home. Unlike Mount Vernon, which George inherited from his half-brother, Lawrence, his town home, was completely his own and he enjoyed quiet time there without family or servants. It was his man-cave. By this time, some of us were beginning to fade and fall behind. So, Wayne took us to the lobby of a nearby hotel and finished some highlights of Alexandria while we waited for our driver to pick us up. Eddie was soon there. So, we thanked and tipped Wayne and boarded the bus.

Eddie soon had us back on the beltway headed for I-66. Just before we reached Manassas, we passed the Festival of Lights in Bull Run Regional Park. As usual, once we passed Haymarket, the highway was very dark, but we finally made it to the bright lights of Riverton on Rt. 522. The visitors' gate was wide open; so, we had no problem getting into Lake Frederick. Eddie dropped us at the Lodge, and we thanked and tipped him for a safe trip before heading to our homes.

# Luray and Shenandoah Caverns Trip Jan 20, 2025

The Shenandoah Vally is home to many beautiful caverns. For this trip we will visit two of them and top off the day with a trip to a vineyard.

We will explore eastern America's largest and most popular caverns. Luray Caverns is a US Natural Landmark noted for the profuse variety of formation and unsurpassed natural color. From well-lighted, paved walkways explore cathedral-sized rooms with ceilings 10 stories high, filled with towering stone columns and crystal-clear pools. Also hear the haunting sounds of the world's only Stalactite Organ creating music of symphonic quality from stone formations.

In addition, we can experience the history of America at the Car & Carriage Caravan Museum in an exhibit featuring over 140 items relating to transportation including cars, carriages and coaches dating from 1725, along with the Shenandoah Heritage Village, a collection of restored historic buildings creating a small 19<sup>th</sup> century



farming community including the Luray Valley Museum showcasing artifacts from the 1750's to the 1920's. We can have lunch at the Hard Times Café on site before visiting Shenandoah Caverns.

Shenandoah Caverns has been thrilling visitors for almost 100 years. Explore a world of breathtaking natural wonders, incredible geology and extraordinary crystalline formations waiting to be admired and photographed. You'll be delighted by soaring rooms like Long View Hall. And you'll be amazed at the variety of unique, intricate and unexpected formations like Capitol Dome, Diamond Cascade & Rainbow Lake. Also see our other attractions: American Celebration on Parade (open seasonally), Main Street of Yesteryear, and the Yellow Barn.

Our final stop will be Wolf Gap Vineyard, which we missed on our Fall Colors trip in 2024.

**\$60 covers round-trip bus transportation**. Admissions, lunch, wine tasting, and driver's tip are not included.

The minimum for the trip is 12 and the maximum is 18. Register on MTL Events and drop off your registration check, payable to "Lake Frederick Travel Club," with your contact information and date of the trip, with the lodge concierge no later than January 13, 2025.
