Royal Horseshoe Farm Trail Ride & Back Room Brewery Lunch

It was a beautiful and enjoyable bus ride down Rt. 522, right on Fairground Road and across the Shenandoah via the new Morgan Ford Bridge and Road to the horse barn. There we all met our guides and horses, received instructions on how to ride and guide them up and down the



Within a few minutes we mounted our horses and were off through a bubbling stream and casually riding through the forests, fields and creek bottoms. We



quickly learned the horses go by trees providing just enough room for their sides to clear them, but not our legs. Hence, you better guide them further to the left or right of the big tree or your foot/leg will hit the

tree. Otherwise, they just pretty well followed the leader.

We saw huge oak, walnut and yellow poplar trees and a lot of beautiful green native vegetation. All was peaceful and quiet with some chatter going on among riders and our horses.





Chaco and I were about mid-pack just trotting along and I noticed a rock in the middle of the path, but didn't think much about it. I heard his back hoof hit it and suddenly he/we were charging through the woods like a bucking bronco with his head down totally out of control. I ierked and pulled back as hard as I could to the left, trying to get



his head up and in control and he just kept going. I was thinking he's going to hit a tree and we'll both go down. You don't easily stop a thousand pounds of horse. Somehow, we got back out on the trail and semi-calmed down. The trail guide got to us, asked me if I was ok and I said yes. She said: You sure handled him well. I thought, hell I was just trying to hang on and hoping I/we would live. I actually thought Chaco had hurt his foot and was concerned about him. Told the guide I thought his back right foot was hurt bad. As it turned out his foot apparently knocked the' rock over and stirred up a swarm of Yellow Jackets • One thing that immediately went through my mind when Chaco broke loose, was on the TV show Yellowstone when they were breaking horses, they kept yelling hang on and pull back, pull back, and that's what I did. Thank you, Chaco for getting us away. The others behind us had to take a little detour getting around the Yellow Jackets, and we all mozied on to the barn enjoying our ride.

"Our horses were good and easily responsive to commands. Although the trails were tight, the ride was mostly safe and definitely enjoyable."

"The ride was easier than expected but am chagrined that I had to climb a step stool to mount my horse." We all did.

The beer, lunch, and conversation at Backroom Brewery was enjoyable. It was nice to meet Jason, the owner of Shenandoah Shuttle when he relieved Steve.

Gettysburg Battlefield Trip Report

September 23, 2024

This was the Travel Club's third trip to Gettysburg with Sam Kerns and Rick Turner. Eighteen travelers joined them on a Shenandoah Shuttle at 8 a.m. as we headed north on a cool, drizzly morning. Rather than traveling through Harpers Ferry, Frederick, and Thorton, as we did on previous trips, Sam and Rick took us along Lee's route into Pennsylvania along the Valley Pike across the Potomac River at Williamsport, MD. Then we turned east through Chambersburg, where we make a rest stop at Sheetz. From there it was a short drive to the Gettysburg Battlefield along the route that Lee's troops followed.

As we rode to the battlefield, Sam and Rick explained what Lee was trying to accomplish by invading the North and gave us backgrounds on the military commanders on both sides. They had provided us with PDF handouts in advance.



By the time we reached the battlefield, it was raining steadily and those who brought umbrellas and rain gear were pleased that they did. I was not one of them. The bus parked near the Eternal Light and travelers gathered on the sidewalk around Sam and Rick as they used briefing boards to explain the first day of battle on July 1. Bill Johnson made the boards for use in military training sessions that he did before retirement. He donated them to Sam

described Confederate troop movements. Confederate cannons are still lining the road in the woods acing the hill that Pickett's Brigade assaulted on Day 3.

From the Eternal Light we drove to the Lee Monument in the area occupied by Confederate troops on Days 2 and 3, where Sam and Rick







Our next stop was lunch at the Appalachian Brewery located in a commercial area on what was part of the battlefield. We took advantage of the comfort of the restrooms before gathering around lowtop and high-top tables for lunch. The



beer, food, and service were outstanding.



Before reboarding the bus, Sam and Rick used the briefing boards to orient us to the battlefield and prepare us for the afternoon. We drove past Devil's Den on our way to Little Round Top, where we walked in the rain to boulders near Chamberlain's Monument. There Sam and Rick described the battle there and how Chamberlain's bayonet charge had saved the Union flank.

Our final stop on the battlefield


was by the clump of trees, surrounded by an iron fence, that was the objective of Pickett's charge, where he lost 60% of his men. There, Rick, now dressed in

Union Blue, described the Confederate offence and Union defense, that ended Day 3, and the Battle of Gettysburg.



Before leaving Gettysburg, Sam asked our driver, Julie, to stop in the parking lot near the Union cemetery and old visitors center. There he read Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, a fitting end to our tour of the battlefield.

On our way home we made a rest stop at the Maryland Welcome Center on US 15, before heading through Frederick, Harpers Ferry, Charles Town, and Berryville, all sites of Civil War conflict, before arriving at Lake Frederick and home. We tipped Julie, thanked Sam and Rick, said our goodbyes, and noticed that it was not raining in Lake Frederick. Another outstanding trip! Thanks to those who shared their photos.

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Fall Colors Tour of Fort Valley & Edinburg with Winery Stops, Oct. 23, 2024

Our Fall Colors trip this year will take us to Shenandoah County museums preserving Valley life in

the 19th and early 20th centuries. Our first museum is in For Valley, hidden in the heart of Massanutten Mountain, just a short drive from Lake Frederick. George Washington surveyed the area for Lord Fairfax and later considerer it an ideal spot for a last stand against the British in the American Revolution. Today, it provides access to many recreational areas in the George Washington and Jefferson National Forests that surre in it, and it is home to family farms and estates. The museum is a local mass roots effort to preserve the history of the area from pre-Owith to the present.



Our second museum, wine shop, and restaural in the restored Edinburg Mill. We will visit the museum, browse the shop, and have lunch, perhap with a glass of local wine, before heading to our first Shenandoah County winery/vineyard. If nature cooperates, we should see plenty of fall color along the way before returning to the lodge, perhaps for a late supper.
