Wine Tasting & Cowboy Lunch

What a marvelous trip 12 of our Travel Club members took on Saturday, March 23 as we accompanied Classy Cowboys down through Front Royal, east across the Blue Ridge Mountains and into Mosby's Rangers Country, to three beautiful wineries in the Delaplane,

Virginia, area. The weather was gorgeous, the company delightful, lunch outstanding, and the wines superb! All three wineries are located on beautiful, large farms, and each offered something a bit different!

Desert Rose Ranch & Winery in Hume



Our first stop was at the Desert Rose Ranch & Winery on Hume Road where we arrived just as the tasting room was opening. Linda and Gary, proprietors of Classy Cowboys and our tour guides on this trip, hosted us for lunch in the tasting room. They set out a wonderful array of fruit, vegetables, chips and dips, and meats and cheeses along with some delicious sandwiches while we enjoyed tasting the wines the winery offered. We were able

to purchase a glass or bottle of wine to enjoy with the lunch or enjoy water with our lunch and purchase bottles of wine to take home for our personal

enjoyment. After lunch, several of us enjoyed petting the animals in the farmyard out back while others enjoyed walking around the property enjoying the brisk air and lovely scenery. Then we were on to our next stop.

Aspen Dale Winery at the Barn near Delaplane

Second on our list of wineries was Aspen Dale Winery. We arrived at Aspen Dale to be greeted by the owners who accompanied us to their special tasting table in their newly

designed lower tasting room.

It was furnished with a rustic long table where they had set

up a tasting plate containing accompaniments of salami, cheese, crackers, and chocolates for enhancing the different wines we were offered. As Greg Carr, the owner presented each wine, he gave us a history





of its vintage and a bit about its grapes. He mentioned that they use only Virginia-grown

grapes in their wines and have recently introduced two new vintages and expect to introduce three new wines in the near future. Something to look forward to going back to the winery to taste!



Winding Roads Cellars near Markham

Our last stop was at Winding Roads Cellars, owned by Scott & Linda Culver, where we joined a rowdy group of tasters already enjoying the wine and live entertainment. At this winery, we had the choice of partaking in a complete tasting or simply enjoying a glass of wine with

HIGH TEA AT ROSEMONT MANOR, BERRYVILLE, VA AND HISTORIC MILLWOOD, CLARKE COUNTY

Tour Details: We will leave from the Lodge and travel to the Village of Historic Millwood. We will have the morning to explore this charming little village and learn about the history and the famous people who lived in Millwood. Following this tour we will go to Rosemont Manor where we will be greeted in the Carriage House with a beverage and learn about the estate and some of its history. We will enjoy a Tea Service prepared by Rosemont chefs who carefully plan a threecourse menu, preparing sandwiches, scones and sweet treats that will complement each of the teas served. Recipes are crafted using seasonal fruits and vegetables. Guests may find savory sandwiches that pair well with Rosemont's Byrd Blend black tea. Other menu items include delectable scones that marry with our Rosemont Blend green tea. Tea service includes a sampling of desserts. Following tea service, we

will be able to tour the Manor House and the beautiful grounds and spend some time relaxing on the porch while enjoying the views of the grounds.

There is a great deal of interest in this trip so get your checks in to the Concierge Desk to reserve your spot. Our trips fill up quickly.

A BIT OF HISTORY ABOUT THE TOUR HIGHLIGHTS

Millwood Commercial Historic District is a national historic district located at Millwood, Clarke County, Virginia. Developed after the American Revolutionary War around the Burwell-Morgan Mill along Spout Run and one of the largest in the area. It is near several roads important in the colonial era, including Route 17 and Route 340. Col. Nathaniel Burwell (1750-1814), who owned over 5,000 acres in the agriculturally productive area constructed it with General Daniel Morgan (1736-1802) as his business partner.

The mill had become derelict by the 1940s, when it was acquired by the Clarke County Historical Association, which restored it and operates it as a living history museum. This district includes 10 additional contributing buildings in the village of Millwood. They include a log building (c. 1800) that was originally part of a tannery along Spout Run and later used a tollhouse; a log building (c. 1805) that was used to store liquor and was later converted into a residence; the frame miller's house (c. 1830 located directly south of the mill); a brick store (c. 1836 that partially burned in 1935 and still functions as a store).

The remaining buildings are associated with the village's commercial core in the late 19th and early 20th centuries: a 1-story stone and frame outbuilding that may have once been used as a cooper's shop; a frame, 11/2-story, late-19th century commercial building; a 11/2-story frame commercial building that once housed the Millwood post office (c. 1900); a 1-story, formed concrete block building (constructed ca. 1928, as a car showroom and now used as an antique shop); and a 1-story, brick former service station (c. 1930) that has housed the post office since 1985. The commercial buildings are directly visible from the mill and the district was drawn to exclude residential, religious and educational buildings. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2006.



A Brief History of Rosemont.

Throughout its 200-year history, Historic Rosemont Manor has embodied the graciousness of

true Southern Hospitality. Rosemont is a fine old Virginia mansion set on a knoll facing east over the Shenandoah Valley to the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Originally the 5,000-acre property was bequeathed to the first High Sheriff of Clarke County, George Horton Norris in the early 1800s. Norris built the manor, which he named "Rose Mont", as a wedding gift for his bride, Jane Bowles Wormeley in 1811. It was constructed in the popular Georgian style of that time. The Norris family continued living at Rosemont until 1854, when Norris's granddaughter married into the wealthy Tyson family of Baltimore. The Tysons added the Grand Portico, with its gabled pediment and fluted Doric columns, on east side of the manor house.

The main entrance was moved there, and carriages delivered ladies and gentlemen dressed in Victorian finery for spectacular evenings of dining and dancing. In 1864, the War Between the States was in full force throughout the Shenandoah Valley, and the grounds at Rosemont became the focal point of the Battle of Berryville, with Northern troops assembling lines on both sides of the manor.

To date, numerous Civil War relics have been excavated from the property. Rosemont remained in the Tyson family for nearly 50 years. Rosemont changed hands several times just after the turn of the 20th century and was then purchased in 1910 by New York attorney J. Low Harriman and his wife as their country home. The Harrimans added a large twostory wing to provide additional quarters for their frequent guests. They did extensive remodeling of Rosemont, changing the floor plan and adding the impressive two-story grand staircase. They also added a south extension onto the existing library and a sleeping porch above, as well as a sunroom off the dining room.

The Harrimans sold Rosemont in 1917 to William and Anne Smith, who kept Rosemont as their primary residence until the late 1920's. In 1929

Virginia Governor Harry F. Byrd, Sr. purchased Rosemont. As Harry Sr. continued his rise to political power as a U.S. Senator, the manor evolved into a haven for politicians, and the grounds became a landing pad for presidential helicopters. Harry Sr. lived at Rosemont until his death in 1966. Rosemont remained in the Byrd family until 1997, when it was purchased by Randy and Sue Jones from Northern Virginia who made extensive restorations. The Joneses also continued Rosemont's legacy of playing host to prominent politicians, community leaders and charitable fundraisers.

Purchased 2009 by William & Barbara Genda of Clarke County in part to keep it from being lost to development, Rosemont's renovations were completed one year later and opened to the public for the first time in 200 years as an exclusive bed and breakfast and special events venue.
