Our final thought is for members and family members who are not in good health; we wish them a quick recovery.


We end with the hope of meeting or seeing each other soon, with the wish of health and serenity to all of you.

NORTH AMERICAN ALPINE REMEMBER THE 4TH AND 11TH NOVEMBER – LEST WE FORGET

Video conference organized by Gruppo Alpini Autonomo Vaughan

This presentation began with the reading of a letter from the National President Sebastiano Favero, which reiterated that November 4 is the day of the celebration of National Unity, for it was for Italy the date that the World War ended. He addressed recognition for those who have sacrificed themselves for national unity.



The presentation continued with the reading of the <u>Preghiera del Alpino</u> (Vittorio Di Buglio), with film clips from the Great War, with images of the many Italian Monuments honouring our fallen Alpini soldiers, as Danilo read the <u>Prayer for the Fallen Soldiers</u>. The original video of the ceremony of the <u>Unknown Soldier</u> on November 4, 1921 at the altar of the Fatherland was shown, followed by a video ceremony of the November 4, festivities of the Italian Armed Forces at the Altar of the Patria in Rome with the National President Sergio Mattarella.

The focus was then turned to the commemoration of November 11, <u>Remembrance Day for Canada</u>, with the reading of the famous poem <u>Flanders Fields</u> (Video.) We remembered soldiers of fallen allied nations, fighting our allies in the First World War, in particular a young Canadian pilot shot down in the Montello area on January 1917. A video of a ceremony conducted by the Alpini of Giavera, Veneto in the British Cemetery of Giavera was also presented.

The video conference continued with the reading of the <u>Prayer for the Alpini Solders Who Passed On</u> (Vittorio), prayers from the military chaplain Don Vitaliano Papais and the trumpet sound and a minute of silence

The final comments focused on the COVID-19 restrictions imposed on use, thus forcing everyone to limit participation and even for some organization to cancel the traditional ceremonies of November 4 and 11.

celebration The of **Alpine** the Grandparents Day was cancelled due to the Covid-19 restrictions, and so the executive council (photo - top two rows) organized a meeting in Piazza Tagliavini in Woodbridge to celebrate the new 90year-old Alpine members. In front of the Fallen Italian Worker's Memorial, we met to hear the stories of these Alpino pioneers who emigrated in the 1950s. Stories of their life here in Canada made up of difficulties, sacrifices, prejudices, and dangers.











The oldest of the 90 year olds, Alpino Luigi Bassi, born in 1926, welcomed the newer 90 year olds born in 1930: Gino De Zotti, Giuseppe Menegon and Renzo Tesolin. (Photo first row) We have 8 in our group who are in their 90s. Other members who turned 90 this year that could not make the photo shoot are: Pietro Gasparotto, Olivo Pasquali, Luigi Turrin, and Alpini sympathizer Antonio Pigat (who now lives in Port Colburne).

GINO DE ZOTTI was born in Vittorio Veneto, Treviso, on 7 August 1930. He did his military service in 1950, in the 3rd Mountain Artillery Regiment in the Julia Pio Spaccamela barracks in Udine. Gino immigrated to Canada in 1954 and for the first few years he did various jobs. From 1962 to retirement he worked as a Carpenter. In front of the monument he recalled friends who had fallen from scaffolding, including someone who died. Immediately after his arrival, he too suffered a fracture in his arm falling from a poorly constructed ladder, and got married with his arm in a plaster cast. After several years, he took a second fall from a scaffold, fracturing his hip and knee.

GIUSEPPE MENEGON was born in Vittorio Veneto, Treviso, on 7 January 1930. He served in the 8th Regiment of Julia in Cividale del Friuli and immigrated to Canada in 1959. Giuseppe remember the first years in which Italians were discriminated against, insulted by Canadians for being Italian. The police always kept an eye on them. They would receive a fine if they were seen drinking beer on their front porches or balconies and they were not allowed to walk in groups of 3 or more. When Giuseppe and his wife moved into their first house, the neighbour, a Canadian, learned that they were Italians and seeing them unload a demijohn of wine and other tools unknown to them from a van, began to insult them. After several years, they became great friends, drinking a glass of wine together produced from those unknown items.

RENZO TESOLIN was born in Fiume Veneto, Pordenone, in March 1930. He did his military service as an Alpine Julia in Udine in the Pio Spaccamela barracks. He immigrated to Canada in 1952. Renzo was a welder in Italy, but when he came to Canada his profession was not recognized, and the economy at the time in Canada was not doing well. The work was little and at first a friend from his hometown gave him work putting down fresh sod on lawns of new houses. When not even this friend had work for him, Renzo cried wanting to return back home to Italy but didn't have the money to do so. His father encouraged him to stay, telling him to try to raise more than a thousand dollars so that once he returned to Italy he could buy a house. Eventually, after years and several jobs, he obtained a welder's license and worked in his field. He was well liked by his Canadian employer and he was able to buy a house and raise a family here in Canada. Renzo also suffered an accident at work, falling from an iron beam that he was preparing to weld from a height of 5 meters. Luckily he ended up on a pile of scrap lumber receiving only minor bruises.

It has been a long hard fought journey from those years of hard coexistence in a foreign land, where the "Anglo Canadian" population would frown upon our cultural foods and our Italians gathering. Today through our hard work and perseverance we have gained the respect of our fellow Canadians of all cultures. Our Italian Heritage is displayed all over the city, linked to many of our culture centers, streets, and monuments in public places. Our heritage, culture, and contribution to the building of Canada have been acknowledged both provincially and federally which dedicate the month of June as Italian Heritage month. Proudly in that month we salute the tricolor placed in Canadian public buildings. We also recognize the merit of these our Alpine pioneers of the second Naja who, as good citizens of sound principles and with the classic Alpine way of doing things (Quietly moving forward), have contributed to the progress of this great nation and to arouse respect for Canadians Italian people and their culture.
