What Happens As The Economy Slows?

Delaware's Economy Shrinks in 2023: Only State with lower GDP than the previous year:

DOVER, DE: In 2022, Delaware's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) reached approximately \$75.17⁵ billion. However, 2023 saw a slight decline, with the state's real GDP dropping to \$74.26 billion. This decrease in economic output marks a slower growth rate compared to the overall U.S. average during the same period. Delaware was the only state to show a decline in GDP over the period.

When compared to neighboring states such as Maryland, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, Delaware's economic performance appears relatively modest. While the national economy has shown resilience and growth, Delaware's economic indicators suggest a need for revitalized strategies to boost local industry and business environ-

The state's modest economic performance highlights potential areas for development and investment to ensure future growth aligns more closely with regional and national trends. As Delaware moves forward, addressing these economic challenges will be crucial for sustaining and enhancing the state's economic well-being.

Additionally, the slowing state revenue growth, attributed to the underperformance of Delaware's economy, is expected to impact future state budgets. This financial constraint underscores the urgency for proactive measures to stimulate economic activity and secure the state's fiscal health. Addressing these economic challenges will be crucial for sustaining and enhancing Delaware's economic well-being.

Kirkwood Highway Set for Transformation: Community Feedback Shapes Future Plans

WILMINGTON, DE: The future of Kirkwood Highway is taking shape, with community input guiding the Kirkwood Highway Land Use and Transportation Plan. At the May 22nd Advisory Committee meeting, members provided insights to help redesign the corridor between Newark and Wilmington.

The plan envisions Kirkwood Highway as a multimodal corridor, shifting from auto-oriented design to one promoting biking, walking, rolling, and transit use. This transformation aims for safe, accessible transportation and enhanced connectivity to schools, parks, and businesses.

The Advisory Committee, comprising representatives from local organizations like the NCC Chamber of Commerce, Town of Elsmere, and Delaware State University, plays a key role in providing feedback, though it doesn't make decisions. Their local knowledge aids the project

team in shaping recommendations. Despite projected declines in popu-

Despite projected declines in population and employment—losing about 1,300 residents and 1,400 jobs over 30 years—market demand exists for approximately 1,000 new dwelling units. Mixed-use development in aging commercial centers and converting commercial properties to residential use are being considered to address high vacancy rates post-pandemic.

Enhanced transit elements are crucial, with a proposed budget under \$200 million potentially securing federal funding. Proposals include a new Route 56, micro-transit ser-

vices, enhanced bus shelters, and improved pedestrian access to stops.

Delaware's Revenues Go, So Goes Spending!

What Happens When Revenues Stop Going Up and

Governor Candidates Promise Even More New Spending?

Governor Carney came into office in 2017 facing a \$400 million deficit and vowed not to leave his successor with the same problem.

He won't, but his successor's problem will likely be much worse. Governor Carney has dramatically increased the State's base spending level while presiding over a flat economy.

History shows that higher spending requires higher revenues, but the revenue forecast for the state is essentially flat for the next couple of years.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Delaware's government dramatically increased spending to match COVID-19 revenues. This higher spending base means there is an inherent demand for more spending to support the higher salaries and more programs added during the COVID-19 spendathon.

One example of higher spending is in education. Education spending has risen 34% in the last eight years despite the drastic decline in education outcomes. Another spending example comes from the

Governor's budget proposal for Medicaid, which is "nearly 40% of the operating budget growth [in the proposed budget]." The state significantly expanded the Medicaid rolls in Delaware during COVID-19, and the costs are now

"built-in." Education and Medicaid account for half of Delaware's spending.

Despite the flat revenue forecast, the major gubernatorial candidates are all touting 20% plus spending increases in education, "green" energy subsidies, Medicaid, etc. These spending proposals will rapidly eliminate John Carney's attempted budget reserve.

Delaware State Government Spending Much Higher than the Budget Suggests

In a recent revelation, the actual amount of money spent by the Delaware State Government has been unveiled to be significantly higher than previously understood. According to the National Association of State Budget Officers (NASBO), Delaware's total expenditures for the fiscal year (FY) 2023 reached a staggering \$15.5 billion. This figure encompasses general funds, other state funds, bonds, and federal funds.

The disclosure comes in the wake of NASBO's comprehensive report, which indicated that total expenditures across all states for FY 2022 amounted to \$2.9 trillion. These expenditures varied widely among states, from a low of \$4.7 billion in Wyoming to a high of \$467.6 billion in California

Delving deeper into Delaware's financial landscape, NASBO's data highlights the state's recent expenditure trends. The figures reveal a consistent increase in spending over the past few years:

- FY 2023: General fund spending was \$5.9 billion, with total spending, including federal transfers, hitting \$15.5 billion.
- **FY 2022:** General fund spending was \$5.1 billion, with total spending at \$14.4 billion.
- **FY 2021:** General fund spending was \$4.5 billion, with total spending at \$13.3 billion.
- **FY 2020:** General fund spending was \$4.5 billion, with total spending at \$11.9 billion.
- **FY 2019:** General fund spending was \$4.4 billion, with total spending at \$11.3 billion.

These numbers underscore a significant upward trajectory in Delaware's expendi-

tures, reflecting both the growth in statefunded initiatives and the substantial influx of federal funds, particularly in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

A striking aspect of this financial surge is its contrast with Delaware's population growth rate, which has hovered around 1% annually. This disparity suggests that the state's spending growth has vastly outpaced its population increase, raising questions about the sustainability and efficiency of such fiscal policies.

Delaware Economy Shrinks, Only State with a lower GDP than last year!

WILMINGTON, DE: According to data compiled by Visual Capitalist and released in an infographic earlier this

month, Delaware had the Lowest Real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of any state in the nation in 2023. GDP is the total monetary value

of all the finished goods and services produced within a particular jurisdiction over a specific period and functions as a broad measure of economic health. Visual Capitalist noted that "while the U.S. economy defied expectations in 2023, posting 2.5% in real GDP growth, several states lagged behind. Delaware witnessed the slowest growth in the country, with real GDP growth of -1.2% over the year, as a sluggish finance and insurance sector dampened the state's economy." Delaware was the only state

posting a negative GDP growth rate. The First State's poor performance outpaced #2 on the list, Wisconsin, by more than a full percentage

Delaware's Healthcare Spending Exceeds National Average

DOVER, DE: Healthcare spending per capita in Delaware surpasses the national average, with costs consum-

ing a significant portion of the state's budgetapproximately 25% or \$1 billion in FY 2017. Medicaid

growth outpace national averages. Demographics play a crucial role, with an aging population and higher rates of chronic disease exacerbated by social determinants like poverty and food scarcity. Despite high spending, Delaware's healthcare outcomes rank 31st nationally, with elevated rates of cancer, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, infant mortality, and premature death. Healthcare infrastructure is concentrated, with six acute care hospital systems, leading to inefficiencies and inflated costs without commensurate health improvements.

DOVER, DE: Delaware's House approved House Substitute 2 for House Bill 13, securing financial aid for residents to purchase and install home electric vehicle (EV) chargers. The bill, passed by a vote of 21 to 13, allocates assistance through the Delaware Sustainable Energy Utility (DSEU), funded by the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative. Low-income applicants could receive up to 90% of the costs, while others could get up to 50%. However, details on eligibility criteria and funding allocation remain unclear. The measure heads to the Senate Environment, Energy & Transportation Committee for review.

Crafted in collaboration with state educators, Meyer's plan addresses urgent education challenges in the state. In his plan: Matt Meyer aims to modernize the school funding formula, proposing an increase of \$3,400 to \$6,400 per pupil. He advocates for surpassing starting salaries in neigh-

boring states to tackle the teacher shortage. Meyer pushes for universal pre-K access statewide and aims for grade-level reading proficiency by third
