Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. Many have accepted His gift, others have not even heard about it, and some have chosen to walk, or run, away from the gift, not because of the giver, but because of other more challenging reasons and sometimes fear. We have the opportunity this season to start again, that is what a resurrection can be, a chance to start over, just like a new morning, even when our bodies and souls do not feel like marching on!

I invite you to participate, as you are able, in the events of Christ's Passion and His Victory for us in the Resurrection! We head toward the cross of Christ, however, we go past that spot and into the tomb where Jesus lay, the time of uncertainty and despair for the disciples, until they get to see Jesus once more, and then again and again! We are called now to be His disciples and to be His hands and feet as we march on in this life. We are not called to withstand the "trial" Jesus went through, yet, at times, we face the same ridicule and torment He did! It is in these moments that we need to reach for His strength and peace to sometimes make it, through the moment itself.

No matter where you are in your journey, Jesus is there with you and is glad to walk or march, along with you and even at times, carry you through.

May God's blessings and Christ's love be with you always!

#### Noisy Offering for March is: Meals on Wheels of the Greater Lehigh Valley

#### **OUR HISTORY:**

Meals on Wheels of Lehigh County's history dates back to 1970, when a task force of concerned citizens began meeting with Lehigh County Commissioners to address the problem of malnutrition among seniors. On Feb. 1, 1971, 50 volunteers from Meals on Wheels of Lehigh County delivered a hot meal and cold bagged meal to nine clients on three separate routes.

Also in 1971, the Mayor of Bethlehem's Task Force on Health and Welfare started Meals on Wheels of Northampton County (then called Bethlehem Area) to provide nutritious and well-balanced meals Monday through Friday to seniors, homebound individuals, and adults with disabilities. Under the direction of Board President Dr. Edwin Frey, the Meals on Wheels board and staff began serving meals to 15 clients on Valentine's Day, 1972.

In the fall of 2016, the Board of Directors from both these organizations began to meet to explore the possibility of a merger. A synergy grant from the Lehigh Valley Community Foundation and the United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley fueled this process. After 2 years of collaboration and 3 distinct phases of planning, Meals on Wheels of the Greater Lehigh Valley officially began on Sept. 1, 2018. In 2019, the organization expanded into parts of Carbon County.

As we look back on our rich history, we recognize that our success is not just measured in years but in the lives touched and the connections forged. Meals on Wheels is more than a service; it is a community of dedicated individuals, volunteers, and clients coming together to make a meaningful impact.

Join us in celebrating our history, embracing our present, and building a future where no one goes hungry, and every individual is valued and cared for. Together, we continue to write the story of Meals on Wheels, one meal, one connection at a time.

Don Pedro Antonio Maldonado lives in the countryside of Honduras where he works on his crops and coffee plantations. In 2019, when the pandemic lockdown happened, it was difficult for Don Pedro and his family to access food and supplies needed to maintain their harvests. His wife even suggested she leave for the U.S. to find employment and help make ends meet. Despite their challenges, Don Pedro and his wife decided they would hold on to their deep faith and stay together in Honduras. Following this decision, they received the blessing they had been hoping for when Church World Service (CWS) and local partner CASM with funding assistance from One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) invited them to participate in a food security program. Pedro received chickens, a piglet, sheep, and a cow. He was given intense training in caring for these animals. He also learned how to start a vegetable garden. Today Don Pedro invites his neighbors to his home to share what he is doing. He says, "I teach them by doing the job, not just giving them theory. They see that if I can do it, our community, which faces limitations, can do it too." He added that since joining the program, his family has made a good income that will allow them to maintain a happy life together in their country. Don Pedro credits all of his success to God. His gratitude and desire to share these blessings makes him a blessing to the rest of his community. His family can stay planted where they are and share the light in their community. Your contributions to OGHS make Don Pedro's good work possible. He shares the light of Christ—revealing God-colors in the world.
