## THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP

As we approach the Lenten season, a time devoted for us to a time of self examination and learning, we might look at that expectation as too much for us to be responsive to. "God calls us into the church to accept the cost and joy of discipleship, to be servants in the service of the whole human family, to proclaim the gospel to all the world and resist the powers of evil, to share in Christ's baptism and eat at his table, to join him in his passion and victory". (United Church of Christ Statement of Faith—original version) This part of our faith heritage proclaims that God is calling us to accept the cost and joy of discipleship. Yet, as we look at costs, we want to know how much? What is it for? Do I and others really want to or have to buy into this cost? Discipleship is too hard for me, let someone else handle that for this church. I will do what is comfortable and pleasing to and for me.

If we take our budget and divide that by the number of members of the church rolls we might be able to define a dollar cost of discipleship for the church. However, there is more to discipleship than just our tithing of income or giving to a church budget, mission or project. There is a cost of our time. There is a cost of our talent. There is a cost of what we are not doing while we are being a disciple of Jesus, isn't there? Well, there should not be a cost like that because we are to be His disciples when, ALWAYS! That is a dramatic cost and might be a bit too challenging for us to contemplate, yet alone accomplish. Discipleship is a decision, as I see it, to be a follower of Jesus and to live into His teachings, all of them, even the one that seems to be the toughest — "Love your enemies." OUCH, dear Lord, that one is too difficult, always.

As we undertake this Lenten season, what are we willing to work on and at what cost? We might choose to eliminate a destructive habit or practice, or give up something that we do too often, a favorite food, activity or action. Whatever it might be, there is a cost and a benefit to giving it up. However, the benefit of following Jesus is far more spiritual than truly measurable for most of us. Yes, we can count the years, months, hours, minutes and seconds we serve in Jesus name. We might measure our discipleship by what we have done and what we will do. However, will we take up the cross this Lent and follow Jesus? That might just be too high a cost. Yet, if we want the church to prosper, we ourselves need to make a recommitment to our Savior, the One who actually was nailed to a cross for ALL of US! Not a select few, all of us as sinners and imperfect individuals were and are offered a new redemption because of Christ. His cost seems to be too much, yet he trusted God and went where God asked Him to go. We often drag our feet, find an excuse, look at our lives and say "That's too much!" We are faced with many decisions each day we breathe. We are challenged to love unlovable and selfish individuals. We are part of an imperfect institution that stives to do the best it can for one another and for the community around us, close and far away. And if it costs too much or we don't agree with something, we become disinterested in it fairly quickly. That is how we might define our discipleship, but thanks be to God that the first disciples took on the task and learned form the teacher and passed on those learnings, as they understood them!
