The church has continually evolved since that first Christian Pentecost in many ways and seems quite different today. However, perhaps in this last year, we may have become more like the early church, in some ways, as we have gathered at home instead of in churches or other large spaces to worship. The community aspect of being together has not been the same, however the Spirit, always present, always with us, and always working in and through us, has been the same today as it was on that blessed day in Jerusalem so long ago.

Birthdays and As we come into the celebration of Pentecost, we experience the Ascension of Anniversaries Jesus back to heaven from whence he came. This event occurred 40 days after the 4 Resurrection, and then we wait for the promised Advocate that comes to us in Jesus' name. That advocate has, does, and will continue to change us, sometime so subtly that we do not even realize something is amiss. That, of course, was not the case in Missions Jerusalem. The experience of the disciples was witnessed by many, dismissed by oth-5 and 6 ers, and yet the Spirit empowered twelve followers of Jesus to change the world in His name. You might ask yourself what is God's Spirit doing today and how is it moving among us? There may not be a physical or mental notice of change or excitement Lay, Life and for most of us - we have been here before. Yet, for some, it might mark the first Work time they have felt God's Spirit upon them and can realize His strength and His 7 peace. For those who will be celebrating the Rite of Confirmation this Pentecost, it means something has changed as they now have new responsibilities for their lives of faith as their parents, godparents or sponsors and the church are relieved of the Worship vows that had been taken upon baptism. These individuals need the breath of God, Information the Spirit, in their lives as they continue to grow, to mature and to learn and to live as a person of faith within this world where immediate gratification seems the only

Noisy Offering for May is: Northampton Area Public Library

#### Mission:

To be the first point of access for information, self-enrichment, leisure, and social connections

#### Vision:

The Northampton Area Public Library strives to be a dynamic source of information, services, and programs in an ever changing community—always something new.

#### History of the Library:

The first public library in Northampton opened its doors on August 23rd, 1965. It was located in the bay at the north end of the Northampton Memorial Community Center. At the end of 1966 it was determined that the library location was inadequate for the public needs and a building fund was established by Dr. George A. Eichler, with a contribution on October 19th, 1966, but the fund grew very slowly. In October 1971, Mr. and Mrs. George H. Schisler announced that they would provide \$125,000.00 for the construction of an Area Public Library Building. Mr. Jay Ferreira of Bond and Miller, Associates, was selected to be the architect for the building. In October 1971, the Borough of Northampton deeded the land, located on Laubach Avenue, for the new building. On April 17th, 1972, the charter of incorporation was issued. The charter lists it as a nonprofit corporation which can accept tax deductible monetary gifts. The area it serves includes the boroughs of Northampton, Bath, and Chapmans, as well as the townships of Allen, East Allen, Lehigh, and Moore. On September 30th, 1973, the George H. Schisler Building of the Northampton Area Public Library, Inc., was dedicated in honor of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Schisler.

May Mission: Strengthen the Church

#### Keep and Till

OFFERING

OF CHRIST

The Strengthen the Church Offering supports grants which make a difference in the lives of people across the United Church of Christ. The Keep and Till Congregation in the Central Atlantic Conference honor's rural life and faith by focusing on agrarian rhythms, ecological concerns, and creation care. Keep and Till received a grant to stabilize and improve their community garden during the pandemic.

Pastor Samuel Chamelin explains the impact of the grant: "The quarantine made in-person activities more difficult, but it also helped us to understand the value of gathering together. While Keep and Till elected not to worship in-person in any capacity, we did continue to meet in the garden, masked and socially distanced, to continue our ag work (which is spiritual work also). This exposed us to new friends and neighbors in a way that we did not expect."

The grant literally funded the renewal of the garden. Mulch enriched the soil. A 250-gallon trough increased the water capacity. Organic pest control improved the overall yield of the garden.

But most significantly, people in the neighborhood came out to spend time in the garden. Pastor Samuel saw a renewal in people. "When a tornado destroyed the tool shed, one of those new families stepped forward to offer their old shed, in good shape. We had community members come out to hang with us and assist, and they brought real help to the garden project. Then, they noticed that we had issues with weeds and poison ivy. The family used their flame thrower to eliminate the problems. Later, we discovered that others were mowing some particularly weedy areas. And then, finally, we realized neighbors were helping each other harvest food for their tables. In this way, Keep and Till truly became a member of the community. Interactions were not how we might hope them to be; we saw growth in our community, integration with the surrounding neighborhood, and stories of generosity and sharing."

## Lay, Life and Work

The days are getting longer and the Lay Life and Work Committee continues to enjoy staying busy. Please spread the news and tell your family and friends about the upcoming sales and events.

The **bacon dressing and hoagie sales** were enjoyed by many. As customary, the profits from these 2 sales were added to the donut and soup sales and a tithe was determined. A tithe of \$50 each will be sent to the Allentown Rescue Mission, Turning Point, Bethany Home and Northampton Library.



#### **Indianland Cemetery Association**

If you own or care for a plot at Indianland Cemetery, please read the following letter. The Officers and Board members have revised the rules and regulations at the Cemetery. **These will take effect Oct. 1, 2021** 

#### Allowed on Indianland Cemetery:

Allowed year round are small plants, flowers inside planter/flower boxes that are kept on or against either front or back for tombstone or foundation. Displays may not exceed the width of the stone.

Seasonal items or larger items not inside planter/flower boxes are permitted from Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> to April 30<sup>th</sup> each year. These items must be removed by April 30<sup>th</sup>.

<u>Any Seasonal or larger items not removed by April 30<sup>th</sup></u>, or that are not in a planter/flower box, <u>will be removed by Indianland Cemetery Association, Inc.</u> This will provide access for lawn care throughout the Spring, Summer and Fall.

#### Not Allowed on the Indianland Cemetery:

- No Ground Blankets
- No Shrines
- **No** Permanent Plants, Bushes, Flowers or Bulbs
- No Permanent Borders or Fences around grave or tombstone of any kind
- No wires permitted to secure pots and No digging of pots into ground
- No Dogs or Pets allowed on Cemetery Property
- **No** Bicycles, Motorbikes or Snowmobiles

#### <u>Any unsightly plants or displays that interfere with lawn care or burials in the surround-</u> ing areas, will be removed by Indianland Cemetery Assoc.


