Worship Information What are we looking for from our God? What expectations do we have for salvation, ours and others? Do we believe that God will only do what we ask and pray for? What does "with God" really mean? All very valid and perhaps terrifying questions for us to ask and think about. What exactly do we expect from God and why, or how did we get to that position? Some people, those who really don't know God, are expecting absolutely nothing from God. They figure what happens is what happens. No God would allow the things that occur in our world is their stance. We are better off on our own, taking care of what we have earned and learned. Some of the very challenging thoughts that people have and I would dare say, some professed Christians also have. What are we to do in these moments? Give up or go to God?

My response and reaction is certainly to go to God! Be with God! And the most difficult response — Wait for God! That takes faith, that takes patience, that takes courage, that takes a great deal from us on our journey and can be pain stakingly slow and frustrating. The disciples wanted to know — Who can be saved? Jesus' words from Matthew did not provide them any hope, as they understood them. I can honestly say that, at times, His words make no sense to me, yet BEING WITH GOD, helps ease the uncertainty, the pain and frustration, the anger, the hopelessness and so much more that I and many others feel. Yet God will not always do what it is I or you pray for. This is a reality and a frustration all wrapped up together. We expect God to be on our side, which God truly is. However, how do we see our life and our expectations for that life evolving with God? We might proclaim that "God was against me" perhaps through an illness, or even a loved one's death, or some other tragic or challenging event in our life. Yet I, because of Christ, can feel God's presence, even in the mix of this messed up world and life! Yes, in defeat we my retreat and run from God. Jesus reminds us to run to God!

We come to the close of another church liturgical year and begin Advent on the last day of this month! Emmanuel — God With Us! The gift of Jesus is coming and we are reminded to accept the gift in the midst of everything that is going on. How will we respond? With more anger and frustration, or with patience and anticipation of what God will be doing with us in the times yet to come. Our future with God, here on earth, carries no guarantee other than "God is near to all who call, who call from their hearts." (Psalm 145:18-19, NRSV) This my friends, is the answer for us, call on God to be with God!

Adult Faith Formation Class



Noisy Offering for November: Allentown Rescue Mission

MISSION:

The Allentown Rescue Mission rescues, rehabilitates and restores men in crisis across the Greater Lehigh Valley.

Founded in 1900, we are a Gospel Rescue mission serving with compassion and the life-changing message of Jesus Christ.

HISTORY:

1900: Founded by a Miracle

"Ten years ago I was called to be a Rescue Mission Worker. I said I could not do it. When I wrestled with the Lord, He laid it on my heart to work for the cause of rescue missions-a poor drunkard to wrestle with the work of God."

This is what Obadiah Becker, the Allentown Rescue Mission's founder, said at a National Federation of Gospel Missions convention in 1908.

"About that time our little baby fell and struck the back of her head. Three weeks after the accident, she fell over, and one side of her body was completely paralyzed. I prayed to God that our baby might be saved."

Obadiah told God that if his daughter would get well, he would take it as a sign to dedicate his life to rescue work. "My prayer was answered," Obadiah explained. "The little girl is now running around, and I have consecrated my life to the work of God."

For the last 125 years, the Allentown Rescue Mission has addressed the changing face of homelessness, offering Christ-centered compassion to men in crisis throughout the Greater Lehigh Valley.

WHAT WE DO:

Since 1900, the Allentown Rescue Mission has rescued, rehabilitated, and restored men in crisis across the Greater Lehigh Valley.

Our approach is both practical and spiritual, meeting immediate needs while addressing root causes through the power of Christ.

Men in our care have access to a variety of services to meet their physical, mental, and spiritual needs.

THREE CORE PROGRAMS:

Rescue: Emergency Shelter — Men in crisis receive warm meals, hot showers, clean clothes, and respite from the hardships of the streets.

Rehabilitate: Transformation Program — Clients are given life skills, workforce skills, and Bible classes to help them reclaim their lives.

Restore: Clean Team Workforce — Employees perform a variety of jobs, earn wages, and save money as they transition back into the community.



November Mission: Neighbors in Need

The Neighbors in Need (NIN) offering is the third of the United Church of Christ's four annual special mission offerings. This is historically collected on the first Sunday in October.

The UCC Office of Public Policy and Advocacy in Washington D.C. is funded in part by gifts to Neighbors in Need. The goal of the UCC Washington D.C. Office is to make a better world possible by addressing the systemic injustices we face as a country and as part of the world.

The UCC Washington Office was called into being by a resolution at General Synod 10 in 1975. This predecessor body to Justice and Local Church Ministries, then called the Office for Church in Society, was created to assume a leadership function for social action concerns in the UCC and to provide resources to the national, conference and local churches. Foremost among the tasks assigned to the office was identifying, analyzing and forecasting emerging social issues which call for the attention of the denomination.

Today the UCC staff in Washington D.C., in partnership with UCC staff, Conferences, Associations, congregations and individual UCC members, continues this mission by monitoring and seeking changes in legislation at local, state and federal levels through a variety of coalitions and working groups. The policies that guide this work are crafted by UCC members who gather for General Synod to pray, reflect and discern a faithful response to God's call through resolutions and pronouncements on the issues facing our world.

As with all designated donations through St. Paul's UCC of Indianland, you may write checks made payable to the church and place them in your offering envelope circling the word benevolence on the Other line. Thank you!

During the summer of 2023, an average of 172 children participated daily in STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) programs at various sites in and around Missouri's Ferguson-Florissant School District.

The programs, created by Unleashing Potential, a St. Louis-based organization providing educational opportunities to children in underserved communities, were made possible through grants from the United Church of Christ's Neighbors in Need (NIN) offering. The special mission offering, focused on supporting justice work, is traditionally collected on World Communion Sunday.

"Because of Neighbors in Need we were able to offer out-of-school programming this summer, supplementing our existing after-school programs," said Jennifer Wood, manager of Unleashing Potential's corporate and funding gifts.

Opportunities for children

NIN funds also made it possible for the organization to extend its reach beyond elementary school, adding programming for middle-school students as well.

Timmy, a sixth grader, was one of those children. According to Wood, Timmy wasn't sure at first what to expect when he walked through the doors of Immanuel UCC in Ferguson, Mo., where his mother had enrolled him in a "GPS: Geo Power Squad" class that was being held at the church. He quickly discovered, though, that he not only liked learning how software and hardware worked together, but that he also had a knack for writing a script for a new game on a Micro Bit — a pocket-sized computer designed for student instruction.

Meanwhile at the Challenger Learning Center St. Louis, another student, Luna, was tapping into her inner rocket scientist this summer, working collaboratively in creating a mini rocket. While the rocket didn't quite make it to the moon, the prototype did soar, as did Luna's belief that she did have the potential to become a scientist one day.

"It is so important for these children to be encouraged to explore and to believe that they could be scientists or engineers," said Wood. "Neighbors in Need has been a big blessing to us and the children."
