Church Happenings Now and Yet to Come

Financial Update

We have now received financial information **through October** of this year, we are comfortable with our current financial situation, even though we are still in an overall deficit position in our General Fund. Here are some of the highlights of our financial year so far. Thank you to everyone for your continued generosity and support for the ministry and mission of St. Paul's church!

For the year, through October, we have spent **\$9,313 more** than we have received. Our overall deficit, however, is **\$2,270** better than it was at the same time last year. There are a few significant factors that are contributing to this as well as expense timing and those seasonal challenges we always face. **Last year**, at this time, **our deficit was \$11,582. Fuel oil purchases and snow removal costs** are a large expense from the winter season as well as grass cutting in the summer season which are all weather dependent. **Generosity and receipts through October are \$4,916 less than they were at this time in 2018** which is also contributing to our deficit position. We are hopeful that the November/December months were as generous as they have been in the past as we celebrated the joy of Christ's birth and the greatest gift for our lives.

We offer our thanks to all of you for your generosity and support for the ministry of Jesus Christ in our midst, in our community and in the world. Blessings and peace to all as we celebrate God's love for us in Jesus Christ. We are looking forward to your participation with us. Blessings!



Noisy Offering for January is: Meals on Wheels

At Meals on Wheels of the Greater Lehigh Valley, we care for and support some of the most important people in our community. We provide homebound senior citizens and adults with disabilities with home-delivered meals, grocery shopping and other services. Most importantly, we provide them with the kindness and respect that they deserve.

About Us

We pride ourselves on being the leading Lehigh Valley provider for healthy, medically-tailored meals. Beyond simply providing a meal, Meals on Wheels is dedicated to providing customized meals that are designed by a licensed nutritionist to meet 1/3 of the Recommended Daily Allowance and accommodate special diets such as diabetic, renal, pureed, and some food allergies. Nearly 2,000 seniors and people with disabilities depend on us every day to deliver meals directly to their homes and senior centers. We incorporate local seasonal produce into our meals when possible.

Our History

While Meals on Wheels of the Greater Lehigh Valley is a new organization, it has nearly a century's worth of experience providing quality care and services to seniors and adults with disabilities. Our services include grocery shopping, pet food/supply delivery, emergency meals, and more.

Meals on Wheels of Lehigh County's history dates back to 1970, when a task force of concerned citizens began meeting with Lehigh County Commissioners to address the problem of malnutrition among seniors. On Feb. 1, 1971, 50 volunteers from Meals on Wheels of Lehigh County delivered a hot meal and cold bagged meal to 9 clients on 3 separate routes.

Also in 1971, the Mayor of Bethlehem's Task Force on Health and Welfare started Meals on Wheels of Northampton County (then called Bethlehem Area) to provide nutritious and well-balanced meals Monday through Friday to seniors, homebound individuals, and adults with disabilities. Under the direction of Board President Dr. Edwin Frey, the Meals on Wheels board and staff began serving meals to 15 clients on Valentine's Day, 1972.

In the fall of 2016, the Board of Directors from both these organizations began to meet to explore the possibility of a merger. A synergy grant from the Lehigh Valley Community Foundation and the United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley fueled this process. After 2 years of collaboration and 3 distinct phases of planning, Meals on Wheels of the Greater Lehigh Valley officially began on Sept. 1, 2018.

Noisy Offering for February is: The Northampton Area Food Bank

The Northampton Area Food Bank (NAFB) is a nonprofit, volunteer-driven organization serving residents of the Northampton Area School District and adjacent areas. Formed in 1992 by a group of local churches, NAFB initially helped about 50 families, and functioned out of a very small borrowed building. As years passed, the needs of the community increased, and the Food Bank continued answering the clarion call to assist our neighbors. A new facility was opened in 2007, constructed entirely with funds made possible by the generosity of donors, the contributions of local businesses, and the time and talents of hardworking, dedicated volunteers.

The Food Bank presently has over 500 families registered and serves an average of 400-450 families per month – a number that continues to rise. We now offer the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) for clients age 60 and older with proof of an income level of 130% of the federal poverty level or below. If they qualify, they receive a monthly box of food which is provided through Second Harvest, in addition to their distribution through our food bank.

To sustain our efforts, to meet the growing needs and to develop innovative programs and additional services, we welcome the community's compassion and ongoing financial support, as well as donations of food throughout the year. The Food Bank is a 501-c-3 charitable organization and all monetary contributions are tax deductible as allowed by the law.

The Northampton Area Food Bank is affiliated with the Northampton Ecumenical Clergy Association, and is also a participating member agency of the Second Harvest Food Bank of Lehigh Valley and Northeast Pennsylvania.

Eligibility

Client eligibility is based upon the income guidelines of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's Emergency Food Assistance Program. We serve any individuals residing within the Northampton Area School District who meet criteria and referrals from Second Harvest (610-434-0875). If a person is unsure of eligibility, they should call Second Harvest. New clients may register any Wednesday between 9:30 am and 12 noon or the two Saturdays we distribute between 11 am and 12 noon. They must bring photo ID with a current address/posted mail with correct address. The Northampton Area Food Bank distributes bags filled with basic foods to meet client's minimal needs and relative to the number of people in the family. Extra items may be personally selected (according to availability) from the miscellaneous shelves in the foyer – such as beauty aids, soap, paper products, etc. We now have clothing, shoes, seasonal items, household items, etc. During Winter distribution we try to have coats, hats, gloves, scarves and socks available and accept donations of these items also.

Our Mission

The organization is committed to distributing wholesome food, free of charge, to individuals and families who are in need and unable to adequately obtain nourishment with their own resources.

OUR MISSIONS

January Mission: The Christmas Fund

The Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund is a Special Mission Offering that congregations have been supporting for over 100 years. The offering is administered through the United Church Board for Ministerial Assistance, the charitable arm of the Pension Boards. Funds provide direct financial support to those who serve the church and are facing financial difficulties. Active and retired clergy, lay employees, and their surviving spouses may be eligible for the Supplementation of Small Annuities, Supplementation of Health Premiums, Emergency Grants, and/or Christmas "Thank You" Gift Checks.

Our joy at Christmas is a response to God's promise of new life through the birth of Jesus. It is a joy we are called to share widely, through our witness and gifts, both to loved ones and to distant neighbors.

49 active/retired UCC clergy and lay employees in urgent need received emergency assistance totaling \$60,526.

February Mission: One Great Hour of Sharing

When a disaster strikes or people are displaced or made refugees by violence or extreme poverty, you are part of the immediate response and of the long-term recovery. Through OGHS you engage in holistic development programs including health care, education, agriculture, food sustainability, micro-financing and women's empowerment. Because the UCC relates in mutual partnership to churches and organizations through Global Ministries and worldwide response & recovery networks, your contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing put you in the right place at the right time for the relief, accompaniment and recovery of the most vulnerable. You meet immediate needs and you address the underlying causes that create those needs in the first place. Thank you for your generous contribution.

How can one person change the world? Sponsor a child . . . Plant a tree . . . Rebuild a home . . . Visit a prisoner . . . Be a mentor . . . Teach . . . Serve a meal . . . Bring water to the desert . . . Pray . . . Donate . . . the opportunities are endless. And they're all right here. What part of our world is waiting for you to make a difference?

Oebaki (pronounced Oe-ba-key) is a small village in West Timor, Indonesia. It is considered one of the poorest communities in the country. The prefix "Oe" means water, but the drought has stolen this town's identity. Poverty abounds, and families struggle to feed their children.

Imagine having a garden, but not being able to feed your family, or digging into the sand of a dry river bed in search of drinking water.

Imagine your child has been diagnosed with stunted growth, a preventable early childhood condition with lifelong consequences.

Now imagine the world the way God intends.

God imagines a world where all are fed, everyone has access to clean water, and all children grow up healthy. The author of Ephesians writes, "Now to God be the glory, who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine..." (Ephesians 3:20).

Your gifts to One Great Hour of sharing help make this world look more like the world God imagines. In Oebaki, your gifts help support well-trained savings and loan groups that allow families to buy resilient vegetable seeds for farming, yarn for weaving stunningly beautiful traditional fabric, and egg-laying chickens for a sustainable source of protein essential to prevent child stunting. These enterprises produce excess goods that families sell to generate income.

Today in Oebaki, those who once struggled during the dry season and drought can now maintain a diversified diet by eating stored root vegetables from the last harvest, supplemented with greens purchased at the market.

Nelci Tlonaen works hard in Oebaki with her husband and three children—two in elementary school and one entering high school. Despite the current drought, she feels confident that her family will persevere. "Even now, I can afford clothes and food for my children. I don't have any difficulty paying for their school."

That's what happens when we imagine the world as God intends. Through your gifts, a new reality exists for families in Oebaki and around the world. Please give generously!


