As Jesus and the Disciples celebrated the Passover together for the final time, they gathered at a large table in the Upper Room. We know that tables come in many shapes and sizes and all are not used for sitting down for a meal. Some hold magazines or other reading materials, some hold lamps and other electronic devices and some just get used to collect "stuff" that one day might get dealt with. As we enter the month of October there is a table of love, a table of remembrance, a table of celebration, and yes, a table of sustenance prepared for us to come to, along with every Christian sister and brother. The special Sunday is World Communion Sunday and we are invited to come to this table, because Christ himself becomes our gracious host inviting us together. While we will certainly be gathering in a different way as a result of the pandemic, we still will gather at more "tables" than ever; yet it is the One and Only Savior of the World inviting and hosting us, just as He hosted the disciples on that night in Jerusalem at the large table. This meal for us is a symbolic meal reminding us again of Christ's sacrifice for all of God's human creation. It is to be a table of unity and yet it has become a table of divide and exclusion over the years. We need to "qualify" to come to this table and in all truth, not a one of us does qualify to come. Yet, Jesus welcomes us as we are, even as he welcomed Judas to the table that night of betrayal and desertion.

This is a special meal offered to us from Christ. Bread and fruit of the vine are given to remember a decimated body and a bleeding Savior. Not something so picturesque to view, yet so engrossed in love that we have to come, and we need to come, and we ought to come, and yet there are some who are afraid to come, or feel unworthy to come. Why? What has happened at this table? Luther and Zwingli could not agree on the symbolization of the bread and the fruit of the vine. They argued "It is the body and blood of Christ" and "It represents the body and blood of Christ." Division over that which Jesus gave to his disciples and the world – how obscene, and yet how significant that no matter how we view these gifts, we are to be united at this table. United with the host who knows us far better than we will ever know ourselves. What are we to do? Especially because of the challenges of this pandemic! We are invited and we will come to the table, however, the normal table will not be

We gather, united by the Spirit of God together, no matter how far apart we might physically or spiritually be! This year those who gather in our Sanctuaries will be given, upon entrance, a piece of bread and a grape in a plastic bag, safely prepared by me for you. Prepared so that Christ's love may be celebrated, remembered, and shared together, no matter where we physically are. This has been something that I have prayed about and deliberated over with church leaders within our congregation and outside of our congregations. Is it ideal? Probably not, yet it is very, very symbolic of Christ's love and sacrifice for our sins.

So, my friends, I invite you to join me on this World Communion Sunday, October 4th, wherever you feel comfortable being, as we "do this in remembrance of Jesus!"

Advance reservations are recommended for an accurate count with a limited amount of tickets available at the door the day of the event. **Directions for pick up of meals are as follows:** Please enter the upper parking lot at the schoolhouse entrance and follow the roped off area around to the church side of the lot. Someone will meet you there, confirm your order, call it in to the volunteers in the kitchen and when it is prepared, you will drive down to Fellowship Hall, Maple Street and pull up to the curb—church side and your meal(s) will be brought out to you. No one will be entering the building. **Orders are due by Sunday, October 4th.**

OUR MISSIONS

October Mission: Neighbors in Need

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

Houston teens learn wage activism from working adults like them

This summer, with a grant from the United Church of Christ's Neighbors in Need offering, 24 high school students from an economically challenged Houston neighborhood learned about activism and carried out a local campaign for a \$15 minimum-wage law.

The idea came from the basic insight that many Houston residents find it hard to make ends meet, especially workers in fast-food and other service industries. The Rev. Darnell Fennell serves some of those people in both his callings. He is pastor of Just Love Church, affiliated with the UCC and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). He also teaches high school social studies.

With a background in community organizing, Fennell knows people don't have to sit still for economic injustice. He knows the wider UCC feels the same, as seen in statements such as a 2017 General Synod resolution, "A More Just Economy: \$15 Minimum Wage, Living Wages and Job Creation." So he sought the NIN grant to introduce young people to local activists in the national Fight for \$15 wage campaign and involve them in learning by doing.

UNLEASHING POTENTIAL (formerly Neighborhood Houses) OF ST. LOUIS, MO

Denise Carter, early childhood education director, was well aware of a rather large need within the population served by Neighborhood Houses. Many of the families are low wage earners, 75% of them earn less than \$20,000 annually. Truthfully, some simply struggle to provide many basic needs for their children. To that end, she designed a program to meet the health and development needs of infants and toddlers. Thus, the "Baby Essentials" program was birthed. The main goal was to provide diapers and formula for all of the children enrolled at the early childhood education center for families who could not afford a consistent supply. Denise met with interim director of development, Christine Krueger, and shared her desire and need for funding. Christine went in search of those sources. She applied wherever she felt the need of the program matched the granters requirements. Fortunately, she filled out an application for a NIN direct service grant and was awarded \$3,000 in 2019. In 2020, it was reported back to us that 100% of babies ages six weeks to 12 months received milk they needed while attending the Center. 50% of those babies also received one canister of formula per month for home consumption. Lastly, 100% of babies/toddlers ages six weeks to three years had diapers needed for Center and home use. According to Christine, "Thanks to the Neighbors in Need grant, our babies are dry and their tummies are full, and parents, who are

October Noisy Offering: Bethany Children's Home

Mission & Vision

The mission of Bethany Children's Home is to continue an open and affirming Christian ministry, begun in 1863, to serve children and families within our care. We strive to provide a safe place of nurture, protection, and supportive care to aid our residents in their self-understanding, growth, and healing toward a brighter, healthier future.

Our vision is of a community where all youth and staff are safe in their environment and feel safe within themselves. To bring this vision into reality, we provide the resources needed to children and families to work through their losses, enabling them to have a brighter future.

Bethany Children's Home follows the model of trauma-informed care in all programs. Therefore, each program is hosted on campus in Womelsdorf, PA. Because of that, our children's home follows the house-parent model; and are On Call Campus Supervisors (OCCS) available 24 hours a day. Most importantly, Bethany makes sure our youth is safe and secure.

Youth in all of our programs are provided the following:

- Intake Health Screening
- Health oversight and referral
- Psychiatric Services on site
- Observant Spiritual Assessments at intake
- Spiritual Services including moral development
- Siblings can be placed together and receive sibling counseling
- Sibling and family visits available
- Bethany Education Coordinator located on Conrad Weiser School District Grounds responsible solely for Bethany Youth
- Daily life skills training for all youth through cottage living
- Arts and Crafts and Recreation with dedicated programming staff

Finally, our campus includes a full gym with fitness center, multipurpose room, racquetball courts, basketball-volleyball-tennis courts, low ropes course, hiking trails, fishing pond, church with its own recreation center, softball field, arts and crafts building with ceramics studio, health clinic and working farm. Because of all our programs Bethany remains one of the best organizations in the area.

Let's Make a Difference

Bethany Children's Home is a registered 501 (c)(3) organization that provides high quality residential care for school-aged children who are unable to live in a traditional family setting. Currently, Bethany serves over 300 children annually through its residential, shelter care, and short term care pro-

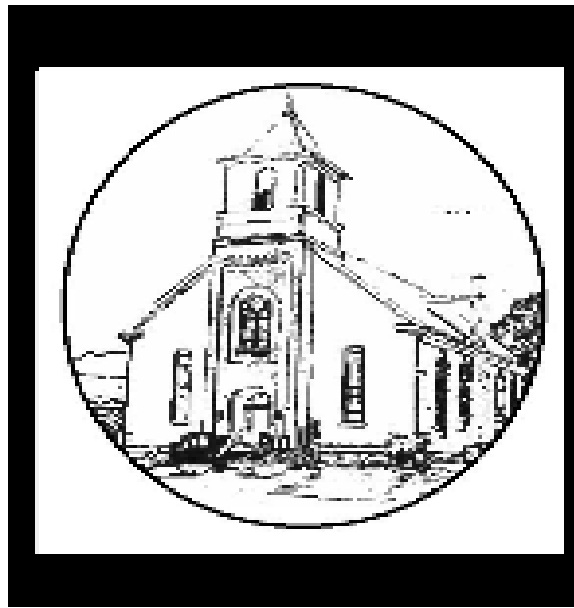
