Highlights from Jordan Bramwell, our September speaker on Queen rearing: His first point was to overwinter a colony, a strong healthy colony is essential! Why make queens? To have a spare; to have better queens overall; to make splits; to promote local stock, and provide genetic selection. The method for rearing queens was explained - patience and decent eyesight are helpful attributes for the process. Comments I found interesting - a drone is genetically programmed to do one job - for example, make scout bees. Another may produce foragers. Thus it is beneficial for a queen to mate with several drones. Jordan tries to keep positive traits - if he has a 'mean' hive, he dispatches that queen, hoping to not reproduce more 'mean' hives. If you are interested in learning queen rearing, there are classes available.

Going forward, money collected from items sold or raffled will be designated for our 'general account'.
