Definitions and Classifications for Aggressive Behaviors

Aggressive behaviors include growling, snarling, barking, lunging, snapping or biting. Problem aggression is directed at companion animals or people who are perceived (by the aggressive dogs) as threats. Depending on which canine behavior professional you consult, aggression may be labeled as fearful aggression, protective aggression, possessive aggression, territory aggression, maternal aggression, pain aggression, impulse aggression (formerly poorly classified as dominance aggression), frustration aggression, predatory aggression, idiopathic aggression, and others. Regardless of your dog's age, breed, or previous experiences, our experienced trainers and counselors can provide you with solutions for aggressive behaviors.

Policy for Treating Aggressive Dogs
