Snacks might be pommes (French fries) & mayo and döner (shredded meat and bread).

School, compared to U.S., is more comparable to a college schedule ending some days at 1:00, others at 5:00.

She did miss the lack of what Annalise considers school spirit.

As part of her time with District 1900 students was her Deutschlandtour ... 6 cities in 10 days on a small tour bus to Hamburg, Berlin, Dresden, Munich, Füssen, and Rothenburg ob der Tauber.

Highlights were Munich oktoberfest, Berlin to the Berlin Wall and the Holocaust Museum, and the pretty little town of Rothenburg.
