PRAISE PRAYER

Years ago I had a friend who was going through a very difficult time in his life, and I greeted him with "Happy Thanksgiving." He replied, "What do I have to be thankful for?"

That conversation got me thinking about how our easy platitudes of "count your blessings" and "there's always something to be thankful for" must sound to those who are truly suffering—especially those today who are laid off, fired, family members abducted and vanished, whose businesses closed, those facing bleak economic futures.

After that conversation, I was inspired to write this poem. Great poetry it is not. But it is a sincere prayer.

It's easy to praise, Lord, for bountiful harvests, for food in abundance when we are well-fed. It's easy to praise you for family and homelife, signs of a prosperous life well-led.

But what about those who have no abundance, who live on the edge of existence and shame?

How can we praise you while others go hungry?

They, too, are your children. They, too, have a name.

And what about those whose health remains broken,
who live with infirmity day after day?

Dear Church Participant:

Once again, the Mountaineer Food Bank, the Facing Hunger Foodbank and the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR) are asking for your help and the help of your church members to support a program that feeds many hungry West Virginians.

Members of the West Virginia Council of Churches and the WVDNR have united in a cooperative effort to ensure needy West Virginia families have access to high quality meat. For many West Virginia food banks, shelters, or needy families this is one of the most difficult foods to obtain. The Hunters Helping the Hungry Program does just that by providing nutritious, low fat, low cholesterol ground venison which can be prepared or used in many ways.

Hunters Helping the Hungry is a unique program involving the Wildlife Resources Section (WRS) of the WVDNR, hunters and generous donors, the Mountaineer Food Bank and Facing Hunger Foodbank. These two food banks are the only West Virginia certified members of Feeding America, a national network committed to feeding the hungry.

Since its inception in 1992, Hunters Helping the Hungry has provided 1,133,225 pounds of venison, for over 1,523,016 family-style meals at a total cost of \$1,737,737.00. Processing costs are \$3.00 per pound, with the average deer producing 35.5 pounds of ground venison.

The food banks are paid only pick-up and distribution costs. WRS manages, coordinates and publicizes the Hunters Helping the Hungry Program. However, it is not allowed to spend license fees on food processing and distribution costs.

This is where the West Virginia Council of Churches enters the scene. WRS requires financial assistance to manage a charitable program this large. Past donors to Hunters Helping the Hungry have included hunting and angling organizations, businesses, individuals and churches. However, as the donations of deer grow, so does the need for financial assistance.

When presented with the Hunters Helping the Hungry concept and need for assistance, the members of the West Virginia Council of Churches voted unanimously to support Hunters Helping the Hungry through the establishment of Share the Harvest Sunday.

Sunday, November 2nd, has been designated as the day in 2025 when each individual member of each participating church will be asked to donate one dollar, five dollars, or whatever they can afford to Hunters Helping the Hungry.

Your donation, be it large or small, whether direct or through your church, will help place a balanced, healthy meal before someone less fortunate. You can help us reach our goal of providing every possible pound of meat to needy West Virginians. Donations are tax-deductible.

Nurturing Faith Ideas 2025, based on the Revised Common Lectionary

November 2: Twenty-first Sunday after Pentecost Read Psalm 119:137-144

This longest psalm in the Bible is an acrostic poem about God's law. There are twenty-two sections in the psalm, and the lines in each section all begin with the same letter of the Hebrew alphabet in order of the alphabet. Write your own acrostic psalm praising God this week, each line starting with a different letter of the English alphabet in order from A to Z.

November 9: Twenty-second Sunday after Pentecost Read Psalm 98

The psalmist calls upon God's people to sing praises to God for God "has done marvelous things." Hymnals are filled with all sorts of song that praise God. What is your favorite hymn? Share it with someone else and tell them why it's your favorite.

November 16: Twenty-third Sunday after Pentecost Read Isaiah 65:17-25

Here we have Isaiah's picture of the new heavens and earth that God is creating. It is a vision of shalom, or peace that ends with peace. What images in this passage speak to your hopes and dreams? How do we join God in working toward this vision of peace in our world today?

November 23: Christ the King/Reign of Christ Read Luke 23:33-43

Jesus was a king though he wasn't the kind of king that the people expected. He was the kind of king that died on a cross out of love, not a king who ruled a country and controlled people. On this Sunday before Thanksgiving, remember all of the things Jesus did and how he showed God's love. Give thanks to God for the gift of his son, Jesus, Christ the King.

November 30: First Sunday of Advent Read Matthew 24:36-44

In the season of Advent that leads up to Christmas, we look back to the past, to the birth of Jesus as a baby in Bethlehem as we prepare to celebrate his birth again. We also, in this season, look forward, to the return of Christ on earth. This passage reminds us that we don't know when Christ will return but we should always be ready for him.

October Session Digest

WORSHIP (W): On October 5, the total estimated communicants were 53 (32 in-person & 21 estimated on-line). The next communion will be on November 2. **If you are joining**

worship from home that day, please remember to prepare your elements in advance.

Session approved the first quarter 2026 pulpit supply. The list of preachers January through Easter will be published in the December newsletter. A 'preacher packet' is being assembled with important information which the preachers will need.

The next committee meeting is November 17. We are working on Advent worship and the first quarter of 2026.

We hope you will make in-person worship a priority at the start of each week.

ADMINISTRATION & FINANCE (A&F): The budget vs, actual report shows the church had a positive balance of \$4,934 for September, and YTD through September a positive balance of \$13,808. On the balance sheet, the general account has \$78,800, and the CNB account (to repay the solar panel loan) \$4,597.

The stewardship task force reported that the 2025 stewardship campaign starts on November 2, with the message 'Journey to Generosity'. Commitment Sunday will be November 23. The nominating committee has filled the class of 2028 slate of two session nominees and one nominating committee nominee.

CHRISTIAN NURTURE (CN): A Women's Circle trip was made to the Capital City Clay on October 28.

Pet collections for the animal shelter continue through October.

The Circle will continue providing cookies for AA and NA monthly.

MISSION & SERVICE (M&S): The Christmas Joy offering is coming up. Look for information in Advent.
