Candidates' Corner—Florida House District 70

Vito Sheeley, Keisha Bell and incumbent Wengay Newton are all Democratic candidates running in Florida House of Representatives District 70. We spoke with each to learn their views on key issues and what they have to offer.



Wengay Newton, Florida District 70 Representative (Incumbent)

Representative Wengay "Newt" Newton served on the St. Petersburg City Council for eight years beginning in 2007 and was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in November 2016. Newton reminds voters, "I'm a product of the environment - born and raised in the district."

When asked what the most important issues in District 70 are, he replied, "Affordable housing and gentrification." Newton said his signature achievement of his first term was getting full \$3.9 million in funding returned to The Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters program (HIPPY) this session, allowing reinstatement of 100 jobs that were lost in the program.

In his first session he co-sponsored a bill that was passed into law creating a task force on affordable housing. Other accomplishments include securing \$1.5 million in funding to improve storm drains in the Rubonia community, bringing back \$275,000 in appropriations for the Sarasota YMCA, and attaining \$365,000 to renovate the facilities of the historic Happy Workers Learning Center in St. Petersburg.

Keisha Bell

Keisha Bell's motivation for running is to propose and pass better legislation and get us going in the right direction. "I feel that with my extensive educational background and a track record of helping people, I'm capable of offering strong representation, and that's what District 70 needs," said Bell.

When asked about the most important issue in District 70, Bell said, "In my house education is a high priority, so if I had to choose, funding for public education would be #1". She asserts that there are multiple critical issues and that they often intersect each other. For example, better education not only leads to better health care, better education is sustained with affordable health care. Also, important family values are supported by every hard-working person's right to a living wage.



Bell describes herself as diverse, well educated, professional and personable. With her community background and analytical skill set, she feels she is someone who is passionate and educated about the issues who can write legislation. She also notes that she mentors youth, and views herself as a public servant (not a politician) looking to get things done.



Vito Sheeley

Vito Sheeley is a former district aid to U.S. Representatives Kathy Castor and Charlie Crist. Sheeley has been actively doing outreach in the District and speaking with constituents. He states it is time for a change. His passion is his community and he wants to help the people who have helped him. He feels this work is his calling.

He believes the two most important issues in District 70 are education and jobs. Sheeley said we have a system that's broken and needs to be fixed, stating "We need to increase funding for public education, pay teachers what they're worth and keep them in the state. Secondly, we need quality, good paying jobs, and a minimum wage increase."

Senator Bill Nelson addressed a joint meeting of Manatee/Sarasota Democratic volunteers in April, where he thanked us and said that our efforts will be important in helping him win this year. He emphasized that the most effective communications with voters are face-to-face, and he reflected on election year 2000 where he first won by speaking to voters at every house in his district, saying "You can learn a lot about life and people appreciate it." He said we must go out and talk about the issues, start conversations and get voters "out of their box."

Nelson carried both Manatee and Sarasota Counties in 2016. He noted that the Republicans usually win mid-term and lose general elections, implying that we can win both this time. Nelson said he decided to run again because of the shape this country is in. As a member of the Armed Services Committee and ranking

member of a subcommittee with jurisdiction over information warfare, it is clear to him that the U.S. outperforms Russia militarily, but that Putin is winning the cyber war. He also reminded us how electing a Democratic governor and turning over some legislative seats can positively affect the appointment of judges in Florida.

Nelson reiterated his priorities that can be successful if Democrats win back Congress:

- Protect the public school system which is the "bedrock of this country"
- Reverse Florida's policy of not accepting Medicaid dollars that are there
- Allow no oil rigs off our coasts
- Expand Everglades restoration
- Address climate change
