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

Anthony Eldon, Candidate for State Senate District 21



Manatee and Hillsborough County Democratic leaders selected Anthony Eldon to replace Amanda Linton, who was the only Democratic candidate to qualify for the State Senate District 21 seat, but withdrew from the race. Eldon is a teacher at Buffalo Creek Middle School. He is also a social media influencer, running the Instagram account [Blk.Thought](#) with more than 70,000 followers, as well as writing a book, 50 Inspiring Black Stories: That Aren't Taught in School.

Manatee Dems Find New Ways to Reach Voters

In the peak of election season, Manatee County Democrats would normally be knocking on thousands of doors, knowing that canvassing is a proven way to win elections. But to remain safe and responsible during COVID-19, the Florida Democratic Party has continued a policy of no canvassing or in-person events, challenging Democrats to find new ways to reach voters. Thanks to generous donations, Manatee Dems have been able to move into print media, radio, digital and social media advertising.

Manatee Democrat newsprint ads in the Bradenton Herald, Anna Maria Islander, AMI Sun, Parrish Village News and East County Observer have promoted awareness of the party, provided voting information and paid tribute to Democratic leadership.

In coordination with the Hispanic Democratic Caucus, Manatee Democrats are working with a local Hispanic radio station, La Numero Uno (99.1 FM and 1280 AM), airing ads professionally recorded in Spanish, as well as corresponding short videos for social media. Ads direct people to the Hispanic Caucus' website floridavota.com.

Manatee Democrats are also delving into digital ads on a wide range of national news sites, where voting messages are targeted to specific local voter groups. The ads direct people to manateecountydemocrats.com and the new Black Caucus' website manateedemblackcaucus.org. Social media has been a political mainstay, and now Manatee Dems are using it much more aggressively for paid ads promoting voter information on facebook.com/manateedems and instagram.com/manateedems. - *Bev Pannee*

Ridin' With Biden Caravans Travel on a Wave of Support

Ridin' With Biden started a wave of excitement for the Democratic Presidential and Vice-Presidential candidates when the car caravans rolled through Bradenton neighborhoods last month. Cars decorated with Biden/Harris banners, American Flags, home-made signs, and blue garland covered downtown Bradenton as well as neighborhoods south and north of Cortez Road in a series of Ridin' With Biden/Harris caravans. Caravans continue until Election Day.



The Bradenton caravans roll out of the Orange Blossom Plaza parking lot, Cortez Road and 5thth Street W., Wednesdays and Saturdays at 11:30 a.m. Another caravan rides through University Town Center on Mondays at 12:30 p.m. Caravans in other Manatee County neighborhoods are in the planning stages.

“We wanted to do something to get out the vote, something we could commit to,” said Deborah Jewett of northwest Bradenton. She and her husband, Chuck, are regulars for the Wednesday and Saturday caravans. “We were concerned that there might be negativity, but

we’ve seen little of that. I’d say, the response (to the caravans) has been 90 percent positive, 10 percent negative. People wave, smile, give us the thumbs up. It feels like Manatee County has more Democrats than some people lead us to believe.”

For Pat and Ray Halperin of southwest Bradenton, Ridin' With Biden/Harris is a way to get involved in the campaign while following COVID precautions. “We were looking for ways to be helpful for the Biden campaign,” said Pat. “For a couple like us, in our 70s, it’s safe, we’re having fun, and we’re visible in the community.” -Wil Clapper

How-To Videos Will Help Voters Fill Out Their Ballots



For most American 18-year-olds, the first opportunity to vote is a milestone on their journey to responsible citizenship and adulthood. But for some 18-year-olds, and for some returning citizens, that important first voting experience is delayed.

Florence Shelton-Clark helped a returning citizen successfully register to vote. At the next election, she requested the voter send a selfie with a prominent *I Voted* button; instead, the voter included a picture of her completed ballot. “The voter put X next to the selections,” said Shelton-Clark. “It was the first time voting and no one ever showed the voter to shade in the bubble. It was something the voter never had to do.”

That experience led her, as a board member of the Manatee County Democratic Black Caucus (MCDBC), in conjunction with the Manatee County Democratic Party, to create instructional videos. “The goal (of the videos) is to increase voter turnout and to educate,” she said. “We reached out to all demographics and all communities because we wanted to be very diverse.”

The two, 3-minute videos highlight the importance of voting and show how to fill out a ballot. The Manatee County Democratic Party sponsored the video project (in English and Spanish), along with the MCDBC and Hispanic Caucus. Plans are to distribute the videos throughout the Democratic Party, to Democratic clubs and caucuses, social media outlets, Facebook, YouTube, churches, social and political organizations. Shelton-Clark says, “If enough people see the videos, learn how to fill out their ballots and vote, election officials will not reject ballots and you are safe in the understanding that your vote counts.” -Wil Clapper
