Article from The Friends of Thomas Branigan Memorial Library Newsletter Jo Banks not only served as the Membership Chair for The Friends of Thomas Branigan Memorial Library but has also been a member of Progress Club of Las Cruces since 2002. She has been the club's Library Chair and Friendship Chair for many years.

She was raised, educated, married and began her teaching career and her family in Davenport, Iowa, where the Mississippi River flows from East to West. She chose to give up her career to raise four children. They moved to Roswell, NM in 1976 when she became active in the PTA, began her "volunteer career" and was a substitute librarian until her youngest son went to Middle School. She then returned to the classroom as a 6th grade then 3rd grade teacher. 17 years later, she retired along with her husband (he was a 30 yr. High School Guidance Counselor). They then followed their children to Las Cruces where the two of them still live as well as 3 of their 6 grandchildren. The 5th Great-grandchild joined her family this past

Jo learned of the GFWC Progress Club of Las Cruces and knew their many areas of interest were in great part also hers. Her husband Bill, passed away in 2005 and her second daughter in 2010. She, like her, was able to stay home and raise her 2 boys. As they grew older she returned to NMSU for a Masters Degree in Education and became a teacher in the Gifted Students Program.

Jo learned from Jennifer Cervantes of the endowment scholarship program and established the Jean Banks Apodaca Endowed Scholarship for returning students. It has provided assistance

in the past 11 years to several graduate students as they worked toward their Master's degrees. Jo then helped start "La Bodega", a food bank which was run by the St Albert the Great parish from 2000 until 2020 when parishioners were requested to continue their grocery contributions to NMSU Food Pantry. As well as joining the GFWC Progress Club, she expanded her volunteer work with the Book Store at the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library by joining the "Friends" board as Membership Chair in 2006. Last but not least, she discovered the "Young at Heart" Chorus in 2006. They perform at the Nursing and Retirement Homes singing "Oldies but Goodies" mostly from the 1920's to the 1940's. In every instance, she has gained every bit as much as she contributed mostly by acquiring an amazing group of friends and acquaintances. This may happen everywhere but the "Volunteer Spirit" & all it means - lives and thrives in Las Cruces.

## Progress Club 2022-23 donations reach almost \$50,000

The Progress Club of Las Cruces made \$47,152 in direct donations to about two dozen programs benefitting children and education, veterans and people affected by domestic violence, as well as health and wellness, the environment and arts and culture.

The Progress Club also made in-kind donations during the fiscal year valued at \$111,146, and contributed more than 40,000 volunteer hours, the club said in a report issued during a June donors reception at Picacho Hills Country Club.

Local beneficiaries of direct and in-kind donations during the year included the Children's Reading Alliance, Asombro Institute of Education, La Piñon Sexual Assault Recovery Service, Families and Youth, Inc.'s My Friends Place emergency youth shelter, 4 Paws and a Wake Up, Christ Child Society Layette Shower providing clothing and supplies for new mothers, the Doña Ana Arts Council's Missoula Children's Theatre, La Casa Domestic Violence Program, Thomas Branigan Memorial Library, New Mexico State University and Doña Ana Community College.

The club also donated gift cards for veterans and supported veterans' honor flights, volunteered at local schools and at the Asombro Institute, purchased books for school libraries and volunteered at DACC's Renaissance Arts Faire.

### Club history

The club celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2015 but got its start when the Women's Improvement Association was formed in 1894 by five Las Cruces women who wanted to help provide services to the community the city was not providing, according to club records. At the time, the women were riding behind a coal wagon taking the body of a friend of theirs to a local cemetery. Their first goal was to buy a hearse for the community. That commitment to serve evolved into the Progress Club of Las Cruces' mission of "living the volunteer spirit."



Nicole Martinez, Director of Community of Hope came to present. Community of Hope started out as a day shelter back in the 1990's. Currently it has become a campus of organizations which include Casa De Peregrinos, Amador Health Center, and Jardin de los Ninos serving people who are experiencing poverty or homelessness. Camp Hope (tent city) currently houses 5 homeless vets and can occupy 50 people per night on a first come first serve basis. A Mano y Mano labor program which provides people experiencing homelessness and other vulnerabilities, such as being a veteran, mental illness or disability are being paid daily to do day work beautifying the city of Las Cruces, including trash pick-up, gardening, and cleaning up public parks. She thanked Progress Club for all the previous support and will be looking for volunteers to put structures together for tent city along with welcoming kits such as cleaning supplies to outfit future apartment units.

## **VETERANS DAY**



Hygiene kits for Homeless Veterans

In honor of our Veterans, Progress Club of Las Cruces donated hygiene kits for our homeless at the Community of Hope. The Community of Hope serves the homeless and near-homeless population. They provide a number of services from housing to case management to helping house veterans. They have an ongoing rental assistance and supportive services for Veterans at a 20-unit complex. Assistance is available to homeless vets for security deposit, first month's rent, and utility assistance. Community of Hope also has a tent city called Camp Hope. This is for members of the community currently experiencing homelessness and is located of the Community of Hope campus which provides a safe place for homeless residents to stay while they transition to housing. Campground amenities include a full service bathroom, kitchen, and 3-sided structures on 50 tent pad sites.

The hygiene kits consisted of 2 pairs of socks, some Cottonelle wipes, shaving cream, razor, toothpaste and toothbrush, comb, shampoo, deodorant, and body wash.

## **NOVEMBER GENERAL MEETING**



The speaker for November General Meeting was Judy Davis from Days for Girls. Menstrual health and hygiene are critical factors in improving education opportunities and livelihood outcomes for women, girls and people with periods worldwide.

Days for Girls began in 2008 when Founder, Celeste Mergens, was working with a foundation in Kenya assisting an orphanage in the outskirts of Nairobi. When inquiring about the menstrual health practices of the many girls at the orphanage, Celeste learned that many were sitting on cardboard in their rooms for several days each month - often going without food unless someone would bring it to them. This set into motion her first intervention: disposable pads.

The Days for Girls (DfG) Pad is a washable, reusable, beautiful menstrual health product that's built to last. Their patented design, which includes a protective shield and absorbent liner, is backed by the latest menstrual health research and a decade of feedback from women around the world. it is a truly sustainable solution that menstruators can count on month after month, for up to three years.

Celeste Mergens wrote a book called The Power of Days which is the story of one woman's path to create a grassroots effort that has now helped nearly 3 million women and girls in 145 countries and 6 continents - and isn't stopping there.

Each girl is given a pair of panties, washcloth, soap, absorbent liners, waterproof shields, a care and use sheet in a carry pouch for washing and storing.


