From Our Pastor

One of our greatest Christmas poems was written by Christina Rossetti in 1872. Christina grew up in London England, was educated by her mother, had a nervous breakdown at age 14, and began publishing poetry at the age of 31. Composer and music teacher Gustav Holst, who taught at St. Paul's School for girls in London put Rossetti's poem to music in 1906. Today the Christmas carol can be found in many Christian hymnals, including our hymnal, The Christian Life Hymnal, page 122. Below is the text.

In the Beak Midwinter

By Christina Georgina Rossetti (1830-1894)

Earth In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, stood hard as iron, water like a stone;
Snow had fallen, snow on snow, snow on snow,
In the bleak midwinter, long ago.

Our God, Heaven cannot hold Him, nor earth sustain; Heaven and earth shall flee away when He comes to reign. In the bleak midwinter a stable place sufficed The Lord God Almighty, Jesus Christ.

Enough for Him, whom cherubim, worship night and day, Breastful of milk, and a mangerful of hay; Enough for Him, whom angels fall before, The ox and ass and camel which adore.



Angels and archangels may have gathered there, Cherubim and seraphim thronged the air; But His mother only, in her maiden bliss, Worshipped the beloved with a kiss.

What can I give Him, poor as I am?
If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb;
If I were a Wise Man, I would do my part;
Yet what I can I give Him: give Him my heart.

We sometimes get lost in the hubbub of the Christmas season. Amid the rush to get this gift and that gift for family and friends, we may want to ask ourselves Rossetti's question: What can I give Him?

It is increasingly amazing to me that God would do such a thing. It has been called "a scandal," this idea of coming to earth as a man (heaven cannot hold Him), this idea of dying for humankind (nor earth sustain). It is a scandal – an amazingly, incredible scandal that was witnessed in the bleak midwinter so long ago. A "breastful of milk" was enough for Him, "and a mangerful of hay." Not so for us, for me at least, I want my recliner and my remote; my wife and my bed. We are all incredibly insane in the bleak midwinter at Wal-Mart or Target, Toys 'R Us or the Mall.

But God loves us. Oh, how He loves us.

Let us love Him too.




- 1. Where were you born and raised? I was born in Blount County and raised in Loudon County.

Council Meeting November 7, 2024

HIGHLIGHTS

Pastor's Report

On November 7, 2024 at Trinity House a special guest speaker named Sied explained to a group of SMGMC members his conversion from the Muslim faith to Christianity. As part of Sied's evangelization, he provided small containers of honey for attendees to take, which include an invitation to attend SMGMC and provide an opportunity to ask for prayers. Church members are encouraged to share the honey with their friends and others who may be in need of spiritual help. The honey will be available at Trinity House for anyone to take and share.

Finance Committee

Operating expenses were \$15,732 in October, about \$2,000 under budget for the month Tithes and donations for the year (\$282,080) are around 140% of annual target for October. Actual October tithes/donations were \$29,963, about \$10,000 over budget for the month. (\$7,700 was for the TN flood relief).

Building fund available cash is \$600,380

Mark created a preliminary draft 2025 budget to be presented at the Charge Conference. Tithes and donations are estimated to be \$264,000, operating expenses are estimated at \$232,602, leaving a projected excess of \$31,398 for 2025

Trustee Committee

Steve McGee reported his committee is addressing a chimney repair and working on a 2025 budget.

Outreach Committee

George Lybrand reported the patriotic picnic held recently was successful and fun. The next event is the Christmas party to be held at Eagle Rock.

From the Chair - New Church

G Lybrand informed Council of a special SMGMC Council meeting to be held on November 21 at 10:00a at Trinity House to meet with architect Don Shell, to ask him questions, and consider whether to extend his contract with SMGMC. At this meeting members will also discuss the unresolved sewer situation with City of Maryville.

Council unanimously approved acceptance of a proposal from Robert G. Campbell to begin survey work on the property in preparation for building design.

Charge Conference - Global Methodist Church Midsouth

G Lybrand walked Council members through the packet of materials to be submitted during the Charge Conference held following the regular Council meeting. Council members unanimously approved the proposed 2025 Budget, and the list of Leadership team members; the information was shared at the Charge Conference meeting. Rev Roland Buck presided over the Charge Conference meeting.

The <u>Annual SMGMC Church Conference</u> will be held on <u>Sunday, December 15, 2024</u>, after regular worship services. A light lunch will be served beforehand.




