

# Open House



#### October 17, 1953

ELECTRONIC and mechanical we ders of a modern day and age will be among the dozens of product displays placed on exhibit here next month when Scintilla holds Open House for the first time in five years.

With the exception of research and experimental areas, "behind the scenes" facilities in all manufacturing departments will be open for the one-day visitation from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, October 17th, it was announced by General Manager George E. Steiner. "We plan to keep a large share of the plant's machinery in operation throughout the day, so that visitors will be able to see at first hand the various processes involved in the production of Scintilla equipment", he said.

Arrangements have already been made for the display of jet aircraft, reciprocating aircraft, and Diesel engines. A number of commercial products equipped with Scintilla components will also be exhibited, it was reported. Departmental displays will supplement the major exhibits.

Open House at Scintilla will give the families and friends of employees as well as most area residents their first opportunity for a close look at the electrical wizardry that goes into the manufacture of such Scintilla products as jet ignition equipment, ignition analyzers, electrical connectors, low tension ignition systems, and industrial components. Because of the precision required in the manufacture of Scintilla equipment, many of the operations involved have been developed within the plant and are unique to the industry as a whole.

Although employees will receive a special letter from Mr. Steiner, inviting them to bring their families, friends and neighbors, the General Manager pointed out that all area residents will be welcome to visit the plant and get acquainted. However, security regulations require that all visitors be citizens of the United States.

All visitors will be welcomed at the South Gate to begin a carefully planned tour, which has been arranged to cover both manufacturing and office areas. Employees scheduled to work during Open House are requested to use the West Parking Area only. This will leave the East Area free for the use of visitors' cars. Because of security regulations, it will also not be possible for guests to bring cameras inside the gates.

# Golf Champs


A hotly contested playoff for the Scintilla Golf League championship was decided in the pouring rain at Sidney Country Club on September 5th.

# Personnel survey uncovers some interesting data on ...

CLOSE to a million and a half dollars flows from Scintilla each month into the economic bloodstream of upstate New York. This figure represents the total payroll harvested every month by more than 4600 Scintilla employees who hail from 104 area communities.

A recent personnel survey underscores the fact that Scintilla is unique, as far as most manufacturing firms are concerned, in that only about 30% of its employees live in the same town where they work. In actual figures, the survey shows that 1399 Scintilla employees live in Sidney, while most of the others live elsewhere in the 4-county area of Delaware, Otsego, Chenango and Broome.

On a county basis, 48% of Scintilla's employees live in Delaware, 25% in Otsego, 21% in Chenango, and  $3\frac{1}{2}\%$  in Broome. Ten per cent of the work force comes from Oneonta, some 25 miles away.



30 received \$10.00.


