End of Year Club Information

- Treasurer's Report (Rosie Kautz): We began 2020 with a balance of \$5,657.08 in our account and the end of year balance was \$5,285.08. Major income was from \$855 of dues and \$310 from the sale of donations. Major expenses were \$440 rent, \$400 insurance, \$338 newsletter, and \$198 show expenses (printing). The year-end report was approved by the board by an email vote. A substantial deposit was made Jan. 13, 2021 \$731 from Chili Mania and \$320 refund of rent charged last year for use of the Janesville Senior Center for evening meetings not held.
- Sunshine Cards (Rosie Kautz): Cards were sent to the following club members the last four months of 2020: Reggie James (sympathy for his mother), Bernie Fields Family (sympathy), Mike Hughbanks (sympathy for his mother), Mary Johnsons' Family (sympathy), and Bev Fields (get well). A get-well card was sent to Joe McNally in January for recovery from heart treatment.
- 2021 Carving Show (Brad Crandall): Craig Center is currently operating at 25% capacity (150-200 people) and prospects are looking good for our show Sept. 11. He is keeping in touch with Rock County on this status. Brad is in the process of contacting carving magazines to include our show information. County Line Products (wood) and Hummul have committed to be here. Ernie Tucker will be our featured carver. Demos have been lined up: Randy Callison spiral carving, Jackie Widmar pyrography, and Denny Neubauer carving little people. Denny will also have his tool sharpening equipment for those needing his services.
- **Sr. Center Update** (Rosie Kautz): The Janesville Senior Center will not be open again until the city enters phase 3 of Covid response or the end of May at the earliest. The HVAC system is being replaced (heating and air conditioning) and will not be completed until then. The roof will also be worked on in June and July. If the center is open, it will be noisy inside during those months.

Member Challenge

All RRVC members have the opportunity to challenge themselves to carve a miniature. Judging will occur at our show and an anonymous donor has provided a \$25 cash prize. The club will provide a basswood blank, $1 \frac{15}{16^{"}x1} \frac{15}{16^{"}x4} \frac{3}{4^{"}}$ tall. Finished carvings <u>must fit inside the</u> <u>official judging box, 2"x2"x5" tall</u>. Any family-friendly subject is ok. It can have a clear finish, painted finish, or pyrography. Contact your club president for your block of wood. If you want to use your own wood (basswood or another species), contact the president to register, but remember that the finished carving must fit inside the official box.

Carving Tips

Put your carving glove on <u>before</u> you pick up your knife. If you drop a knife or tool, don't try to catch it!

Hold small projects in your hand when power carving. Normal breathing causes the hands to independently move uncontrollably. Hold the power carver the same as a pencil and extend a finger from one hand to touch the other. Now, when one hand moves, the other moves with it for coordinated control. <u>(Source: Kenny</u> <u>Vermillion, Power Carving Manual)</u>
