

" 'I KNOW ITS NOT QUITE CHRISTMAS BUT: ' WHO WAS IN THE MANGER ON THAT FIRST CHRISTMAS MORNING?"

Hi Comrades

We are a couple weeks away from one of two Major Events on the Christian Calendar, Christmas, and so I'm thinking you are expecting something along the Christmas Line, and you would be right.

In both of my careers, an RCMP Officer stationed in a number of smaller communities, and then again as a clergyperson, I have experienced Christmas in a variety of ways. As a Police Officer I have worked many Christmas Eves, and Christmas Days. I preferred working Christmas Eve, as many times it was quiet, and I was able to drop by my home for short periods of time. During those evening shifts, I had occasion to stop by numerous residences, wish them a Merry Christmas and on several occasions play Santa Claus.

Christmas was usually quiet and I had much time to think, and regularly my thoughts would turn the real meaning of Christmas and what it really meant, for me personally. I had a number of opportunities to stop the Police Car, get out and admire the majesty of the stars, in their millions when all around me it was black. What was it about that first Christmas, that we still read about and think about several thousand years later?

In addition to the Bible, I have been impacted by a number of writers, and one of those continues to be Lee Strobel, a former Crime Reporter for the Chicago Tribune, and when I met him he was a Teaching Pastor at Willow Creek Community Church in Chicago, where I was attending a Global Leadership Summit. Among his numerous books, this one stands out "The Case for Christmas." And, from that book he recounts the following story.

Quote: "Sixty-year-old Perfecta and her granddaughters Lydia and Jenny had been turned out of their roach-infested tenement and were now living in a tiny two-room apartment on the West side. As I walked in, I couldn't believe how empty it was. There was no furniture, no rugs, nothing on the walls only a small kitchen table and one handful of rice. That's it! They were virtually devoid of possessions.

In fact, eleven-year-old Lydia and thirteen-year-old Jenny owned only one short-sleeved dress each, plus one thin, gray sweater between them. When they walked the half mile to school through the biting cold, Lydia would wear the sweater for part of the distance and then hand it to her shivering sister, who would wear it the rest of the way.

But despite their poverty and Perfecta's painful arthritis that prevented her from working, she still talked confidently about her faith in Jesus. She was convinced He had not abandoned them.

Strobel goes on to say following his visit with this family, "I never sensed despair or self-pity in her home; Instead, there was a gentle feeling of hope and peace." I continued to wrestle with the irony of the situation: here was a family that had nothing but faith and yet seemed happy.

Strobel went back to the Delgado home on Christmas Eve, and here is what he found: When Jenny opened the door, he says, "I couldn't believe my eyes." Many of the readers of his article had

provided the Delgado's with a treasure trove of gifts, furniture, appliances, and rugs; a lavish Christmas tree with piles of wrapped presents underneath; cartons bulging with food; and a dazzling selection of clothing, including dozens of warm winter coats, scarves, and gloves. On top of that, they donated cash. But as surprised as I was by this outpouring of generosity, "I was even more astonished by what his visit interrupted: Perfecta and her granddaughters were getting ready to give away much of their newfound wealth. When I asked Perfecta why, she replied in halting English: "Our neighbors are still in need. We cannot have plenty while they have nothing. **This is what Jesus would want us to do." unquote**

This story blows me away, and I can do nothing else but think, "Yes that is what Jesus would do, and has done, and continues to do." I am reminded that I have done nothing to deserve the Love God had for me, by sending His One and Only Son, to come to earth, and live here for some 33 years. I try hard to imagine what His journey must have been like. He left the Glories of Heaven where everything was perfect and came to live on this earth.

You see comrades, the Child in the Manger was the undeserved gift that means everything. It means more that material possession, more than comfort, more than security, it means a new life for us all, especially during this coming Christmas Season. We have done nothing to deserve this amazing gift, did nothing to earn it: "It's a gift from God, who loved us, and it is that gift that we celebrate this Christmas." The Child in the manger brings peace despite poverty, joy in the midst of sorrow. The Child brings the wonder of spiritual connection with Almighty God.

This Christmas can I encourage us all to read with new eyes, the account of the coming of the Baby in the Manger, in Luke 2: 1-16. I close with the question, Why did Jesus come? And I answer with these words, found in John 3:16, from the Message: This is how much God loved the world: He gave his Son, his one and only Son. And this is why: so that no one need be destroyed; by believing in him, anyone can have a whole and lasting life.
